Thousands of homosexuals have converged on Washington this week. KPFT will air the rally starting at 2:00 PM. Please note the time change.

The GLPC this week announced its endorsements for the November 3rd elections. As expected, Ray Hill was selected for the at-large position one. For District C, which includes Montrose, the caucus endorsed Houston School Board President Cathy Minberg. Without surprise, George Greanias was backed For the comptroller's race.

Other candidates endorsed are David Sherman for District H and Melody Ellis and Kathy Bingham for school board positions. Pat Robertson may be the next presidential candidate to fall after he admitted to pre-marital sex and fudging his wedding date.

Well, the Supreme Court is back in session with only eight justices. Everyone is wondering who will fill the vacant seat. It apparently will not be Judge Robert Bork. 53 senators have announced their opposition to Judge Bork so confirmation seems unlikely.

(SINGING) Some of us were born in this city on the bayou, and some of us came looking for the sun to build the kind of town that would open up its arms to anyone who'd work to get things done. Now all of us call Houston home, and we're the hometown crowd. And we're here to stay forever give a big thumbs up together because everyone of us is Houston proud. Houston proud, proud of the things we've done together. Proud enough to stand and sing it loud. We believe there's no place better. That's why we call it home, and we're all Houston proud.

And we're all Houston proud. I certainly am Houston proud. Someone asked me and I said this last week, why do you play that? I mean, the city and this and that.

The city fathers and mothers and council and Mayor they took a chance back in 1979, was it? When was that? When was the referendum? Was that-- it wasn't that long ago, was it?

No, just--

Somebody call us and tell us when that was, 526-4000. But anyway, the city council, some members of the city council and the mayor got together and they decided that discrimination against gay and lesbian people in Houston just should not be tolerated if you wanted to work for the city. So they put a referendum on the city books that said that such discrimination would not happen.

We all know, of course, that there are no gay and lesbian people working for the city. Oh, come on, you know. Anyway, we're all out there and there are many gay and lesbian people that work for the city just like we're everywhere and the city council did their part. I really think they did, Lloyd, you know what I'm saying? They really did us a honor I think by making it law that discrimination would not be tolerated in the city of Houston.

And then along comes some folks like the Straight Slate and others that thought that wasn't such a good idea and they got their petitions together and their numbers on their little petitions and got it on the ballot. And of course, it was soundly defeated in January of last year, two years ago. But what's sad is that a very small percentage of the people that are registered to vote in the Montrose area bother to go vote. A very small percentage of the people registered in Houston area bothered to vote.

I think it was like less than 30% of the registered voters. I don't want to be quoted on those numbers, but it was a very small percentage. So a large group of the city doesn't really care what you do just like a large group of the country most of them are nice decent people and they believe that we should all have our human rights and civil rights. So the small percentage of people that don't want us to have those rights of course they're out there.

Those people that want Judge Bork confirmed, of course they're writing letters. Jerry Falwell is sending out his message of hope for Judge Bork, and those people are always going to be there. I mentioned a minute ago the guy standing on the side of the street yelling at the men and women that were having the wedding in Washington yesterday-- some guy said, "hey, you should be like me."

And of course people like that are going to always be there yelling and screaming. But what I'm trying to say is the city council and the mayor like it or not I feel like they really did a good thing by getting the referendum on the ballot. And sometimes I feel like that myself as a gay man and a lot of my friends have said the same thing, we let the city council down by not even bothering to get off of our butts and go down to the ballot box and putting our X on the ballot. And if you're going to sit out there and let them continue to deny you of your rights, well, who do you have to blame but yourself?

So all I'm saying is, the March on Washington is here, and it's time that we stood up as a community and said, we're not going to take it anymore. And a lot of people that's not easy. It's not easy coming out of the closet. But once you do it, it gets easier and easier and easier.

And I can guarantee you that you will feel like you have had a ton of bricks taken off of you when you can look at the people that you work with and your family and your friends and once-- the initial shock may be a little much for them but once they understand that you're the same old guy or the same old girl, and you're a decent person they're not going to change their feelings about you. If they're your friends, they're going to be your friends. If they like you, they're going to like you.

If they've loved you, they're going to continue to love you. If they didn't like you before, they're certainly not going to like you then. So it is hard, but like I said before, if you take 10% of the population, which is at how many million, Roger?

About 250.

250 million people now estimated in the United States. Those are the 1985 census figures. 25% of that would be 25 million. So there are 20-- pardon me.

