A federal court ruled Friday, the government had asked the ninth US Circuit Court of Appeals for an emergency stay. Setting aside the ban until the case involving Petty Officer keep mine hold was resolved. might hold a sonar sonar instructor at Moffett Field Naval Air Station near San Francisco was discharged after revealing he's gay. He was reinstated after US District Judge Terry Hatter Jr. ruled on January 28. That the Navy's ban on homosexuals violates the Constitution's equal protection guarantee. The government appealed. President Clinton announced in January he would repeal the ban on gays after a six month study. Clinton's January 29 presidential directive said gays in the military may be placed on standby reserved but may not be discharged. In filing the motion the Defense Department argued that had her rulings Hatter's ruling conflicted with Clinton's policy and would stop the Defense Department from placing gays on standby reserve. But the appeals court said that because military terms indicate that transfer to the standby reserve is not a discharge from military service. There does not appear to be a conflict. The two judge appeals panel that issued Friday's ruling from San Francisco said there was still a legitimate dispute over whether Hatter's ruling applied to every gay sailor only mine hold. That has resulted in record levels of violence against homosexuals. National Gay Lesbian Task Force Leader said Thursday. Task Force Executive Director Torie Osborn, why would obey said the same bitter feelings among religious right political activists that led to the shooting of an abortion clinic physician in Florida this week, or behind attacks on homosexuals. The bottom line is that conservative zealots considered no action to extreme against individuals and groups that engage in or support any activity they consider wrong. Osborn said the far right will stop at nothing including murder to stop rights for gay lesbian men and women. Texans united for life, had Bill Price said it's ludicrous to paint such a wicked picture of conservatives as a whole. That way is too broad rest. It's far more complicated than that. You can't blame a whole movement for the irrational acts of a few. Price said all of these groups have a radical fringe the gay rights people of all folks don't have any business talking about radicals. Their ACT UP group is probably one of the more radical social groups in the country by almost anybody's measure he added, according to Task Force study of violence against homosexuals in five metropolitan area areas, New York, Chicago, Boston, San Francisco and Minneapolis St. Paul, a tax of all types Rose 4% last year to a record of 1898 from 1822. And the number of murders jumped to 50% 50% to 12. From eight, the group did not compile statistics from Houston, Martin Hiraga, who directed the study contended that the actual number of incidents is substantially higher, because many homosexuals fail to report them. Gay victims often will not report to the police because they fear being re victimized at the hands of gay hating or insensitive officers. Further, many victims feel that the public exposure that comes with reporting will lead to discrimination on the job who raga said. And I know that at that radical social act, social group act UPS demonstration at the Republican National Convention when there was when police brutality abounded, a lot of people did not report it at all because exactly that I mean, I know two or three people that are school teachers that just went to show support. I know people that were professionals that were beaten, that came showed up later with, you know, bruises on their body from police billy clubs, while they were running away from the scene, because they were frightened for their life from police officers that didn't report it, because they feared they would lose their job. It's talking about the study that the last article was about from the Gay Lesbian Taskforce. And it says violence against homosexuals and bisexuals rose to record highs last year in five major American metropolitan areas. And the total of 18 198 incidents of assault, murder, police abuse, harassment, vandalism, threats and arson were reported to gay and lesbian victim assistance agencies and Boston, Chicago, New York, San Francisco and Minneapolis, St. Paul says is that the violence has risen 4% In this year over last years. And it also said that violence had increased in the military, which is studying President Clinton's plan to allow homosexuals in the armed services. And in Colorado and Oregon, where residents voted November on the proposals to prohibit local gay rights ordinances. And it says the the New York area led the five cities and anti gay incidents was 662. And after that came San Francisco, Minneapolis, St. Paul, Chicago and in Boston. And the killings of homosexuals rose to 12, from eight and physical assaults Rose 5%. Over the last years, and they say again that only a fraction have been reported at all.

Colorado voters passed an initiative that barred local governments from enacting gay rights ordinances and a similar ballot measure failed in Oregon. And in Colorado, 204 incidents were reported, which is 129% Jump over the previous year. And almost one half of those incidents were reported in November and December. And an Oregon 968 incidents were reported suppressing even New York City in the number of attacks.

In Canada, the resignation this week of Brian Mulrooney brings electoral politics there into focus. A likely successor to Mulrooney is Defense Minister Kim Campbell, who kept a promise to her heavily gay and lesbian Vancouver constituency by introducing a federal bill to protect their rights, but annoyed them by doing it too late in the session for parliament to pass it. Campbell will be challenged in this year's elections, which must take place before November 11. By open lesbian Betty Baxter nominee of the small New Democratic Party. Baxter was captain of the 1976 Canadian Olympic women's basketball team and coached the 1980 team for six months before being fired because of her sexual orientation. She went on to coach team Vancouver in the 1986 Gay Games and help to organize the 1990 Gay Games in Vancouver. If elected, she would become the first open lesbian to serve as a member of the Canadian Parliament.

Openly gay Swedish Member of Parliament Kent Carlson is trying to speed up the progress of his proposal for legal recognition of same gender couples there. He organized a question session that included testimony from Norwegian Minister of Children and Families Greta Birgit who drafted a similar measure, the Norwegian short thing is expected to pass this year and a review of the Danish law that has been in effect for three years. During debate. No serious objections were raised to Carlson's proposal, which he hopes the Riksdag will consider in a few weeks. Legal experts wondered however, how a same gender partnerships would be viewed outside the country.

More than 5300 people attended the four day US National Religious Broadcasters 50th anniversary convention in Los Angeles in mid February. A major focus of the meeting was full scale organizing against possible congressional reinstatement of the Fairness Doctrine, which requires broadcasters to present balanced discussions of controversial issues. They fear that reinstatement could undermine their plans to intensify their campaign for so called family values by forcing them to put gays and lesbians on the air. The Fairness Doctrine was repealed under the Reagan administration in 1987. Although Representative John Dingell has been fighting a losing battle to restore it ever since.

Still stinging from losing the White House in November. The Republican Party is regrouping and may not repeat the blatantly homophobic displays of its 9092 national convention. A coalition of moderate Republicans begin to form almost immediately after the election, intent on removing the anti abortion plank from the party platform and stopping the flow of rhetoric against gays and lesbians. The election of Haley Barbour as the new National Party chair may signal a new approach and a public statement at the end of January. Barbara called on the party to work to change its image of being intolerant and exclusionary towards gays and lesbians and other minorities. However, Barbara has condemned President Bill Clinton's intention to lift the ban on open gays and lesbians serving in the military as an obvious payoff to a powerful political constituency within the Democratic Party. Outgoing Republican Party chair Richard bond used his farewell speech to call for less rigidity on the abortion issue and more recognition of diversity. Bond also criticized the party's religious right, especially Pat Buchanan, who quote cling to zealotry masquerading as principal and quote, Bond admitted he should have tried harder to keep Buchanan's call for a religious war out of the primetime media coverage of the National Convention, saying it would rest on his conscience.

Meanwhile, gay Republicans have been doing some regrouping of their own. They celebrated Republican President Abe Lincoln's birthday in mid February by incorporating a new organization Log Cabin Republicans. The new group will focus on activities at the national level, including Republican Party and federal policy matters and will have offices in Washington DC. Although there is no legal affiliation, Log Cabin Republicans will work closely with the older log cabin Federation, a coalition of local gay and lesbian Republican groups.

Colorado's controversial amendment to the successful ballot initiative to prevent legal recognition of gays lesbians and bisexuals as a protected class was put on hold in mid January when Denver District Judge Jeffrey Bay was issued a temporary injunction.
