[JAZZ MUSIC]

JIMMY CARPER: Hello, Houston in College Station and Sarasota, Florida and somewhere up there in New Hampshire, especially. And welcome to *After Hours*, queer radio with attitude. I'm Jimmy Carper. I will be your producer for this evening. And let's see here. That music that you heard, no, that was not an extension of the *Acid Jazz Show*. That was out lesbian jazz performer, Patricia Barber, from her 1992 album called *A Distortion Of Love*. And that was, of course, "You Stepped Out of a Dream."

The reason that I played that, not only because it's really, really good music, is that Patricia Barber is in town this week.

BOBBY PHATS: Oh, cool.

JIMMY CARPER: Yes, indeedy. Yes. And she is going to be playing Wednesday, September the 26th at the Sambuca Jazz Cafes. And that is at 909 Texas Avenue, Downtown.

BOBBY PHATS: There's a lot of things happening downtown nowadays.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, and she's got two shows, one at 6:30 and one at 9 o'clock. So cool. If you work downtown, you can just stay after work, grab a bite, go over and see Patricia. Or if you don't live or work downtown, have dinner and see her 9 o'clock show.

Tickets are what they normally are for something like this, but a whole evening of music like that. Can you imagine?

BOBBY PHATS: Well, I could live with a little music like that.

JIMMY CARPER: Hey, Bobby. How you doing?

BOBBY PHATS: Hey, how's it going?

JIMMY CARPER: OK.

BOBBY PHATS: What's up?

JIMMY CARPER: Oh, let's see.

BOBBY PHATS: Should I light them?

JIMMY CARPER: Oh, yes.

BOBBY PHATS: And should I let the crowd in?

JIMMY CARPER: Oh, not yet.

BOBBY PHATS: OK, good.

JIMMY CARPER: I've got some opening music for the crowd yet. So I do have a couple of--

BOBBY PHATS: And I've brought him along too.

JIMMY CARPER: I see, yes. Ryan is here. Yes.

BOBBY PHATS: Ryan is here.

JIMMY CARPER: Yes, he is. He's becoming our second official unofficial-- he's the unofficial unofficial go now, so you're the official unofficial go.

BOBBY PHATS: Try saying that five times fast.

JIMMY CARPER: We want to say hellos to Junior out there, who I know is listening because the HATCH folks are on tonight, all of the Randys, and there's so many, the T Man, if he's out there listening. And want to remind you that Whispering Hope over there, that's the resale shop, is still open Friday and Saturdays now from 11:00 till 5:00.

So you missed it this week, and perhaps, you can make it next week. They're the best resale shop in town. And that is located West at Richmond at Jack Street, 515, I believe it is.

BOBBY PHATS: Yep. Just down the block from the Council Center.

JIMMY CARPER: There you go. A couple of other things I want to tell you. Oh, and congratulations to our community's own Rainbow D Clown.

BOBBY PHATS: Ah-oh, what he--

JIMMY CARPER: Best of Houston in the *Houston Press* has voted Rainbow D Clown the best Easter Bunny ever.

BOBBY PHATS: Yeah, hey.

JIMMY CARPER: He had that gig at the Galleria with-- yeah, they had a really nice little short write up about him. And let's see.

BOBBY PHATS: I was in that once. It was cool. They did the best open mic poetry thing. Last year, they voted The Mausoleum best open mic poetry, and they mentioned my name. So that was cool.

JIMMY CARPER: Great. Now, Monday night is a big night for entertainment because Christy Claxton is still at The Outpost, which is in the 1400, 1500 block of Richmond Avenue. That's a nice little neighborhood tavern. She's there every Monday this month from 6:30 to 8:30.

And I believe that's also the fourth Monday of the month, which means it's time again for Queer Music Heritage with JD Doyle. And that comes on 9 o'clock right on this station. That's the second half of Lesbian and Gay Voices for the fourth Monday. Lesbian and Gay Voices heard every Monday 8:00 to 10:00 and on the fourth Monday, JD at 9:00.

BOBBY PHATS: I visited that show recently.

JIMMY CARPER: Good for you.

