The US Republican Party's anti gay and lesbian platform is encouraging outings in the community press. Q w has published what it calls an open secret that leading anti feminist homophobe Phyllis Schlafly son is gay. John Schlafly lives with and often travels with his mother and advises her on some financial matters. In the advocate, Louisiana's US Representative Jim McCreary, was outed by a former longtime lover and others. After beginning his political career as a Democrat, recovery became Republican. His voting record on lesbian, gay and aids issues changed from moderately supportive in 1989 to opposition in 1991. McCreary married his wife John at in 1991, and is taking a strong so called Family Values position in his current reelection campaign.



C Cindy Friedman 27:35

Tammy Baldwin could become Wisconsin's first openly lesbian state legislator in November after winning the Democratic nomination for the seventh eighth district assembly seat in a primary election on September 8, Baldwin took 44% of the primary vote to beat out three other contenders.



B Brian Nunes 27:54

Gay and lesbian rights and aids organizations tried unsuccessfully to defeat homophobic US Senator Jesse Helms in his 1990 North Carolina reelection campaign, leading the conservative campaign fund to file a complaint against them with the Federal Election Commission. The Commission's decision in the case of Robert Coons and his oral majority, was finally made public late last month, Congress was vindicated on most charges, but was merely admonished by the Commission for failure to identify himself and his independent committee on anti helms buttons and flyers.



C Cindy Friedman 28:26

The Louisville Kentucky Board of Aldermen defeated a lesbian and gay rights measure late last month after 10 months of debate. A \$50,000 opposition campaign generated so much interest that attendance at the voting session had to be determined by a lottery.



B Brian Nunes 28:43

Regardless of California Governor Pete Wilson's actions on lesbian and gay employment rights bills. Another court decision has denounced discrimination. Superior Court Judge Richard

Hubbell ruled that open gay rod Roberts does have the right to bring suit for anti gay discrimination against his former employer, the entertainment trade paper Daily Variety, based on fundamental public policy under California's constitutional Equal Protection Clause, although a case 10 years ago applied equal protection considerations to lesbian and gay government employees. The current ruling extends equal protection to private employers for the first time, they leave varieties expected to appeal the decision.

C Cindy Friedman 29:25

In reviewing the 9091 9092 session of the US Supreme Court, the Washington blades Lisa Kean determined it was one of the four worst years for lesbian and gay rights since the High Court began to consider such cases 35 years ago. But Keene also made the surprising discovery that Justice David Souter, whose 9090 nomination was stringently opposed by most liberals took supportive positions in all 10 cases relating to lesbian and gay rights

and unusual paternity dispute in Asheville, North Korea. Elena affirmed the parental rights of a gay man who provided sperm for the artificial insemination of a lesbian mother. Before the insemination, both parents signed an agreement granting the mothers sole custody and the father of visitation. Once the child was born, the man exceeded the visitation agreement to such an extent that the mother is sued to deny his legal fatherhood. Although North Carolina law explicitly denies paternity to donors, in the case of married couples using artificial insemination District Judge Gary cash believes the donor retains parental rights in any other situation, as in this case of an unmarried mother.

New York City's new Direct Action Group Lesbian Avengers took its first major action this week to demand lesbian visibility. Five local school boards had rejected the New York City multicultural curriculum called children of the rainbow because it included lesbian and gay material. The Lesbian Avengers aimed their protest at an elementary school and one of those districts Queens public school 87 in districts 24 children arriving for their first day of school on September 9, were greeted by lesbians distributing balloons imprinted.
