

**JIMMY CARPER:** Oh, yes, indeed. Some of the entertainment that you're going to be hearing tomorrow at the festival. That was Suede with her version of "Miss Ceile's Blues." And before that we had two by Nancy Ford, "We Didn't Start The Fire," which is a classic by her. And I'm sure she's going to do it tomorrow.

**MAN 1:** We love you, Nancy.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Oh, you bet we do. Plus, "I Need a Woman." Yes. Yes. Well, I don't but she does.

**MAN 1:** I need a man.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Yes, where's Grace Jones with "I Need a Man." Roy has walked in here and he wants to do something.

**BIG ROY:** Yeah, I just want to mention how-- I just want to mention how that next week on After Hours, Deborah Rogers, the president of the Houston gay and lesbian political caucus has promised that she will be here.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Oh, well, right.

**BIG ROY:** And also a group we haven't really profiled much or have heard much from. We're going to have Littlejohn-- gay Asian-- talking about the gay Asian community.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Cool.

**BIG ROY:** Not just here but I'm going to probe him for--

**JIMMY CARPER:** Excuse me.

**BIG ROY:** I'm going to get the information out-- wanna get gay Asians in other areas of the of the world and over the country.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Do you want to probe him, do you have to do him-- do that after the show is over.

**BIG ROY:** There you--

**JIMMY CARPER:** Yes. After After Hours.

**BIG ROY:** And Littlejohn is a very out gay Asian guy. He does drag shows as China Doll.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Uh-huh.

**MAN 1:** Oh, I know China Doll. I don't know him by his real name.

**JIMMY CARPER:** See. See.

**BIG ROY:** And I know right where he lives and everything.

**MAN 1:** I think we worked the [? bazz ?] one year.

[LAUGHTER]

**BIG ROY:** Yeah.

**JIMMY CARPER:** They did shows at the [? bazz ?].

**MAN 1:** That's what I meant.

[LAUGHTER]

**BIG ROY:** Anyway-- and Jim, you said that you were going to have some-- line up some people for next week. Or just-- you-- oh, it's going to be you. It's also going to be Jimmy and--

**JIMMY CARPER:** JD Doyle.

**BIG ROY:** JD Doyle.

**JIMMY CARPER:** You bet.

**BIG ROY:** QMZ.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Uh-huh. He's going to bring in lots of music. And don't forget next Monday, this coming Monday, Monday, Monday, Monday on Lesbian and Gay voices, which comes on this station from 8:00 until 10:00 central time. At 9 o'clock jade does an hour's worth of gay music Queer Music Heritage. What a lineup he's got. This is a special pride show and all of it-- it's just-- all these gay anthems that you've heard on this show for years, and years, and years.

And first of all it's the Charlie Murphy, "Gay Spirit," which JD uses as his background music every month. Leah Zicari with "Glory, Glory." And he's got interviews with these people. Jallen Rix, with "I Saw Jesus Down at The Stonewall." The Berkeley Women's Music Collective, "Gay and Proud." Mark Islam, "Get Used To It." Jamie Anderson, "No Closet." Just on, and on, and on. And ending up with an interview clip from Jon Gilbert Leavitt and his song "Pride."

**MAN 1:** Wow.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Yes, that's a line up.

**MAN 1:** Jesus at the stone wall.

**JIMMY CARPER:** I mean it.

**MAN 1:** And he plays-- he played baseball for the New York Yankees.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Something like that. I don't know.

**BIG ROY:** And I also want to remind our listeners-- I also want to remind our listeners, that if they didn't hear earlier, this Friday--

**JIMMY CARPER:** Friday, Friday, Friday.

**BIG ROY:** --on Ray Hill's Prison Show, he's going to have police chief Lee Brown.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Oh. OK. Yeah, we've got--

**MAN 1:** I thought it was Bradford.

**JIMMY CARPER:** We've got a piece of music coming up.

**BIG ROY:** Yeah, Chief Bradford.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Yes.

**MAN 1:** Mayor Brown.

[LAUGHTER]

**BIG ROY:** He's gonna have Bradford on.

**JIMMY CARPER:** OK. This entertainer is well known by the gay community because she's at the Briar Patch every Wednesday night doing piano and music. And--

**ROSIE:** And a damn fine job.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Yeah, come here. Come here. Tell us about it.