BOBBY PHATS: I actually visited that show. I did a little thing for Pagan Pride Day and talking about Pagan Pride Day, which is tomorrow.

JIMMY CARPER: Yes, it is. Yes, it is. It's also Celebrate Bisexuality Day.

BOBBY PHATS: There you go.

JIMMY CARPER: Yes, it is.

BOBBY PHATS: All kinds of good stuff happening.

JIMMY CARPER: And that kind of works in because a lot of pagans--

BOBBY PHATS: --especially considering who are--

JIMMY CARPER: For some reason, I don't know.

BOBBY PHATS: Our resident bisexual center of the universe, otherwise known as--

JIMMY CARPER: GG.

BOBBY PHATS: GG is very pagan.

RYAN: And I personally know a bisexual pagan. She is my great soul mate, Amanda Hull. Yeah, she's in South Carolina right now.

JIMMY CARPER: She could be listening.

BOBBY PHATS: Yes, she could.

RYAN: She could be I hope she is.

BOBBY PHATS: Anything is possible.

JIMMY CARPER: Or her neighbors could be. Now, you've outed her.

RYAN: Oh, my god. No, you don't want to know if her neighbors are listening. Oh, my god, bad.

JIMMY CARPER: What's the connection between pagans and bisexuality?

RYAN: I don't know. It's just--

JIMMY CARPER: Well, it's just that the person who does are bisexual show is also pagan.

BOBBY PHATS: Rock on.

JIMMY CARPER: And she's very pagan. She's very bisexual.

BOBBY PHATS: Yeah, but it's like I'm kind of pregnant.

JIMMY CARPER: Actually, she's just kind of sexual. Period. I mean, I think it's sort of omni, I think. And that's true. Yeah, he is all of that. But he has made the comment that many, many pagans, a higher percentage of pagans are bisexual than in the general population, so it seems to him. This is true.

RYAN: To be pagan, you have to be free with yourself.

JIMMY CARPER: There you go.

RYAN: Honestly, you do.

JIMMY CARPER: I think so.

BOBBY PHATS: Very free.

JIMMY CARPER: I think so. Let's see. Let's see. Let's see. A couple of other things before we put on the HATCH intro music.

RYAN: Right?

JIMMY CARPER: Yes.

BOBBY PHATS: And he's waiting.

RYAN: He is waiting.

BOBBY PHATS: --on the desk.

JIMMY CARPER: Desperately, impatiently, I might add. Gosh, we'll talk about all of this stuff later because we're running late, and so we've been running our mouths.

RYAN: Anyway, OK. Time for the HATCH--

BOBBY PHATS: Stuff happens.

RYAN: --opening music.

JIMMY CARPER: And what is it, Tommy?

TOMMY It's Tori.

DARDAR:

RYAN: Tori.

BOBBY PHATS: Tori, doing--

TOMMY I forget what song it is?

DARDAR:

JIMMY CARPER: OK. A great song about Tori. You're going to love it. It's off of her brand new CD, isn't it?

TOMMY No, this one's is not off her brand new CD, but we're playing two songs off of her brand new CD tonight.
DARDAR:

JIMMY CARPER: Great. Great. This is Tori night.

DARDAR:

BOBBY PHATS: I can tell.

JIMMY CARPER: Sometimes, that's a good thing.

BOBBY PHATS: Yes, it is.

JIMMY CARPER: OK, we'll be right back. You're listening to *After Hours*, queer radio with attitude on KPFT Houston and KEOS College Station.

STEVEN: We fight crime.

TOMMY Right. What's this?
DARDAR:

STEVEN: OK, I have this.

TOMMY All right. HATCH meets every Friday night, every Sunday night of every week. On Friday nights, we meet at 7

STEVEN: Right.

TOMMY And if you would like to get in touch with us today, here on *After Hours*, the number is 713-526-5738 or 713-526-
DARDAR: KPFT. I love that sign.

I'm Tommy. I'm your host with the most or some stuff like that. We got kind of a full booth today.

STEVEN: How are you doing?