10%.

I'm sorry, 10% of that would be 25 million. So that means that there are at least 25 million gay and lesbian people in the United States. And a large group of them are going to be in Washington today.

Lloyd, you've got an album in your hand. That's Romanovsky and Phillips, and they're going to be playing at the rally this afternoon.

Wish we were there to hear it.

I wish we were there to hear it too. I couldn't get off work to go, so.

We need you here, Buddy.

Plus, I didn't have any money to go. A lot of people did go and a lot of people can't go. And I'm real lucky and I'm really glad that Pacifica and KPFT are going to be here so that we can at least enjoy the rally because you know that CBS and ABC and NBC are all going to give complete coverage, live coverage of the rally. You know they're going to do that for us, ha ha. They're not going to do anything for us just like they, well, enough of that.

If there's anything displeasing about it I'm sure we'll see it on the major television station.

Exactly. Someone called in some dedications. Who have you got over there, Ron--

Yes.

--this morning?

Well, to Vanessa from RIDA sending lots of love and to Mike Salinas, Mike Colasante and Artie Salinas from Vanessa, Rita, and Becky. They say, we love them a lot.

That's great. I also want to say happy birthday to Roy. Roy is one of our musical consultants down to Beat Records. Today his birthday is, well, it's past now.

It was yesterday. I won't tell you how old he is. He said he was 19 and I thought, aren't you supposed to say you're 29 or can you go back like 20 years or?

Well, it just depends how you feel I think.

Anyway, let's listen to Romanovsky and Phillips. This is from their album *I Thought You'd Be Taller*.

(SINGING) If at times you're a bore.

Hi. This is Tom from the Kitchen of the Pot Pie in the beautiful downtown Montrose. And you are listening to *After Hours* on KPFT Houston 90.1.

That was Holly Near and Jeff Langley from an old album from back around 1976 called *You Can Know All I am*. The song was called "Don't Take my Sunday Paper." It is Sunday, and I look out there and see if the papers out there yet somebody probably already got it. But anyway, Roger's shaking his head. He got it.

We have this weekly feud every week, Lloyd, about the Sunday paper.

Who goes and gets it?

No, although I don't watch television I can't survive unless I have that little TV thing, you know what I mean? So I know what I'm really missing. I don't really sit around and watch it but I like to know what I'm missing.

Anyway, we've got some more music for you. We're continuing our salute to the March on Washington from 1979 and a lot of the gay performers that are going to be there. This is from an album called *Feels Like Home*, and it's Elliot Phil's show. And the name of the song is?

[INAUDIBLE]. The words in the music are by Noel Coward. And basically this reminds us of the gay male unique point of view as he sees the world in a very artistic sense and the romance and the sensitivity that he has towards the beauty of the world.

Sounds good. And this is *After Hours* on KPFT Houston.

It's been almost 25 years since Dr. Martin Luther King stood on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, DC, and uttered those now famous words.

I have a dream to be.

[MUSIC PLAYING]

On Sunday, October the 11th thousands of lesbians and gay men from across this nation will join together in our nation's capital for the National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights. Among the speakers at the rally will be the Reverend Jesse Jackson, comedian Whoopi Goldberg, singers Holly Near, and Romanovsky and Phillips, Robin Tyler and MCC's founder Reverend Troy Perry along with many, many more. Please join us as KPFT brings you the rally from the National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights. Our complete coverage begins at 2:00 PM Sunday, October the 11th. For loving for life, we're not going back.

[MUSIC PLAYING]

[MUSIC - NORTHERN LIGHTS, "TEARS ARE NOT ENOUGH"]

(SINGING) [INAUDIBLE] not enough.

That's from the We Are the World collection of music. The group is called Northern Lights. And the song is called "Tears Are not Enough." That sounded appropriate.

What about the March, Lloyd, any last minute thoughts? I wish I could be there. I really wish I could be there. You were at the gay pride parade, you were in the gay pride parade.

Yes.

I'll do that sometime. I was at the gay pride parade last year. And I remember Ray Hill walking down the street bringing up the rear of the parade and he had his little megaphone screaming, "go to the rally, go to the rally," which was across the street from the Disco Kroger store upon Montrose.

The Mary Kroger.

