Okay, we're back. Let's see, we'll talk about the music we played earlier. Let's see right before the PSAs. We played "Seattle" by Public Image Limited from the album Happy? came out think like in 1987. Before that we have let's see, what do we have before that? Utah Saints, "What Can You Do For Me." What I'm going to do now is I'm going to read this commentary that I wrote that was published a couple of weeks ago in This Week in Texas, and it's entitled fighting for our rights means fighting all forms of oppression. And I didn't choose that title. And when I'm finished reading it, I have a few things I want to say about that title. But here it goes. At the September 1 meeting of the Houston Gay and Lesbian Political Caucus, which was also an election meeting to replace outgoing president Chris Bacon, and I was surprised to find on the agenda the formation of what was called a minority coalition committee. When this item agenda came up, there was no discussion pro or con. In fact, almost no interest was shown in the issue. A caucus member made the proposal and spoke in favor of it. No one else said a word. The proposal passed. Of course, no one dissented. After all, it doesn't take much time or

energy to form a committee, particularly when there is no call for committee members nor an announcement of a committee meeting. Later, after two presidential candidates gave their speeches, each talked about the need to work with established racial minority groups to fight for gay rights. We can't do it alone. After all, we're only 10% of the population. During the question and answer session, caucus members asked, What's your plan to get minorities to fight for us? What can minorities do for us? How can we use minorities to advance our interest? How can we get minorities to promote the white gay and lesbian agenda? What no one asked, what white gays could do for people of color, how white gays can assist people of color in achieving their objectives? How white gays could help to fight the racial bigotry and class inequities that have for many people of color turned the American dream into a nightmare. And as usual, lesbians and gays of colors were ignored. And GLPC for all practical purposes, African, Asian, Latin and Native American fags and dykes don't exist. The caucus has no black or Asian members. I am black, but I was there as a reporter. There were two maybe three Latinos, it's no wonder there wasn't much interest in the minority coalition committee. If gays of color feel so alienated from the GLPC see that we have so far refused to take part, wow does anyone expect to get hetero dominated minority groups support gay issues? If you think you can manipulate minority organizations into supporting gay issues while you fail to support their issues, you are wrong. If you think you can make inroads with communities of color while ignoring the needs, interests, talents and path and future contributions of gays and lesbians of color, you are wrong. If you think you can gain the support of gays of color without first taking a strong stand against racism in white gay and non gay communities you are wrong. And if you think gays of color will be manipulated into working for the white gay agenda against the interests of our communities of color, you are wrong. Traditional liberal conservative racial rhetoric has failed. It prevents white gays and gays of color from, from, from forming a queer united front. It prevents lesbians, gay men, and communities of color from uniting to fight our common enemies. The people who firebombed the home of a lesbian PWA in Tampa Bay, Florida are the same people who bomb NAAPC offices in Sacramento, California and Tacoma, Washington, are the same people who desecrated Jewish cemeteries and synagogues, are the same people who murdered a doctor who provided abortions to women in Melbourne, Florida, and this, are the same people who torch the home of a white faggot and black dyke in Oregon, killing both. If the queer movement is to become a liberation movement, it must expand its vision to include the freedom of all queers, white, brown, black, yellow, red, female, male, young, all homo by and transgendered. We must develop a progressive queer politics that recognizes the interconnectedness of homophobia, racism, sexism, and classism, and is committed to fighting them all. We must challenge the institutions that deny us all human rights, not blindly submitted them. We have to work together to build a united front that challenges all forms of oppression. And we're at a point where less than 1% of the funding spent to prevent AIDS and Houston is city tax dollars, meaning the city doesn't give a damn enough about people, gay people, people of color women to actually try to do something that's going to save our lives instead. Our mayor's lovely Bob Lanier, who is, you know, a shoo in for being reelected next week, has established as one of his priorities hike and bike trails. So I say, Yeah, so the person who lobbies for Houston's interest in the state legislature, he is there not not urging them to increase funding for AIDS prevention. But for more hiking bike trails.

And I came out in the paper yesterday that the CDC has finally said that AIDS is the leading cause of death among men between the ages of 25 and 44. In other words, when men, when men are at the prime of their lives, they're dying of AIDS, a preventable disease, that the city of Houston is not spending any money to prevent.

The fourth largest city in the US. Thank you very much. Didn't, didn't they also broaden the the definition?

The definition, finally, yeah, added 48,000 people. They didn't, didn't so much add 40,000 people, just include the 40,000 people that were left out before. Part of the thing, what they did when they expanded the definition, and they didn't expand it far enough in, in my opinion, was they added a couple of opportunistic infections that affect women. So I mean, things like chronic yeast infection, which, you know, I mean, which, which means that before the definition expanded, there were thousands of women who the CDC will admit were HIV positive, they will admit that these women are dead, they just will not admit that these women died of AIDS, ah, so and then of people and if you don't get a diagnosis of AIDS, you can't get, you know, social security. You can't get, you know, a whole array of things that you get that you can get when you have that AIDS diagnosis. And, you know, so this person has any more questions about what can Houston be doing? And another thing that I think we should be doing in order to in the fight against AIDS is to fire the woman who heads HIV prevention at the city's health department. Her name is Glenda Gardner. She's been there for approximately three years, and she ain't do a damn thing.
