This is the time to come out. Make yourself heard make yourselves known. Nobody is going to say anything about gay bashing. If we don't come out there if we're not known, and we don't make our voices heard. According to Pamela Oglesby, who's a staff attorney for the Human Rights Foundation, the she believes that the court records indicate the state probably has the strongest case against moose. At present, Alton defendants are charged with first degree murder. She believed that separate trials would be more likely to result in more severe sentences. In the strongest cases, however, she noted the tactic of hinging cases on the results of one trial could very well backfire. In other words, if we're there, and we're make ourselves known, we're going to say that you know, this is wrong, and that you can't get off that easily. You killed somebody. and in cars. Gardner said that while the Q Patrol has been effective in discouraging hate crimes in the Montrose stereo, the group is going to have to shorten its patrol hours due to a lack of volunteers. Each week, the same 12 to 15 people show up for their patrol. Thank you very much. 12 or 15 people show up for their patrol. And it says here we have here handed out flyers begged and pleaded and short we've done everything we know how to do to get more volunteers. Our patrol shifts are only four hours long and our current fliers as volunteers commit to four hours shift once a month now this is the police department seeking volunteers within the police department to do this cute patrol. I'm hoping that this is a matter of us not doing our marketing job properly because I would hate to think that the level of apathy is this high in the get Houston's gay and lesbian community. The group is awesome, desperate need of funding to continue its operation. Other members noted that patrol recently got a boost to the department's \$100 donation from an area business owner Suzanne Anderson of Anderson's property who said she would just encourage other business owners to contribute as well. Gardner is no stranger to the Montrose area or the citizens patrol. Although he now resides in southeast Houston near hobby airport, Garner spearheaded the original Montrose patrol in the 70s. The crime, the crimes are still getting the same Garner said the difference difference this time around is that we have support and cooperation of the officers and HPD to volunteer to help with the key patrol.
