They have been on 12 television talk shows. They have been involved in all sorts of things for cross dressers over the years. And I'm really proud to present this this interview. They are good folks, good people and it is not too late to To sign up to go to the tea party if you have not done so yet. So without further ado, let's go to Linda and Cynthia Phillips. This week our show was taking an in depth look at what I suspect in terms of actual numbers is probably the largest segment of the transgender community. I'm referring to the CrossDresser. I've also been looking forward to the show because I get an opportunity to interview two people I genuinely respect Linda and Cynthia Phillips. They're here today to discuss the Texas tea party, an annual event sponsored by the Bolton in park society. Welcome to the show, y'all. Thank you. Let's start off by letting the listeners which will let them know which of you is



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which. I'm Linda Phillips.



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I'm Cynthia Phillips. Okay, y'all,



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you folks, you got that now, the purposes of the interview for the purposes of the interview, I want to begin with the assumption that a listener has heard of a crossdresser and knows nothing else about them. So which one of you wants to explain what a crossdresser is to the audience?

Go for it. Well, since I'm a crossdresser, I guess I can define that a crossdresser is someone who

dresses in the clothes of the opposite gender. And that's where you have to keep the gender and sex separate because I consider myself a gender female. But anatomically, I'm a male. And I dress in the clothes of a female. I'm live as a female.

Okay, now I consider myself a transgender person. And I'm still undecided about surgery. So for the audience, explain to them what the differences between crossdresser in a transgender person



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well, some people think a transgendered person covers everybody in our community. I don't particularly think that should be true, we use the term transgender is transgender. So somebody who like you and I live full time as a female. I think that's probably a pretty still a pretty good criteria to go by.

Okay, so for the audience. Now, let's make sure we make a distinction. There's a distinction between gender and sexual orientation. We had Kate Bornstein on the show recently, and her definition of gender was, gender is everything you think sex is everything you do. I'm not sure if that if that's quite sufficient. But it's, it's reasonably clear that gender is between your ears and sexes between your legs. Oh, by that? Okay, I like that that works. Okay, now for the foot. We're on this show. We talk about diversity in gender. And we talk about diversity and sexual orientation. And we talk about diversity in relationships. Assuming the audience has never heard of you before, talk a little bit about your relationship.

Well, Linda and I have been married 36 years, we'll be married 37 next month. I didn't know about the cross-dressing when we started dating, we met on a blind date. And then the top. Jim told me about Linda, before we got engaged. I really didn't understand it. That was back in the 50s. But I thought this was such a wonderful person that it really could not be that big a thing turned out to be a little bit more involved than I originally expected. But it's been fun. Linda told me before we got married that don't worry, you'll never be bored. And I've never been bored.

Now, see you so you knew before you were married? Yes, that's fairly uncommon isn't.



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It's quite uncommon. So many I counsel wives quite a bit around the country. And it's not unusual for them to find out after 15 or 20 years, that their husband cross dressers and they feel betrayed.



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Most of the cross dressers that I know, work very hard to make sure their wife doesn't know because their single biggest fear is that their wife finds out finds out, they're going to be divorced in the morning. That's right. And of

course, the best way to get divorced is to not tell her before you get married. And then when she finds out, she's for sure. Don't be upset about it. Well,

often, the CrossDresser before they get married, feels that getting married will make this go away. You know, he's not going to, it's not going to be prime in his mind. And it's something that we feels like when he has a family and a wife that this just simply won't be necessary. And it may not be at that exact point. But they'll after a few years possibly they'll get in a stressful situation. And it bounces back and at that point quite often they've had a child and they're scared to tell the wife and then it just snowballs from there. It just gets worse and worse and they put it off longer and longer. And it's it's pathetic. It's really sad.

Over this, and this really is as you probably realize, and understand this really is sort of a progressive thing. What man may not have been necessary when you were 20, when you get to be 40 becomes a necessity and think, Well, I'm tired of leading a lie, I'm tired of trying to be a male, when I'm not really a male. And so the next thing, you know, he's thinking about maybe the operation, maybe he thinks he's a transsexual, or maybe he thinks that he ought to go full time and live as a woman. We see a lot of that, and it really destroys families.

But it doesn't necessarily have to be progressive. I mean, I didn't know we were talking about before we started the show, I'm amazed at the number of people who will come into a gender group for the first time that come into a gulf coast transgender community meeting, for example. And I really want to stop them and say, Are you sure you really want to say that? Well, I



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want to start at the top of the totem pole, not at the bottom, that's a status thing. If I say I'm a T S or transsexual, then that's supposed to mean that I've already bypassed all the little minor things that I've already built myself up from the bottom nine with the top nine and transsexual, which in our somehow in our community has come to mean, the epidemic of, of

true. One of the things that that when I talk to therapists like Dr. Cole, is, I have made the comment to them, I guess I'm trying to explain here why I have not had the surgery myself. I'm very suspicious of the doctors. Number one, I'm very suspicious of the fact that in many cases, the gender clinic in the operating agency that is the hospital are connected. And I know this sounds crazy, but I occasionally think ask find myself asking, well, are these people working on commission or what? So So interesting question. So that that that sort of bothers me, I know, that's a really silly, but not necessarily appearance is not good. If a politician did that they'd be out to be out of office. That's the first thing that bothers me. The second thing is that it often that I have heard, therapists say, when a person comes out of surgery, oh, look at what I did. As if the person who went through this transition surgery was in material. As I get the impression they're playing, they're playing God. And that bothers me a lot. Yeah. Finally, I've known at least one person who died on the operating table. And I've known many other women who have gone through the surgery, who years down the line had very serious medical errors, serious physical problems. And so a lot of medical problems, we've seen a lot of suicides.

I told the doctor one time I said, You better have a real good reason. When you come at me with a knife. I said, after I die, you can cut me up all you want to but um, so as long as I'm alive, I don't really want you to come at me with a lot of our people that have had surgery eventually go back to living as males, which is another interesting we know a number I know we've gone back. 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The Texas tea party originally was named after ladies, teas that they used to give about the time, Bolton Park and Bolton Park were around and they have these Victorian era teas and everything. Then we use the word tea to encompass everybody, it seems like everybody in our communities named letter T, the letter T, which is transsexual, transvestite, transgendered, it can go on and on, and the T community as you know, some of our people call our community, the T community. So that's where it ended up as being the Tea Party T, just the letter t for all of us are our people. And it's the biggest gathering in the world of transgendered people. We usually have as many as 400 people, and we have 50% of those are usually couples 50%, we

try to keep our 5050 and 50% of the people that come our couples were the male cross dressers, we do have a couple sometimes of female to male. But as you know, it's very difficult to get them to come to anything like this. And they think we kind of think we're frivolous,



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very frivolous and foolish. Yeah.
