The recent decision to grant parole to man convicted in the 1991 gay bashing death of Paul Broussard is being reviewed after board members learned that they did not take into account a probation violation. This is regarding Derek a tardes probation, parole that he has been granted. Basically, if you haven't, if you don't know there, Paul Broussard was attacked by 10 young men from McCullough High School in The Woodlands, who came down to the area to harass members at the gay bars. The group spotted Paul Broussard and a couple of friends

they were leaving a club and attacked them. Now it's hard. While on an iPhone six, the motion was filed to revoke his probation that he received in the original sentence for selling alcohol to a minor and failing to submit to a urinalysis as was one of his conditions of probation. Rather than revoking probation, the judge sent him to jail for 30 days and allowed him to continue. He then broke it again in 1997, once again for failing to submit to your analysis. And the the probation was revoked, and it was ordered him to serve a 10 year prison sentence. He has posted an appeals bond and avoid enter for entering prison until June of 98. And he will become eligible for for parole this year. One of the the most difficult parts about this is the fact that whenever a parole is being heard, the victim's families are usually informed ahead of time so that they can attend it or have their say in front of the board. And Nancy Rodriguez Paul was for SARS mother did not receive anything. prior notice to this from the parole officials. She knew that a vote was scheduled on October 11. She contacted angle Tim's parole office which is where his file was kept. But it had been transferred to San Antonio. And the San Antonio said that they hadn't received it. And the only notification she had received was the fact that it had gone through. So that is being reviewed. And we actually getting this art of the story out of the Houston Chronicle, which made Saturday's front page lower corner, which is quite a big step there. And we'll keep an update on to that the Paul Broussard murder was one of the big turning points in the Houston gay community for stepping up and being more visible with a call for civil rights.
