SUZANNE ANDERSON: Good evening, Suzanne Anderson of *TV Montrose*, and we're here at Empowered '98. And I'm here with my new co-host Dan DeLeon, welcome.

DAN DELEON: Peak and cruise, yes.

SUZANNE ANDERSON: The P&C.

DAN DELEON: The P&C. So without further ado, let's take a look at some of these vendors behind us and have a good time.

SUZANNE ANDERSON: Let's go. We talk about being everywhere, well, this is a great example. I'm here with Clyde Williams who is the past president of the Harris County Criminal Law Association. Welcome to Empower '98.

CLYDE WILLIAMS: Thank you.

SUZANNE ANDERSON: And what brought you here today?

CLYDE WILLIAMS: Well, I thought it was an excellent opportunity for me to expose myself as a professional to the community.

SUZANNE ANDERSON: Well, everybody knows in the community who Clyde Williams is. You've been an outstanding part of our community and a great contributor over it.

DAN DELEON: And what does this mean for y'all all to be here at Empower '98?

STACY RICH: Well, I think it's a great opportunity for us to get our name out there, our very recognizable logo with our t-shirts and our bumper stickers we've made. SUZANNE Seashell? What do y'all do? You don't go to the beach all the time, do you? Well, you might go to the beach.

ANDERSON:

SHELL OIL All we're just raising gay and lesbian concerns at the workplace.

REPRESENTATIVE

2:

SUZANNE Well, good we're glad you're here.

ANDERSON:

DAN DELEON: Good. That's a really worthwhile cause of promoting awareness of all peoples, including sexual orientation at Shell. Congratulations to you all. It is now time for our Community Mic, so let's see how many people we can sort of get on TV.

JASON VINCNIK: Pia, how important do you think it is to have a gay television station reporting on gay issues?

MAN 1: I think it's very important, and I really hope that *TV Montrose* will give the gay and lesbian community some exposure, some positive exposure in the Houston area to gay and lesbian people as well as heterosexual people. And I think it should and will have a positive impact.

WOMAN 1: I think it will help in the connectedness between each of our groups and give us all insight into what all is going on.

MAN 2: I think it would definitely allow us to have a community forum where the community as a whole can be able to reach out, and they'll do it-- and send this message out beyond just the Montrose area. And where the community holds the benefit from the communication factor.

MAN 3: I just like any exposure that we get is positive exposure, just as long as it's portrayed in a good light.

JASON VINCNIK: What advice would you give to our younger gays and lesbians in the community who are just now coming out?

MAN 4: Any advice that I'd give to any of young and younger gay and lesbians coming out, is just to be honest with themselves. Honesty is the best way to do it when you're coming out. It's the way I did it. Don't try to hide who you are, it's what you really feel.

JASON VINCNIK: But what advice would you give?

MAN 5: Just be yourself, be who you are, and don't try to be anything for anyone.

JASON VINCIC: It seems that there are a lot of events that are just all gay, or just all lesbian. Empower '98 seems to be one of those events where we're actually unified, we're working together. Do you guys have a take on this?

MAN 6: I think it's very important for the community to stand together as a whole, because as a whole it's a little bit harder to break us down, and to show the weaknesses in our community. So if we stand united, we stand on the common ground.

MAN 7: I mean, I think it's really important that we have these kind of events. And I think not only just gay and lesbian, but also communities of color as well. And I think to speak to the diversity is really important too. So this is just another great event to capitalize, to get other different organizations and companies together that normally wouldn't interact or collaborate with each other and have this opportunity here, so it's good.

JASON VINCIC: For Community Mic, this is Jason Vincik.

MAN 9: Yes, it is. We were trying to stay with our theme.

SUZANNE ANDERSON: What is your service?

MAN 9: Black tie service, blue jean comfortable. So where you get the best quality service, and you feel comfortable at the same time.

SUZANNE ANDERSON: There you go. You're on [INAUDIBLE] Mortgage Associates. Take care of your loans for your new houses. Thank you.

DAN DELEON: We're here visiting the PFLAG booth, and they're definitely one of my favorite organizations, not-for-profit organizations that are here at Empower '98. I have next to me at my right, Jean Edmonds, the co-president of the organization. Jean, can you tell us a little bit about the organization and your presence here today?

JEAN EDMONDS: Well, we're here to support families of gays and lesbians, helping families stay together. We advocate for our equal civil rights, and we educate the public about the myths and misinformation that they assume are facts.

STEVE BAKER: Hi, I'm Steve Baker and I'm here to Empower '98 with Anita Renteria who happens to be president at Houston Gay and Lesbian Chamber of Commerce.

ANITA RENTERIA: Hi, Steve.

STEVE BAKER: Anita is responsible in part as being president of the Chamber for Empower '98. What's it been like getting it together this year?

