But I can promise this audience and every audience that I speak to that I have been involved in more cases and more important cases, and seen more of them one than David Petronella. David has also been in the state legislature where I have been a lobbyist. David's been a member of the legislature, but I can assure you that I have written more legislation, more important legislation and seen more of it passed than David Petronella. It's amazing that that David has been a member of the legislature, not a spectacular member of the legislature or benchwarmer of sorts. And David has done some things for us in his capacity as a member of the committee overseeing Texas Alcohol Beverage Commission has done some things for people in the bar business. Oh, I haven't done and and that's been valuable work he has done about A third of what he was asked to do. And David on other issues, will not vote against the community. But he will get up and take a walk. If he thinks that David's political experience is that he hasn't had democratic opposition, his opposition has come from the Republican side. So his trick is to draw a lot of Republican voters to vote for him a Democrat in November. That's the way he's kept his position. Our race is wholly within the Democratic Party. Now, I'm not saying David is a bad guy. And I don't want anyone to think that I'm saying David is a bad guy. And all of the evidence that was later submitted to the grand jury could be heard in open court, and how it was submitted to the grand jury could be properly arranged that way. Justice of the Peace law is written for counties that are not big and sophisticated like Harris County. But just because we're in Harris County, we don't lose any of the prerogatives of the Justice Court. What happens here is they're just not used. And they're just not used to just pass that over. I was listening to what a Republican justice a piece tonight Bill Yeomans was out giving a speech to friends of Pakistan tonight. And he was giving a job description of what justices of the peace do. And it's literally true that the Justice Courts are the most diverse, busiest and most fascinating court cases we deal with, with peace bonds between married couples, where there's violence, we deal with projects and small claims up to \$2,500. We deal with both criminal matters in civil matters and middle commitment hearings. And that's the kind of core you really have to be diverse. And you're not alone. Well, you really not only have to be diversity knowledge, you have to be absolutely committed to the principles of this whole society. I mean, I mean, what have I done, I've gone to jail and to the Supreme Court, which is just about as bad. On the issue of First Amendment, right. Yes, you have I have gone to jail and the Federal Court on the issue of police officers demanding proof of identification. I have gone to jail, and to court over the issue of using a sidewalk. I mean, they used to have an impeding passage, which I think meant somebody using sidewalk instead of somebody else using the same sidewalk. But I feel so strongly about those issues. That that I get really excited about things like the first and the 14th, and the fifth and the fourth and the Second Amendment, and I can sort those things out. And if we can't make those things work, in quarrels between citizens, on a given block in a neighborhood, we cannot enduringly expect those principles to abide in the highest courts.
