And they're not going to throw this back at you sometime in the future when they get mad at you. So that the the anonymity of it is is very, very valuable part of it. And it's a it's a worthwhile organization and everyone I've ever kind of nudged into the fold has made the comments about it being life altering. And I'm glad to hear you say that too. Because because that's important to me. What did what did you think before you went down there, were you a little intimidated was it all seemed all too, too big to
