No one is immune to any of these forms of abuse, and that includes Houston's gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgendered community. It's believed that domestic violence and abuse occur in the GLBT community at the same rate as it does among heterosexual partners. Roughly one in every four people is affected in some way by domestic abuse. And the Montrose Counseling Center offers crisis intervention, advocacy and counseling services to the GLBT survivors of domestic violence. In response to the increasing need MCC is expanding its program to include limited shelter services, as well as 24 hour crisis intervention information and referrals. beginning December 1, with win partnership with the gay and lesbian switchboard of Houston. That egg could then be implanted in the womb of a surrogate mother, who would carry the child full term. Matt Keller, who runs a nonprofit organization called European bioethical research said similar techniques for you to create dolly, the world's first cloned sheep. One scientific issue still needs to be overcome. Dr. McClellan said the embryo would lack certain maternal genes

that would enable it to develop normally, quote, some advances have been made in this respect. So we may not be as far away as we thought and quote, so who knows what tomorrow will bring.