TOMMY Today with me, I have co-hosting Steven, so his first time on the show. Are you excited?
DARDAR:

STEVEN: I'm really excited. All new to me, so this is the first time on the radio, period.

TOMMY Rock on. All right, and then I'll let y'all go by y'all selves on the booth.
DARDAR:

DAN: I'm Dan.

RYAN: He's the man. Hi, that was dorky. Hi, I'm Ryan. How are you doing? Yeah.

LOU ANN: Yeah, and I'm Lou Ann. Hello, everybody.

DAVID: David Go Cougs.

RYAN: Cougs suck. They're going get their butt kicked.

STEVEN: Right.

TOMMY In the third quarter.
DARDAR:

RYAN: Yeah, third quarter, one quarter away from dying.

TOMMY We were winning when Shaun called.

DARDAR:

RYAN: You were lied to, sir.

TOMMY No. I don't know. I heard it on the news too. It was like 20 to--

DARDAR:

RYAN: UC is going to win. Come on.

TOMMY Only, your partial to UT.

DARDAR:

RYAN: It doesn't matter. You don't know anything about football to know that UC is going to win.

STEVEN: Hey, may I remind you that we are on a gay radio station.

TOMMY All right, that's too butch for Ryan?

DARDAR:

RYAN: Hey, this is the butch quarter.

STEVEN: Ryan, it's not like know when football is about comets. Right?

DAN: Besides, we have three Republicans here today.

TOMMY That's right.

DARDAR:

DAVID: Hell, yeah.

TOMMY Republicans sound off.

DARDAR:

DAVID: Hell, yeah, 1,

RYAN: 2.

DAN: 3.

DAVID: Hey.

RYAN: Hey, that was kind of-- that was kind of random.

DAVID: Cricket. Cricket. Cricket. Cricket.

RYAN: So what are we talking about today?

TOMMY Giraffe. Giraffe. I'll let Ryan cover that because he has our notes.

DARDAR:

RYAN: All right. Well, before we get into that, let's talk about the-- Lou Ann actually an excellent idea. Lou Ann, why don't you tell us what we're going to talk about.

LOU ANN: Yeah, I was thinking we could talk about the convention that we went to today.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Hey, that would be a good idea.

LOU ANN: Because Tommy, Dan, Ryan, myself, and Carol and AJ went to a convention today.

STEVEN: A convention?

LOU ANN: Yes, a convention.

STEVEN: What was this convention went?

LOU ANN: It was at the George R. Brown Convention Center.

STEVEN: And what does this Convention Center look like?

LOU ANN: It looks like a giant ship.

STEVEN: A spaceship, like red dwarf or one that sits in the water?

LOU ANN: No, one of those giant cruise barges from maybe the '40s. I'm not sure.

RYAN: Oh, this is true.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Arrr, arrr, matey.

DAVID: I'm pretty sure they've seen it on the news lately.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Yeah, you may have seen the George R. Brown Convention Center. You may have. It's really small.

DAN: You fly by of it.

TOMMY
DARDAR: It's one of those hole-in-the-wall places not many people know about.

RYAN: So we went, and we educated youth about HIV and AIDS issues.

LOU ANN: We had to talk about elementary school kids about HIV.

RYAN: Did anybody else find that difficult too?

LOU ANN: It was very difficult.

RYAN: And when the fourth grader said breast milk, I almost died.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Right. That was so funny. I was like, holy jeez. Adults don't even know that sometimes.

LOU ANN: They were very well educated, or at least they were by the end of--

DAVID: The young ones were. The older kids were kind of-- they were just being. What schools came? All from around?

RYAN: I'm not sure how that-- There were some of these, like there was this private school that helps-- OK, bad children, to put it lightly. Like kids that repeatedly get kicked out of school, they get sent to this private school, and--

DAVID: Alternative.

RYAN: But this school is freaking amazing. They teach these elementary school kids' college-level work.

DAVID: Japanese. Russian.

RYAN: This little 11-year-old just started busting out with all the presidents in order--

DAVID: It was kind of random.