Mary Kroger. And as he got there everyone that had gathered around the Tower Theater and the bar Mary's and so on and so forth everyone began to come out into the streets and they quietly walked over to the rally. Well, not quietly, but it was wonderful to be in that sea of humanity and know that you were surrounded by several hundred gay and lesbian people. I'd like to be surrounded by several hundred thousand like they're going to be tomorrow in Washington.

But since I can't be I'm going to be right here at KPFT pushing buttons and bringing you the rally, not live but taped beginning at 2 o'clock. And we hope that everyone tunes in. Everybody that's anybody that can sing and dance and tell stories is going to be there on the platform for us to speak to us. And of course, we want to know what they have to say.

The Reverend Jesse Jackson is committed and he's going to be there. One of my favorite ladies right now, Whoopi Goldberg is going to be there. And I'm kind of wondering we have to beep a lot of things. I don't think we'll have to be poop tomorrow, do you?

No.

No. Whoopi's going to be nice. Someone called and ask about the Romanovsky and Phillips album. We're going to play a song from that for you here in just a second. But it's not available unfortunately in the Houston area that I'm aware of.

If someone out there knows where you can pick up any of these men's music albums-- a lot of the women's music is available at some stores around Houston, but unfortunately none of the men's music for unknown reasons is not available. You can write to Fresh Fruit Records at 2269 Market Street suite 301 in San Francisco, California 94114 and for a small fee they'll send you that album. And I believe they have two or three other albums.

Romanovsky and Phillips will be at the rally, of course, in Washington today. And then I believe on October the 30th they're going to be in Dallas holding a concert, which will benefit PWAs and the National March on Washington. So on and onward and upward. This song that we're going to play for you is called "Closet Case."

But why?

From the Romanovsky and Phillips album.

That brings something to mind.

What's that?

Come out, come out, wherever you are.

Wherever you are. Exactly.

[MUSIC PLAYING]

[MUSIC - ROMANOVSKY AND PHILLIPS, "CLOSET CASE"]

(SINGING) Closet case.

I believe that Harvey Milk went to the mountaintop of America. I believe that Harvey Milk had gone to the top of the mountain of discrimination. He'll go to the top of the mountain of oppression. He'll go to the top of the mountain of psychological and societal debasement.

And I believe that Harvey Milk from the top of that mountain looked down on Wichita, looked down on Kansas City, looked down on Dade County, looked down on Oklahoma, looked down on Seattle, looked down on Texas, looked down on the Supreme Court and the Congress. And I believe that Harvey Milk for gay people will one day be full, free, and equal citizens in this country. And it is our responsibility to come out of the wilderness, not to one day meander and mingle in the wilderness, the wilderness of despair but to come out and realize the dream, realize the promised land, and gather our strength, our fortitude, our creativity, our initiative, and our hope and go into that promised land of dignity, pride, and respect.

Dignity, pride, and respect. Lloyd, I wish a lot of times that Harvey could be around to see what's going on. He would be really excited about this program, not because I'm here and not because you're here, not because we have all these records here, but because he would be excited to know that there are around 450,000 gay and lesbian people in Houston. And Harvey would be happy to know that there's a place they can tune on their radio dial and pick up programming like this.

Harvey would also be excited about the March. Harvey was a big supporter of getting out and standing up for yourself and ripping closet doors off. And I'm real jealous of a lot of people, especially a lot of other gay broadcasters that I've spoken to over the last three or four weeks that knew Harvey and were privileged enough to know him.



And I know somewhere out there he can hear us and he's got a smile on his face just like I know that Dr. King is going to be real proud of those folks tomorrow when he sees them in Washington. I sometimes wonder where we would be if Dr. King was still around with us. I wonder where we would be with John F. Kennedy was still around with this. I wonder where we would be if Robert Kennedy were still around with this. I wonder where we would be if all the people that aides have taken away from us were around with us.

And during the March something's going to happen in Washington. They're going to unroll the thing that's been dubbed the names Project. And what it is the very large quilt made up of panels 3 by 6 feet each. And each panel has the name of a person that has left us with AIDS. And Lloyd, it's not just gay and lesbian people, right?

That's right.

It's children and women and straight men, straight women. And I see things like the family in Florida, the young kids there that have AIDS their home is bombed and because of the ignorance and not the lack of knowledge I guess of how to deal with it. And it's hard to deal with it.

But as time goes on hopefully medical science will find an answer for it. But until then, we're going to continue to strive forward onward and upward. And the March will be here this afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Harvey Milk is someone that I want to get to know. And thank God for tape recorders and records and so on and so forth. And we're going to be meeting Harvey over the next few months here on *After Hours* and continue to listen to what he had to say.

