But perhaps the most depressing point to me is, is that way, the older gay activists in our community, have so often turned our backs and pretended that it does not even exist, perhaps out of fear, fear that we might be accused of solicitation, or even recruitment, a lie that we know that a lie that we really know, to be nothing more than lie. And we have, we have so often refused to accept the challenge of that lie. Therefore, by our silence, we have to degree accepted that lie. And this, and that point was brought back to me, it's basically this past week, that is extremely difficult for me to accept. Tonight, this silence on this subject is coming to an end, it's going to stop and it's going to stop now, our silence will no longer will no longer will we allow that silence to be an option. We will no longer compromise on this subject. That is no longer that, in itself is no longer a compromise. Napoleon Hill once wrote, do the thing you fear the most in depth of fear certain. Tonight, we challenge that self imposed fear. Tonight, we're going to talk about a subject of abuse now. Now beautiful covers a huge area. And we provide counseling, case management and education services to primarily the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgendered communities in Houston. We also have special areas that we concentrate in, such as HIV AIDS, chemical dependency, and general life issues, which is more generalized therapy. And the newest one is the program that I'm working with, which is the hate crimes program, where I do some counseling and case management with people who have been targeted for hate crimes. And that's based on a bias toward a person's sexual orientation, race, religion or ethnicity. And the other parts of the other services offered by the Counseling Center on a sliding scale basis. My program has no fee. It's covered by a grant. So that's that's basically the services that we provide.