ANITA RENTERIA: Actually we have a committee headed by Debbie Finney that has done a great job of organizing this year's event. And it's a lot of hard work by a lot of people, especially Marian Pullman and [INAUDIBLE]. There are special people who stepped up and really made it happen. And I think it was a very successful event. So we're very proud.

STEVE BAKER: Yeah, it's been very nice. I've noticed a lot of great booths. The vendor participation has been really good. I noticed a new big names this year, Bank United.

ANITA RENTERIA: Right. Right, we're really happy about that. Our corporate sponsorship has increased year over year. SUZANNE ANDERSON: So you can look fine.

DAN DELEON: Not only is Empower '98 a venue for businesses to network and market their services, it is also an opportunity for worthwhile causes.

SUZANNE ANDERSON: And this year's beneficiary of Empower '98 is the lesbian and gay community center, so let's go take a look at the grand opening that's this weekend.

DAN DELEON: Great, let's go.

JASON VINCIC: We are here at the Houston Lesbian-Gay community center where we have drinks, munchies, food, and all kinds of exciting people waiting to see the first ribbon cutting for the Houston Gay and lesbian community center. As you can see they've taken on a very large establishment here, and they're all very excited as we are all very excited about the community center opening.

Let's go inside and take a look at what our community center has to offer.

DEBRA DANBURG: I want to congratulate everyone who has been involved with this. This was a long time coming. I really cannot recall a time when we were not working toward having a community center. And to have it now be a reality after so many years, so much money, so many dreams, is really, really meaningful.

As you all know my best friend for many years, Bill Ramsey, was trying to raise money and community awareness to get a community center going for about a decade, a decade and a half. And it just never quite took hold, but I think that this is a permanent, lasting, and new institution in our community. It's long overdue. It's well needed. It is a home for everyone here, and welcome to everybody. And thanks to all of you who did so much work to get it going. Thanks.

[CHEERING]

It's open.

ANNISE PARKER: This is a great day in Houston. Now I thought it had opened a while back, but since today's the grand opening celebration, I won't read all the proclamation, but suffice it to say that the city of Houston and Mayor Lee Brown officially welcome the Gay and Lesbian Community Center here into the family of Houston community centers.

And in acknowledgment of the role that the center plays in promotion and recognition of the human diversity in the Houston area, the city of Houston is pleased to extend best wishes to the-- I have a [INAUDIBLE] time today, I'm sorry. The Houston Lesbian and Gay Community Center on this auspicious occasion tonight.

MAN: Thank you.

[CHEERING]

We're especially pleased that Empower '98 was held yesterday and that the center was designated the beneficiary of that event. And then the publicity that came from that was just phenomenal.

ANITA RENTERIA: That's good. We're very pleased it was yesterday too. But Empower '98 was a business expo that the Chamber had. The Empower coordinator and committee chair, Debbie Finney, was unable to be here today, so on behalf of the Chamber, on behalf of Empower, we are thrilled to be able to present the community center who was our beneficiary and who inspired our slogan of building our community one brick at a time with a check for \$1,000.

JASON VINCIC: Carl, you've done an excellent job here by putting together the Lesbian and Gay Community Center, and we just want to know what exactly do you want to accomplish by putting together a Gay, Lesbian Community Center here?

CARL REIDL: The community center is a focal point for the gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender community, information, meeting space, programming.

JASON VINCICK: And what are some of the types of programs that are offered here?

CARL REIDL: We'll have a self-defense class starting November 14th, this Saturday. We have center cinema, we have HIV testing from the Montrose clinic, things of that nature. Making the community more accessible, either to the members of the community, or the community at large, to the community of gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender peoples.

JASON VINCICK: So, of course, we're reaching out to everyone in the community.

CARL REIDL: Of course.

JASON VINCICK: And there's lots of support from Annise Parker, Councilwoman, and other political figures here.

CARL REIDL: Yes, Annise is an advisory board member, and the city council amazingly supportive.

JASON VINCICK: Great. Well, thank you very much, Carl.

CARL REIDL: Thanks. And I understand you're looking for more volunteers to help out here?

JR. FUTCHER: Yes, we are. We have some exciting events, scheduled events that have already happened. We need the staffing, but we also need women to come in. And you come along and help support our events by way of we need help with publicity and doing outreach out to women's activities and organizations, which I've done a lot of. Carl and I have done a lot of that as well.

And we need programming. We've got some things that are developing with the art shows here. Center Cinema and things of that sort. We want to build on that. We've had events here at meetings, but we want to keep going with it, and then bring women involved as well.

JASON VINCICK: Wow, I can tell that our Lesbian and Gay Community Center is going to offer a lot to our gays and lesbians here in our community. From free testing from the Montrose clinic and self-defense classes, we have everything it takes to offer our community everything that we need. Until I see you again, at the Houston Lesbian Gay Community Center, I'm Jason Vincik for *TV Montrose*.