RYAN: --from like Washington all the way up to Bush, and he just set it in 10 seconds. It was quite impressive, not that that's going to get you into Stanford or anything, but it's a good start.

DAVID: Yeah, and then she forgot one, and she was like--

RYAN: Yes, she did. And she totally chastised by like Boom Boom Jackson.

STEVEN: But overall, did y'all enjoy the conference?

LOU ANN: It was all right.

DAVID: It was all right. It was highly organized.

LOU ANN: Yeah. So you did a good job on the panel, Tommy.

TOMMY
DARDAR: By the one question that was asked.

DAVID: And you didn't even answer it.

LOU ANN: Yeah.

TOMMY
DARDAR: No, there was two questions.

DAVID: You didn't answer it though.

TOMMY
DARDAR: No, one chick that I was like, hey, thanks for educating us, blah, blah, blah. And then there was somebody who asked what schools do we go to, and if we go to schools.

DAVID: You can't call an eight-year-old who says thanks for educating us a chick.

TOMMY
DARDAR: She wasn't eight. She was one of the high school kids.

DAVID: No. No one over the age of nine said thank you.

TOMMY No, she was one of-- no.

DARDAR:

DAVID: Tommy, I was there.

TOMMY OK, she wasn't saying thank you.

DARDAR:

STEVEN: Calling her a chick is not something you do anyway.

DAVID: Yeah. What's wrong with you?

TOMMY It was one of the kids from the Covenant House--

DARDAR:

DAVID: Oh, that one girl with the stuff and the thing and the-- yeah.

RYAN: The girl with the face?

DAVID: Yeah.

RYAN: Yeah, that one. I know who you're talking about. The girl with the face. We're nice.

DAVID: Yeah, she had one.

RYAN: Welcome to HATCH. We're the most politically correct radio show on radio.

DAVID: If you're listening, girl with the face, we'd like to apologize for Ryan's choice of words there.

TOMMY Yeah. You may email Ryan. Send all complaints to-- all right, so oh, we actually do have a couple of

DARDAR: announcements today.

STEVEN: We do. Why don't I go ahead and say what those are. The Women's Festival, which, Tommy, which I take is exaggerate on the Women's Festival.

TOMMY Women's Festival.

DARDAR:

STEVEN: As opposed to chick's festival?

TOMMY Yeah, right.

DARDAR:

STEVEN: Them really cool, super fat chicks there. Super extra ultra, extra super girls, they're having their festival on October 27, so everyone who wants to go out and support women for being women--

DAVID: OK, whoa. The we are announcing this Women's Festival--

STEVEN: Is because of the all important reason that Tommy--

TOMMY Sarah Golden, the wonderful, was on our show last month, is going to be singing there also. In fact, I think she's

DARDAR: going to call in today too. She's expected to--

LOU ANN: She's going to play a song over the phone?

TOMMY
DARDAR: No, but she sang to me last night.

LOU ANN: Awe. That's sweet.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Anyway. And our second announcement we have is the HATCH car wash is going to be on September 29 from 10:00 to 2:00 PM. Is it going to be at Mary's?

STEVEN: Hopefully.

DAVID: Carol was trying to talk to them to get that set up. I overheard that last time.

TOMMY
DARDAR: So tentatively think Mary's. Everyone just rush to Mary's on September 29 anyway.

DAVID: Don't go in there, for heaven's sake.

RYAN: But if you decide to go in, hey, it's your prerogative.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Yeah, it is.

RYAN: It's a car wash/bake sale. We will have--

TOMMY
DARDAR: Cookies.

RYAN: --cookies while your car gets washed.

DAVID: Soaking cookies.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Yes. Lots of pretty boys in beaters.

DAN: Don't make me say it. Get your cookies while you're get your car washed, is that it?

STEVEN: That was awful.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Good job, Dan. Anyway, OK.

STEVEN: Who needs catchphrases? This is 2001.

DAVID: Yeah.

STEVEN: OK. So anything else?

TOMMY
DARDAR: I think that does it for the announcement.

STEVEN: That does it for the announcements.

TOMMY
DARDAR: All right. We have Dan's new voicemail number.

