And I read about them in Thing, and I thought they were cool. And well, the station had the CD, so there we go. We only have a couple of minutes left and I wanted to read something that I found real, to be really important. It's from a broadsheet that Jimmy got when he was in San Francisco called "Why I Hated the March in Washington," and it was put up put up by a group called QUASH, which stands for Queers United Against Straight-acting Homosexuals. And I'm reading this ex--part called "Assimilation is Killing Us, Fight for United Queer Front." Let's see. Now more than ever, we need a united front. Fierce battles have won us some space from which to launch further struggles for liberation. However, as we move into uncharted territory, demanding equal opportunities and justice, there are those who wish to stop us in our tracks. And some of those blanking us over are living amongst us. Who needs heterosexual society to keep on us, to keep us hating ourselves, fighting each other, and groveling for crumbs. The racism, sexism, classism, and internalized homophobia within our own communities devastates us more than the vicious attacks from the likes of Anita Bryant, Jesse Helms, George Bush and Sam Nunn, a simulation is killing us, we are falling into a trap. Some of us adopt an apologetic stance, stating, that's just the way I am read. I'd be straight if I could. And this pattern, their behavior in such a way as to mimic heterosexual society, so as to minimize the glaring differences between us and them. No matter how much you make blanking your lover is still illegal in nearly half of the states. Getting a corporate job, a fierce car and a condo does not protect you from dying of AIDS or getting your head bashed in by Neo-Nazis. The myth of assimilation must be shattered. We not only change our behavior to fit their rules, we also police the behavior of our own sisters and brothers. I was sick to my stomach when shirtless gay men complained about those big bad dyles at the March in Washington that took their shirts off and hurt the movement. Why don't you get over your lesbophobic selves. I'm ready to vomit when I read personal ad searching for straight acting gay men. Why don't you just be straight? We'd be better off without you and your insecurities. The truth of the matter is that the good queer, back queer economy makes us all more vulnerable to homophobic attacks when we don't behave the way they want us to. Sexist homophobic heterosexuals would rather us, would rather us to fulfill our prescribed gender roles as men degrading, beating and raping women, and women dressing and acting to please men remaining silent. When we fail to challenge heterosexism at every opportunity, we're tightening the noose around our necks. When we minimize our own sexualities, we're implying that our lives our, our identities are merely a second rate lifestyle. It's not a lifestyle, it's my life. We chant "Shantay, shantay," but how many of us would stop for even a quick queer second if we

saw RuPaul being beaten to a bloody pulp by the cops. We love the queer other when we, when they entertain us, but don't give a blank about them when they live a few miles from us in Robert Taylor homes, gay men maligned as sissies turned around and stabbed lesbians in the back. Gay men, by large don't give a blank about the devastating effects of cancer in the lesbian community. Lesbians have fought selflessly against AIDS but have been attacked by gay men who claimed dykes are trying to dominate the movement. With gratitude, queer professionals and business people tend to ignore the fact that we're not all affluent. On that note, having a lesbian CEO, or a gay corporate lawyer, does not make me feel any more liberated nor are queer yuppies making the streets any safer for anyone. Nor does this help the millions of poor queers to whom the American Dream is a nightmare. Oppressed as homos, we oppress each other. This is especially ironic because the struggles of other communities, especially people of color, and women have been absolutely crucial for the queer movement. The Civil Rights Movement was a training ground for many gay and lesbian activists and provided inspiration for countless other queers, lesbians and gay men of college, from the Puerto Rican drag queens, to [unintelligible], to Ortez Alderson have been and continue to be unsung heroes in the struggles of queer liberation. The feminist movement has challenged oppression rooted in our current gender system. Lesbians were central to this movement and continued to play indispensable roles in queer activism. And particularly important is the absolutely critical leadership of lesbians in the fight against AIDS despite the sexism of many gay men.
