Generally speaking, these people get the term fundamentalist, because their belief is that the Bible is in errant. Yes. They think that everything the Bible says about homosexuals should be taken literally, there's not going to be any discussion about it may have been actually aimed at Temple slaves. That may not mean they're not going to listen to anything that we have to say that there was no such thing as a homosexual



orientation, because it was not even thought of as an actual fact, until the 19th century. None of that. They believe that it says X and Y and therefore they should believe it. Okay? Makes it makes it real hard. They believe that God is omnipotent course meaning all powerful. In God answers prayer that becomes important in a second Oh, from these fundamentals, they then they then come up with the following conclusions. God hates homosexual behavior. Now, fundamentalists will say to you, God did not the God doesn't hate homosexuals. He hates homosexual behavior. That's like saying, I don't hate rapists. I just hate the fact they rape. Yes. It's it's it's very strange logic. And I, you know, I'm not gonna say I understand it. But from that, they then say, well, homosexuality is unnatural. And it's a sin. And here comes the important part. Therefore, God will help a repentant homosexual convert to a heterosexual orientation, because to believe otherwise would put limits on God's abilities, and the powers of prayer.

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Yes, he that's the that's the stupidity of the argument. You know, who was born? Who got up to everyone out there now raise your hands if you get out of bed this morning. So that I think I'll be clear from now on. Yeah, exactly. If you woke up this morning and said, Gee, I'm tired of being queer. I want to be home, I want to be heterosexual. And I'm going to be able to change this way. You know, raise your hand because we want to see you. We don't see any hands. Because it's not like that. So the fallacy is, you know, the fallacy is that when you apply logic in education, and rationality to these arguments, they fall apart. There is no difference between that argument and the argument of Ayatollah Khomeini. Yes, there is no difference whatsoever. fundamentalism in, in the Muslim faith is not a whole lot different than fundamentalism in the Christian faith,

Now, I gotta take kind of a cute story about this. When I was in queer nation many years ago,



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I would not know the story of itself. It was fabulous. They this



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Exodus International chapter here, and they were running an ad in the twit. And they were doing homosexual healings. Well, that was just too much to take in Brian Bradley in myself and a three or four other people. We decided we were gonna go get healed. And so we went to this meeting. And they anointed our heads with oil and they do with a cold laying on a hand. They put your their hands upon you, so they can channel the power Lord through to you okay, and they did their damndest to cure us. And when we got through, we did a wonderful kissing right there in front of them, because not a single one of us was cured of a damn thing. We had a good time. Well as coordination. That's what we did. Yes. The sad part is these people think then the Lord and the failure was clearly not in the Lord. The failure was in us sure could not reach us, or we willfully chose to ignore it. So you see how they have you coming and going. There's no way in and you wonder how you conduct a dialogue with these people. The answer is you don't. I mean, that's the bottom line. Don't. You have to out organize them. You have to know understand exactly what they're doing. We need to say, and you have to know that they're going to be able to outspend you at every turn. Sure. So in essence, you boil all that down in, in the queer community in the queer political circles, you know that we have to be sharper, smarter, brighter and tougher than they are. Because we're never going to be richer, or more well organized, and they will make



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my gut instinct tells me about about these ex gay folks is that primarily, most of these people

are bisexual, and they're they haven't changed their orientation. They've just repressed part of it. Actually, there



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was see if I can find it. There was an investigation done by a man named chin, I'll find it a little bit, okay. But he actually went undercover in the ex gay movement for the period of a year. And he can't he found exactly that Jimmy, then, in fact, what we were talking about were bisexuals there who had decided that they were simply going to focus on one particular group. And that, in fact, the actual success rate of these groups, I just think this is wonderful, was 0.04%. And you only got that 00 4%. If you made the assumption that these were bisexuals who chose to focus on the heterosexual side, that in fact, the success rate for real actual gays and lesbians was 0.0 versus exactly there is. And it's not next, not success. It's repression. And that's very dangerous. Now, just looking at this can't fill pot, the leader of the ministry, love and action, wrote a book called The third sex. It describes individuals, he said, we're able to change the sexual orientation. The people mentioned in his book later denied that they had been able to change sued the publisher in one, whoa. So, you know, this, I love this act, this this whole idea of being ex gays. Now, one of the problems that we've got here is that the words homosexual and homosexuality don't exist in Hebrew. They don't exist in Aramaic. And they don't exist in the Greek languages. It turns out that the word wait from the 19th century, that's right. That's it. I mean, the authors of the Bible did not understand sexual orientation, and never wrote about it. There isn't one word in the Bible about sexual orientation. They never knew it existed. Right? So for these fundamentalists to say, hey, you know, God didn't. God says this guy didn't say any such thing. God didn't. There was no no concept for it. So but the problem is that these that the fundamentalists say, well, he may not have known about sexual orientation, and he need not have known because it's not an orientation. It's a choice.

