But from what I've heard, the churches are planning to get together. I know that I happen to have friends in Atlanta, and my friends in Atlanta, are straight. And they're members of a group called straight but not narrow. And they're very open and outgoing. Heterosexual is for homosexual rights and equal rights for gay and lesbian people. So that's very important to them. And I think that the new wave of Christian dome, which is going to be very ugly, ugly, exactly. There's going to be for every action, there's a reaction. And I think that for all the freedoms that we've won, and all the rights that we've won, the church specifically the church that's afraid of, of losing its hold on the people that the power that it has and the people that it has, more or less in its grasp right now are going to really grab a hold of them and go for that new conservatism which is very scary. It's very frightening.

Yeah, recently, the protests I was mentioning before was a clinic defense that we, I was, I was a party to Gosh, it wasn't a week ago, maybe two weeks ago, and that was at seven o'clock in the morning, a bunch of us from coordination, got together with our friends at now, Houston, now you have H a national organization, woman, and some other there was another group of people there that were Catholic, but they were Catholic for concerns of human rights. I'm not I don't know the exact name of their group. But we all got together and basically did what's known as clinic defense. It's a form of counter demonstration. And we stood out front and made sure that the people going in we're not harassed the and we were very peace loving. We're very, very open and easy to talk to. And I was just so impressed with the caliber of people that were there for pro choice reasons. The people that showed up for it was mostly I believe, if I'm not mistaken, it was mostly a Catholic church, a particular church kind of or particular organization. With the aid of some people from Operation Rescue, I believe we're there to demonstrate against abortion right. And they brought pictures of, you know, what they termed

as, you know, maimed fetuses and aborted fetuses that were, in actuality, probably two and three year old children, you know, they were, it was disgusting, horrible pictures of violence. And that's not what it's about. I mean, as a Christian, you know, I have to have what, what I believe, is my own personal set of choices. And if it was up to me, I don't know that abortion would be for me, but I'm not willing to have anyone make those choices for me, not the church, you know, perhaps I'm a Buddhists, you know, maybe I'm a Muslim or something, I'm not gonna want this particular Christian religious person, making those choices for me and what's happening inside my body. Same as the government, I don't want the government to make those choices for me. So we have to stand up and say, I don't want those choices made for me. These people were very fervent in their religion. And as a matter of fact, there was one woman there that I tremendously respected. There was one woman that was very adamant about her religious beliefs. She was, you know, standing there, you know, silently praying silently, you know, doing what she needed to do. She was there for a reason, and she was accomplishing her mission. She was keeping their side peaceful. However, some of the people on their side were, as I said, spouting venom and calling us vile demons from hell and saying that we were you no vipers, and just this terrible stuff and saying that we were homosexual, which had no really hurt me. I was, you know, I immediately called him a heterosexual and he just looked at me like, Hmm, I don't get it. It's great. When you know, your jokes go over their heads,

And I don't agree with that. And I do want to say that some of us do not necessarily agree that abortion is the answer, but we are are more result more. I'm have a deeper belief that the choice is the is the answer that each person make their own decision. If this were a man's issue, if this were a men's issue, abortion would be I heard someone say this one night, or abortion would be sacrament. And it because it's a women's issue, I tend to have real difficulty with all the males out there shouting about all the single males who have no children, and have no family out there shouting it. Single mothers or single, expectant mothers going into these clinics. Some of these women are not going in for an abortion. They're going in for health care, free and counseling, most of them actually counseling. The abortions are not as frequent as as these people would have you to believe. The Welshman's Part and

And I was just handed a note here that says pro choice does not mean pro abortion. And that's absolutely right. And they're going to try to tell you that it does, or they're going to try to get in fights with you, they're going to try to get in verbal battles with you. And the bottom line to all that is that there is no fighting them. These people are fervently religious and addicts. That's right, they're fanatics. They're very fervent, and there's basically no fighting them, what you must do is stand there and hold hands with the person beside you and say, This is what I'm here for. This is what I believe in. And I'm showing my support for the right to choose.

We've gone to the police station and said, What are you going to do about it. And since then, the police are doing a type of sensitivity training. And that is including currently not only gay and lesbian sensitivity training, it's also gay teen runaway sensitivity to your sensitivity training. And also I don't know how to exactly people that are into leather, basically how to approach the different aspects of our leather community. And that would be basically this person that had this occur, was wearing a harness and the harness strapped down under his privates and through his jeans. And the cop asked him to take take it off. And the guy said, I can't it's you know, it's strapped, I'm going to have to do some severe, I'm gonna have to go somewhere private to take this off. And the cop was adamant, but the cop didn't know that. I mean, the cop was not aware of what he was saying of what he was seeing and what he was saying. And once he knew it, because this cop was who this cop was, he used that and said, you know, well, we're gonna make you and blah, blah, blah. And eventually they did, but basically, you know, mess with his his nipple rings and pulled on him and stuff. And although this may be foreign to some of us, and this may be not so foreign to others of us. The bottom line here is that this person had a right to wear the attire that he was wearing. It's not illegal, there's nothing wrong or criminal about what he was wearing. And the police used this aspect of his personality to single him out and say you are different and I'm going to pick on you because you were different. Not enough that this person is gay. And they were holding hands and Montrose gay people supposedly stopped them on the street and pointed at them and said, they're not really gay. They're just cops don't mess with them and really pointed them out and said, you know, obviously these people are cops. Well, it doesn't matter whether or not these people are cops. And it doesn't matter whether they're gay or straight in their private lives. The bottom line is they're coming down here to protect us. They're in our neighborhoods to experience what it's like to be us. So if they're straight, or if they're gay, if they're cops, if they're not. We need to watch out for our brothers and sisters on the streets. And supposedly this particular program is currently going on and they are still making arrests with that program.

And for those of you that have not heard about it, where you have been guys, basically, there were three young men leaving heaven as it was closing one evening and they were set upon by two cars of 10 teenagers from the woodlands that chased them and beat them with boards with nails on them and gauntlets and kick them with steel toed boots. Paul was actually stabbed several times with a knife and he died and was it was fatal. The other two guys one got away, more or less unharmed. I believe he was I believe he was slightly injured and the other person was injured a little more severely. However, Popstar passed away, we as a gay community as a gay lesbian community. I hate to be so politically correct all the time. As a gay lesbian community and transgender roles and bisexual community. We hit the streets we got to Montrose and Westheimer few days after that and
