And you're going to hear them talk about how they knew they were transsexuals, how they came to realize how they came to realize what their life was about how they came to terms with it, and how they have survived. To my knowledge is the first time anything like this has ever been done anywhere in the country. I really, I sincerely hope that you will tune in for that. It is unique. It is we've really been granted a great privilege to be able to do that. And I hope that you will tune in for it. I also want to talk about the show next week, Jim Carper, a, you know, my co host, has disappeared and gone to Hawaii. Now I'm a short person and I would have fit into his luggage had he taken me, I would have fit in his carry on luggage I want you to understand. But I didn't get invited to Hawaii. instead.