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it Dr. Cole's on get together today, there was a transgendered person there. She's from she's from Houston, so I'm not gonna give her name. But she said that she just knew she had to stop being transsexual. So what did she do? She enlisted in the Air Force, and she became a fighter

pilot. She served 14 years, including two tours of duty in Vietnam. And that didn't cure her. And I'm not joking that no, no there today, and I just saw, she joined the Houston police force. Wow. And she was on the Houston Police Force for 11 years. And that didn't cure her. And finally, she became a born again, Christian. And she tried to heal it through prayer. And she was there today because her surgery date is scheduled for next month. The point being to this is that you can no more change what you are, then you could change the color of your skin. It's just not possible. Part of the problem is the way that it's viewed. conservative Christians see homosexuality, and they see it as a behavior. Psychologists see homosexuality is an orientation. That's a huge gap, a huge gap. Conservatives see homosexuality is what one does. Gays see, homosexuality is what one is. Another another huge difference. I grew up conservative Christians believe that, that homosexuals can be cured and can become ex gays. Gays believe that the people who are supposedly been cured are either sexually celibate homosexuals, or, or bisexuals who have chosen to focus on their heterosexual side. That's



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right. That's what I believe.



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conservatives believe that a person can truly change their homosexuality. Gays believe I either was in remain bisexual, or I've had a same sex relationship in the past and plan to have one in the future. And you see the problem. The problem with all that is that they're not even speaking the same language. I remember when Jimmy Carter was was was president. He was I remember him explaining once about the difficulty he had negotiating with the Iranians. And he was explaining that the Americans would say peace and the Iranians interpreted peace as weakness. We would say negotiate the Iranians interpreted as they have, they are not serious. We were using same words, but with thoroughly different meaning. Sure. And that's the problem that we have with these groups. Now the problem that I have with them working in this from a political point of view for a second is that they have unlimited money on limited Let me repeat that. They can raise a million dollars a day and they have when you go to the tent when you go to the Texas Legislature, you kit legislature, you know who the right wing groups are? Because they're the groups with all the computerized data the They know where every hearing is being held, they know who's going to be presented, and they know what's going to be said. And they know it all well in advance. They have fun, they have staffs that work overnight. So while everybody else is in bed, their staffs are organizing their lobbyists next day business to bed. They have unlimited amounts of money, is we go into Pride Week, you need to think stop and think about this for a second. If we had unlimited amounts of money, how different would our movement be? Cool. You know, I'm not talking about just a few rich donors. But if everybody out there said, Look, um, you know, for the gay Taskforce, or for the Political Caucus, or for pick your organization here, if you if everybody in the community decided to donate 25 bucks a year, and gave them unlimited on virtually unlimited funds, how much different would our movement Bay and as we come into pride, I've had people say, Well, you know, it's hard to feel pride when you've got these right wing groups. I think they kind of backwards, you should have pride that you're not a member of putting these right wingers. They're gonna they're gonna backwards, what you should be proud of is that you have not succumb to the guilt and the shame they tried to lay on you that you have not succumb to the nonsense that they have told you about what it is that God believes. Like God sits on the right

hand and their right shoulder. Yes, it I mean, the whole concept is silly. Abraham Lincoln told the story once. He said that the right wing in his day the religious groups would come to him and say to him, I God came to me to dream. And God says that you should do this for the country. To which Abraham Lincoln replied, you would think if God had something of such importance, he would have communicated directly to me.

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years later, it hasn't changed. These groups are still the same things the same way.