We've got a special program in November to commemorate Harvey's life and assassination in San Francisco. It's a very strong program produced by Greg Gordon of our sister station KPFA out in Berkeley. And it's a good show.

Part of the March on Washington from 1979 that we played for you just before the news came from a program entitled *Timeline* that Greg also produced. And we're going to be playing *Timeline* for you here on the *After Hours* show in the near future. *Timeline* takes a look back at the last 15 years of history that surround the gay and lesbian community, but anyway back to Harvey.

This is something from one of Greg's programs called *Diminished Capacities*. That's a program we're going to listen to here on *After Hours*. And I just want you to hear the beginning of the show.

We played it at the beginning of the program tonight, but some of you may have been coming out of the bars and getting into your cars and heading home and you may have missed it. So just listen real close to what Harvey had to say. This is about, oh, I can't remember the date, but it was just before he was sworn in as supervisor for the city of San Francisco.

The day the board of supervisors are sworn in the tradition is every supervisor gets up and says a few gentle words and introduces their family there.

In January 1978 after three unsuccessful runs for public office, Maverick Politico Harvey Milk was sworn in as the representative of District 5 on the San Francisco Board of Supervisors.

The first words out of my mouth and the National press was there was, "as you know, I am gay." And I said that there's a state law that says gay people cannot legally be married. But there is no state law or any place in the universe that says two people cannot love each other, and I'd like to introduce my lover.

[APPLAUSE]

[MUSIC PLAYING]

(SINGING) Singing for our lives. Good night.

[APPLAUSE]

Hello. This is Randy Brown, publisher of the Texas Forum reminding you that the best revenge is a great lifestyle. And you're listening to *After Hours* on KPFT Houston 90.1 FM.

(SINGING) If I had a [INAUDIBLE] all over this land.

[INAUDIBLE] what the gay movement's about.

Harvey Milk.

After I got elected I got the phone call I knew I'd eventually get and I got quite a few of them. One was from a 17-year-old child in a small town in Minnesota and the boy is handicapped. And the boy's parents found out he's gay and they want to put him in an insane asylum. And that boy needs help.

In the *Gay News* about the letter I got from Southwest Africa when he read about a gay person getting elected here and that person has hope.

I think Harvey Milk did a lot.

And that 17-year-old kid in Minnesota has hope.

I used to be really afraid. But it's people like Harvey Milk and other people like that it made me realize that I was OK.

Sunday, October the 11th beginning at 2:00 PM you can hear KPFT's coverage of the rally from the National March on Washington for Lesbian and gay Rights. Join us Sunday afternoon beginning at 2:00 PM for love and for life we're not going back.

I have a dream to be.

Hi. This is Tom from Ajay's where we're celebrating life in the heart of Montrose. And you're listening to *After Hours* on KPFT Houston 90.1 FM.

Well, Lloyd, thank you so much for coming by and doing the news this morning.

Well, it's been my pleasure.

I really enjoyed that. That was a pleasant surprise. I had cornered Rodger on the way over to the station this morning I said, you've got to do the news Brian's in Washington along with several hundred thousand gay people getting ready for the National March which will be here at live this afternoon beginning at 2 o'clock right here on KPFT.

Buddy, two things let me cut in on your time.

Yes.

One is a voice from the gay community, thank you so much for being here to push the button so we can hear from the March. And number two for Harvey Milk, my name is Lloyd. I'm on Public Radio and I'm gay.

A gay father.

That's right.

You left that out.

[MUSIC PLAYING]

Next week, Reverend Laura from the Church of the Rock is going to be here with us on the *After Hours* program. I want to say thanks to all of the *After Hours* staff, you know who you are and all of the wonderful people here at KPFT that make this program and supply the equipment and the tapes and the buttons to push. And I want to welcome you and encourage you to please tune in and join us for the March on Washington. The rally will be here tomorrow afternoon beginning at 2 o'clock on KPFT 90.1 in Houston listener-sponsored Pacifica radio.

This is Buddy Johnston saying thank you so much for being a listener to this program. Crystal is getting ready to come in here and knock your socks off with some wonderful music so stay tuned for that. Support her program and continue to support listener-sponsored Pacifica radio in Houston.

We've been around for 17 years and we plan on being around for a long, long time. I'll see you next week. This is Buddy and Lloyd saying, bye.