DAN: I'm just kidding. You can just scratch that out.

RYAN: Do not scratch that out.

STEVEN: It was used a scratch paper, so I was trying to be funny. Anyway. OK. Let's see, Tommy, tell us what we're talking about today.

TOMMY
DARDAR: We are talking about gay student support groups, social groups. It's geared towards students, basically, of mostly college age and then HATCH and GSAs for high school.

DAN: Tommy you've been attending one at North Harris Montgomery County College, haven't you, recently?

TOMMY
DARDAR: Yes. North Harris Community College. Yes. North Harris has a support group called the Gay and Lesbian and Other Students in Support.

STEVEN: It's called GLOSS.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Yeah, GLOSS.

RYAN: Like that Chinese film stuff you get when you clean your--

LOU ANN: Like Dan's nails.

DAN: Yeah.

STEVEN: Your nails are gorgeous.

TOMMY
DARDAR: No. OK. You'll notice that right here on our list, no tapping of mics. It has been specifically laid out. This is now a rule from now on, by the way.

RYAN: Did Tara invent that?

TOMMY
DARDAR: Yes. Madam--

LOU ANN: So everybody out there listening, no tapping mics.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Hey, why don't we-- what's the other one? Oh, yeah, I already know the other one.

STEVEN: This is just for us, not for the reviewing audience. So that's fine. All right, so what else about GLOSS?

TOMMY
DARDAR: GLOSS, I guess they meet every other Thursday, as what I was told. What are the teachers called that's--

STEVEN: The advisors.

TOMMY Yeah, the advisors. Sorry, I'm new to this college stuff. Her name is Janice Hargrove or something.

DARDAR:

STEVEN: Janice Hargrove-Freile, actually.

TOMMY Yeah, she's extremely nice. She's very hippie chick. She's great.

DARDAR:

STEVEN: Yeah. That's cool.

TOMMY Yeah. And then the president, his name is Patrick. He's nice too.

DARDAR:

STEVEN: Don't go into Patrick.

TOMMY Anyway, this organization is at North Harris College, which is part of a big community college chain in

DARDAR: Northeastern. And I went to Kingwood College, which was part of it. And so this organization can actually be done at all four of the colleges.

So if you are trapped up in Kingwood somewhere, stranded out in Tumble, or happen to be up in the Woodlands, you can start it as well up there.

DAVID: Is it Woodland? Do they go to--

STEVEN: The Woodlands is Montgomery College.

DAVID: That's what I though.

STEVEN: So if you're up there and you're listening, you can go ahead, the district will let you start that club there, so if you wanted to get involved.

DAN: So why did you never join this club while you were [INAUDIBLE] a coach, Ryan?

RYAN: I had to uphold my young Republican status.

DAN: I see.

TOMMY Rock on.

DARDAR:

RYAN: Yeah.

TOMMY So anyway, do we want to go and talk about some other organizations that are around?

DARDAR:

STEVEN: Yeah, why don't we go ahead and do that. I have the number for the NHC GLOSS.

TOMMY Oh, really?

DARDAR:

STEVEN: You want to say it?

RYAN: Yes.

STEVEN: I don't know the number either. Do you know the number? I will think it to you. How about that?

TOMMY
DARDAR: I'll just hold it up. Everyone look. There we go.

RYAN: Yeah.

TOMMY
DARDAR: OK, the number, like I said, it's going to be Professor Janice Hargrove-Freile, and her phone number is going to be 281-618-5526. You can give her a call and ask her about it.

DAVID: Hey, I bet you I know her email address.

TOMMY
DARDAR: I bet you do.

JIMMY CARPER: It's JaniceHargrove@nhmccd.edu. All right.

TOMMY
DARDAR: There you go. Yeah, I'm going try to call her, folks, because that would probably be pretty hard. Hey. Anyway, some other college organizations that we have, University of Houston has Global.

STEVEN: Hey, David, you want to--

TOMMY
DARDAR: Yeah, David, you're a University of Houston resident. Why don't you tell us about Global? As much as you know. School just started. Be nice.

STEVEN: Be nice.