**MAN 1:** [INAUDIBLE].

**JIMMY CARPER:** Tell us about it. We've got-- we have got pat and Rosie from Pat and Rosie's Night Sounds, which you'll hear tomorrow night at this time, midnight till 5:00.

**ROSIE:** Yes.

**JIMMY CARPER:** I don't know how you do it, girl.

**ROSIE:** I sleep till 11:00.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Yeah, that works. OK. Marcy Ray.

**ROSIE:** Also known as Sweet Mama Cotton.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Also known as Sweet Mama Cotton, yes.

**ROSIE:** Hell of a voice.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Hell of a voice and--

**RAINBO:** Sweet Mama Cotton

**JIMMY CARPER:** --just a wonderful woman.

**ROSIE:** She's funny. I really love her. She's great.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Yeah, and she-- just really honest, and sincere, and-- gosh.

**ROSIE:** And she sings, "Cows with Guns," one of my favorite songs.

**JIMMY CARPER:** OK, and you want to dedicate this one?

**ROSIE:** To all the CWAs out there packing heat.

**JIMMY CARPER:** OK. We got it. "Cows with Guns" from Marcy Rae. This is from her CD live at the Hollywood. You're listening to all of this on *After Hours, Queer Radio with Attitude* on KPFT Houston and KEOS College Station.

Yes. Leah Zicari with "Glory Glory." That's one of the songs you'll be hearing Monday night when you tune into JD Doyle's queer music heritage heard the fourth Monday of every month on lesbian and gay voices. Lesbian and Gay voices starts at 8:00. JD's segment will start at 9:00.

This is-- we're rounding up toward the end of another episode of *After Hours*. Oh, god, it is late.

**CHRIS:** No later than it usually is

**JIMMY CARPER:** I know it. I know it.

**RAINBO:** Just think, Jimmy. Six hours ago, we were just starting the parade.

**JIMMY CARPER:** I know, I know, Rainbo. Rainbo's here. Chris is here. Rosie's here, and you got to hear your song.

**ROSIE:** Thank you, thank you.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Yo.

**RAINBO:** I got to be Ms Cotton for the first time.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Yes. Yes, yes, yes. And you've been hearing music that you're gonna be able to hear tomorrow at the pride festival. We had Christy Claxton, you-- who've you heard many, many times on this show doing *Best Loved Girl*. And we had a little snippet of Bob Smith's comedy act, and you'll be-- as Chris mentioned, you'll be hearing the exact thing tomorrow.

Anyway, it's just been a wonderful day full of pride, a wonderful parade, just terrific.

**RAINBO:** There's a breeze.

**JIMMY CARPER:** There was a breeze, yeah.

**RAINBO:** I could not believe it.

**JIMMY CARPER:** I had my can of Off, and I only sprayed once and lightly.

**RAINBO:** When I was in the van, I don't have air conditioning, and I felt this breeze. I thought, where is this coming from? You know? It was cool.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Really?

**CHRIS:** The interesting part with the pride parade this year was that-- I think we'd have to say the official scent was citronella.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Boy, it sure was.

**RAINBO:** Or Off.

**CHRIS:** There was a lot of people with citronella.

**RAINBO:** There was Avon. I was wearing Avon.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Skin so soft.

**ROSIE:** That's what I used.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Yeah, see?

**CHRIS:** The community center float had a big debate on what everyone was using. And I don't think I got bit but once or twice, and I didn't use anything.

**RAINBO:** Can I mention my favorite--

**JIMMY CARPER:** I wish you would, yes.

**RAINBO:** Studs in suds. Did you see that?

**JIMMY CARPER:** No, I missed that one.

**RAINBO:** That was a float with washing machines and these stud-looking guys on the float--

**JIMMY CARPER:** Oh my god.

**RAINBO:** --hanging laundry. They had laundry, and it had something to do with the cleaning up Alison, you know? Everybody was just washing their clothes and stuff like that. That was wonder--

**JIMMY CARPER:** That's wonderful. I need you to go in there.

**RAINBO:** Why?

**JIMMY CARPER:** Because. Yes, yes. I'm gonna play our closing theme-- closing song, which is the special Buddy Johnston mix, "We're Coming Out of Hiding." In it, you'll hear Harvey Milk. You'll hear people from the First March on Washington and the Second March on Washington, all kinds of little clips of our history. And as Rainbo knows--