SUZANNE ANDERSON: As always, you can expect the unexpected as Suzanne Anderson Properties. And Lilly Katherine is doing astrology readings. How many have you done today, Lilly?

LILLY KATHERINE: I think 1,000 million, or so. Something like that.

SUZANNE ANDERSON: Have you? Our people are having a good time. They're liking it, though.

LILLY KATHERINE: They're loving it. I'm just talking and talking and talking, and they're listening.

SUZANNE ANDERSON: They are listening? That's always a good feeling. And some of my staff back here, say hello.

JACK VALENSKI: And we do lesbian and gay voices every Friday evening at 8:00 PM on KPFT 90.1 FM.

JOAN DEVLIN: And now you're about to see the community calendar.

SUZANNE Now you know what's happening in the community, and you can be a part of it. And speaking to communities, just back from China, Annise Parker, council member Annise Parker. Welcome.

ANNISE PARKER: Glad to be here. I'm glad I could talk to you today.

SUZANNE Have you rested up yet from that long trip?

ANDERSON:

ANNISE PARKER: No, I'm still suffering serious jet lag, but it was a wonderful trip. It was a good opportunity to travel on behalf of the city, but I took the chance to also take a vacation while I was over there, and I learned a lot about China and definitely want to go back someday.

SUZANNE Well, it's nice to know that there's some perks to the job, and we appreciate your coming in today. Thank you very, very much.

ANNISE PARKER: And I hope everybody out there is watching Montrose TV, or *TV Montrose*.

SUZANNE ANDERSON: There you go. One of the best community supporters we have is Maria Todd with 104 KRBE. She is always there when we ask for, and the community honored her recently in *Outsmart Magazine* by saying she was their favorite media person.

DAN DELEON: Favorite media person. Yes, she's been Grand Marshal of our parades. She's always visible within the community, and we really appreciate her support. And speaking of, Jason earlier got the opportunity to interview her.

SUZANNE ANDERSON: Let's go see Maria.

JASON VINCICK: Hi, Jason Vincik here at Empower '98, and I'm with Maria Todd.

MARIA TODD: Yes, you are.

JASON VINCICK: Yes, I am. Really we see you out in the gay community, a lot actually. Doing a lot of MCing for everyone, and we're just wondering is there a motivating factor, and what makes your help so much?

MARIA TODD: Speaking from a person-- I guess I'll just tell it like it is. Actually a lot of people in my life that have been very instrumental, have been gay. And it's just I feel like I need to give back to the community just because some of those people have helped me so much. I've had different bosses, friends, whoever, just in the past that have just done so much for me, and that's why. And besides what's to be afraid of?

JASON VINCICK: There's nothing to be afraid of.

MARIA TODD: Y'all got the better bars. Y'all got the better dancers, so you know. I like to hang. You've got the better fashions. You got good looking dance, so why wouldn't I be hanging out there?

JASON VINCICK: And we have the clothes.

MARIA TODD: And you have the clothes, so that's it. That's enough to bring me out. But no, that's why. And I also I would love to see them come up with a cure for AIDS, and I don't think anybody should run away from people that are HIV positive. So all those things bring me out in the community. I was really fortunate to get to host Halloween Magic this year. I had so much fun. This is my big plug. Please invite me back next year, OK? In case you're watching, but that was great. So.

JASON VINCICK: I mean, we really need a celebrity out in our community anyway, and I think you offer a lot of energy into our community. So it really helps us out a lot, so.

MARIA TODD: Well thank you very much. I'm glad to be able to do what I can. I'll see y'all at the Pride Parade, which I think is wonderful. And I'm so glad you made it at night now, so it's not hotter than the hitches of H-E double hockey sticks. Much more fun.

JASON VINCICK: All right, Maria Todd.

MARIA TODD: It's the double hockey sticks, isn't it? Thank you, Jason. Thank you.

JASON VINCICK: Maria Todd, everybody.

SUZANNE ANDERSON: I don't know about the rest of you, but I am tired. I've been walking these booths. I got my shoes off. It's been a long fun day.

DAN DELEON: She does have her shoes off. We just want to mention before we close, we are starting something new, a community person of the month. We're giving you, the viewers, the opportunity to pick a person that is active in the community and that is really involved in making a difference.

SUZANNE ANDERSON: And also remember that in November you get production free for all new advertisers. That's really, really a break, so be sure-- and if you're thinking about advertising with us, now's the time to do it. Also coming up we want to let you know, if you're having a party and you would like *TV Montrose* to be a part of it, we'll bring the crew over.

SUZANNE ANDERSON: These people who wouldn't say a [BLEEP] word, will not shut up.

MAN 11: OK.

SUZANNE ANDERSON: They can't hear you.

DAN DELEON: Gonna take it now to our segment called Open Mic or Mic something. What is it called?