DAVID: I know. That's why I wasn't going to say anything. I heard that the more into the year you get, the more people go, and it ends up being like 50 people at the end of the year.

STEVEN: How many people are there right now?

DAVID: I heard there was like-- Sean told us like five or something like that.

TOMMY
DARDAR: That's OK. There was four at the GLOSS meeting.

DAVID: How many thousands of people go to U of H?

DAN: It's rather sad.

DAVID: Well, it's no Austin and all of it's--

DAN: Oh, I'll talk about Austin. I was going say.

DAVID: [INAUDIBLE] people.

DAN: Still, we have our little gay ghetto down here.

DAVID: I'll do an undercover report, and next time on the radio, I'll tell you all about it.

STEVEN: We expect that. It will be due.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Yes. So folks, tune in and wait.

DAVID: I'll have a little camera with the glasses.

LOU ANN: So you can show the pictures on our show. Yeah.

TOMMY
DARDAR: And I hate how people forget-- well, I think I like it when people forget that this is a radio show.

STEVEN: We can describe it.

TOMMY
DARDAR: To a Global-- Global has its own website. You can go to University of Houston web page and go to the Student Organizations and find Global, or you can go to uh.edu/~global, and then that little funky dash tilde thing, and then global. And so that's the Global website. So go check it out, anyone who goes to University of Houston.

DAVID: Unless you've been there in the last month and unless they've updated in the last month, it's like a year old, so it's a page long.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Yeah, I imagine so. Last time I looked at it, it hadn't been updated.

DAVID: 24th. The 24th is Friday.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Yeah, I just looked at the page today, and it looked the same as I did about a year ago. So OK. Let's see, UT Austin, not that this place reaches Austin, but for those of you who are back to the weekend like me-- and Daniel, UT Austin has their own. It is the LBGSA. And it's the Lesbian Bi Gay and Straight-- no, my bad. Rewind.

It's the Lesbian Bi Gay Students Association. That's what it is. And they have a pretty easy one, it's lbgsa.org, and they're pretty active on campus. I haven't seen them do anything yet, but they're pretty active because I've seen pictures. They do National Coming Out Day stuff and Pride Week. They're pretty active, as with everything is.

STEVEN: That's mean.

TOMMY Yeah, why don't you be mean to me?

DARDAR:

DAVID: You want me to be mean to you?

TOMMY No.

DARDAR:

DAN: There's not much difference there.

TOMMY OK, and there's also another organization at UT. It's just being started up, and I'm actually joining it. It's a

DARDAR: fraternity, and it's called Delta Lambda Phi, and a friend of Daniel's and I--

RYAN: Oh, he's going to be a frat boy.

TOMMY Yeah, it's the only National Gay.

DARDAR:

LOU ANN: Do they have a handshake?

TOMMY I don't know if they have a handshake. I can get back to you on that.

DARDAR:

DAVID: It takes about five minutes to perform.

TOMMY Yeah.

DARDAR:

STEVEN: What do you have to do to get into this frat?

TOMMY What do we have to do?

DARDAR:

STEVEN: Yeah.

TOMMY I have to say I am now taking over this fraternity, which is basically how I would go about it doing it.

DARDAR:

STEVEN: Is just like me with GLOSS?

DAVID: Mine is going in with the view to take over the vice presidency.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Yeah. Apparently, I've heard that the vice president of this organization--

STEVEN: Do they haze you?

TOMMY
DARDAR: Huh?

STEVEN: Do they hate you?

TOMMY
DARDAR: No, they don't haze. They won't haze.

STEVEN: That would be funny.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Well, first of all, they're just getting their charters started, so there's no way they're going to try to screw it up.

STEVEN: [INAUDIBLE].

TOMMY
DARDAR: Right.

DAVID: Oh, no.

STEVEN: Ryan's all wet. How do we forbid that?

TOMMY
DARDAR: Been there. So yeah. Anyway, you can reach their website by going to www.dlp.org. And that is the Delta Lambda Phi. They're the National Gay Fraternity, and hopefully, there'll be some more popping up every once in a while. But they're straight included as well. They don't discriminate on sexual orientation. And we'll get to all that sort of thing in a sec.