**RAINBO:** Hey, I got something to say.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Yes?

**RAINBO:** If Buddy Johnson was here for the parade, he would have been in with that Houston police group, right?

**JIMMY CARPER:** Yes. Well, he was a dispatcher here.

**RAINBO:** Yeah, but he's still a policeman.

**REPORTER:** His orders began with a routine--

**JIMMY CARPER:** Here we go.

**REPORTER:** --on a homosexual bar, The Stonewall, on Christopher Street in the heart of the West Village.

**JIMMY CARPER:** That's what we celebrate, yes. The Stonewall Riots.

**PROTESTER:** Say it, so they can hear you in the Capitol! For love and for life, we're not going back! For love and for life, we're not going back! For love and for life, we're not going back! For love and for life, we're not going back!

**ANNOUNCER:** I want you to savor this next moment. I have the proud task of telling you that the official count of the Lesbian and Gay Rights March, the official count is over 500,000 strong!

**JIMMY CARPER:** Yes.

**HARVEY MILK:** We must destroy the myths--

**JIMMY CARPER:** There's Harvey.

**HARVEY MILK:** --for all, shatter them. We must continue to speak out, and most importantly, most importantly, every gay person must come out.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Yes, we're going to go out with that piece. Pamela Stanley, who is originally from Dallas. So happy Pride Day to everyone out there. We'll be back next week with a special *After Hours*. Chris, thank you.

**CHRIS:** Thank you for-- everyone, remember. Pride is-- we celebrate it for one day, one month, but it's year-round.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Yes, it should be.

**CHRIS:** Just think of what Dickens said about Christmas [AUDIO OUT] and enjoy where you're at, and what you're doing. And do what you can to be a part of the community.

**JIMMY CARPER:** That's right. Rainbo, thank you for being here.

**RAINBO:** Happy Pride.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Rosie, thank you for stopping by.

**ROSIE:** I just have one question.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Yes?

**ROSIE:** I don't know if I can say it on the radio, but--

**RAINBO:** Go ahead.

**ROSIE:** How long is a daisy chain with half a million people?

**JIMMY CARPER:** She went there. OK.

**CHRIS:** You don't do that on your show!

**JIMMY CARPER:** How do you-- yeah.

**ROSIE:** We don't talk much about sex on our show.

**RAINBO:** We had thousands, and thousands, and thousands of people today along the street. It was fantastic. Everyone looked fantastic tonight.

**JIMMY CARPER:** OK. Thank you for being here. You're listening to *After Hours* on KPFT Houston and KEOS College Station. Stay tuned at the top of the hour for the *Early Morning Groove*, and the man just walked in the door.

**CHRIS:** KPFT *After Hours*, this is Chris.

[MUSIC PLAYING]

**REPORTER:** As President of the board of supervisors, it's my duty to make this announcement. Both Mayor Moscone and Supervisor Harvey Milk have been shot and killed.

GALE:** Toto, I have a feeling we're not in Kansas anymore.

We are talking about our rights alone, and the truth, and to live! And I don't care about straight tolerance, and I don't care about straight understanding! You better hear me in Washington! We are demanding! We are demanding our Civil Rights!

**HARVEY MILK:** I asked people all over this country to do one thing.

[MUSIC PLAYING]

We must destroy the myths once and for all, shatter them. We must continue to speak out, and most importantly, most importantly, every gay person must come out.

**REPORTER:** Harvey, do you have a few words for KPFA?

**HARVEY MILK:** Come on out. Join us.

[MUSIC PLAYING]

Difficult as it is, you must tell your immediate family. You must tell your relatives. You must tell your friends if, indeed, they are your friends. You must tell your neighbors. You must tell the people you work with. You must tell the people in the stores you shop in.

[CHEERING]

Once they realize that we are indeed their children, and we are indeed everywhere, every myth, every lie, every innuendo will be destroyed once and for all. And I ask people all over this country to do one thing. Come out. Come out, America! Come out!

[CHEERING]

**PROTESTER:** What do we want?

**CROWD:** Gay rights!

**PROTESTER:** When do we want it?

**CROWD:** Now!

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**PROTESTER:** What do we want?

**CROWD:** Gay--
