first Pride celebrations in Moscow and Leningrad only two weeks before the attempted coup and while communications have been difficult, commission members report both that the coup posed a special threat to gays and lesbians, and that they acted to resist it on taking power on August 19. One of the first statements made by the Coos acting president cannot even if was a declaration that quote immoral elements threatened stability. This was perceived as a direct threat that left gay and lesbian activists expecting arrest at any moment. Other cool officials visited Moscow's AIDS clinic on August 20 and demanded a list of patients names. The San Francisco based international gay and lesbian human rights commission established a Moscow office earlier this year, staffed by tumble store if you The commission was able to provide Moscow gay and lesbian rights activist Roman Cullinan with a computer system along with funds to pay duties leveled on it by customs equivalent to six times the average USSR workers annual salary. This system proved to be the only one accessible during the coup, and Kalinin and bolster have made good use of it, putting a handwritten transcript of Boris Yeltsin's proclamation against the coup into printed form. With the photocopier in bold stores, apartment, activists were able to run off 4000 copies of the Yeltsin decree stamped with the name of Kalinin scan lesbian newsletter tamer, the copies were posted on walls and distributed in the streets to soldiers in tanks as well as to the anti coup resistance.