And let's see. Oh, did you want to talk about the Bellaire GSA?

STEVEN: Yeah, why don't we go into that.

TOMMY
DARDAR: You go ahead because you know about that one.

STEVEN: My sources have told me, as of last year, they started a GSA in Bellaire. I have not heard of any other GSAs in the city of Houston other than at Bellaire.

LOU ANN: Yeah, that's the only one in HISD. I don't know about anywhere else, but in HISD, that's the only one.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Which is a big step for HISD, actually. So we applaud them.

LOU ANN: Yeah.

TOMMY With the golf clap.

DARDAR:

DAVID: Golf clap. Golf clap.

DAN: Actually, in our meeting with PFLAG, that's what I went today, we did a planning of the PFLAG of where PFLAG is going. And the big thing was to get into HISD and talk about and kind of advocate and stuff with that.

DAVID: Infiltration.

STEVEN: And take it over.

RYAN: So do they still have a straight president in this GSA? Do you know?

TOMMY No, I don't.

DARDAR:

RYAN: All right. As of last year, I knew there was a straight president.

DAVID: Not that that would matter, of course.

RYAN: Because it is a Gay-Straight Alliance.

DARDAR:

STEVEN: So any more organizations, Tommy?

TOMMY Oh, this little one. I don't think you guys have heard of it. It's called HATCH. Yeah, I don't really know what it stands for. We don't like it. Oh, no. No, we don't like to very much, do we?

DARDAR:

RYAN: I hate HATCH.

TOMMY Yeah, me too.

DARDAR:

LOU ANN: So back to reality.

RYAN: Yeah, things that really matter.

TOMMY Anyway, HATCH like if you want to go, they have a website at HATCHYouth.org.

DARDAR:

LOU ANN: Which hasn't been updated.

TOMMY It hasn't been updated, however, it will be updated. My Daniel is updating that web page as we speak.

DARDAR:

DAN: Yes, I am.

TOMMY And it's going to look quite lovely. We just need to get the content up, and it should be up pretty soon.

DARDAR:

DAN: It's absolutely fab-tabulous.

TOMMY Yeah, it's really improved.

DARDAR:

RYAN: I didn't know you were doing that, Dan.

DAN: Yes, I am.

TOMMY Dan, are you doing that in Austin, or are you--

DARDAR:

DAN: I'm doing it wherever I am. Yeah, it's fun.

TOMMY That's pretty cool.

DARDAR:

DAN: If you had hung around in the library, I would have shown you it, but you ran away.

STEVEN: I'm sorry. Like everybody in their dog kept calling me today.

DAN: No. No, Tommy, dogs don't have thumbs. They cannot pick up a phone.

RYAN: You don't need a thumb to call.

TOMMY You need a thumb to hold the phone.

DARDAR:

DAN: Speaker phone.

RYAN: That's the stuff going into--

STEVEN: Control.

TOMMY Wow. Hey there. Anyway So those are just some examples of some student gay youth organizations that we

DARDAR: have, at least at our disposal and not too far of a distance. Let's see. Now, I guess we can talk about what makes these--

RYAN: That's my mom.

TOMMY Hey.

DARDAR:

STEVEN: You want to take a phone line?

TOMMY Yes, we are. And y'all will love this woman. This woman is the best woman I have ever met in my life.

DARDAR:

RYAN: She's your mother. Don't you have to say that?

CINDY: Hello.

TOMMY
DARDAR: And my mom is on air.

CINDY: Hey.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Hi, Mom.

CINDY: Tom, website.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Website.

CINDY: Yeah. I heard someone mention website.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Yes, we did.

CINDY: Oh. Well, good. It's just to reminder call.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Just a reminder call. I love my mom.

DAN: I bet she-- I spoke to Carol about it. She's going to get me stuff. Because it's all finished. I just need information from you and Carol, and it's all done.

CINDY: OK. OK, good. I have the information.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Do you want to tell her where she can go look at it to actually see it?

DAN: Do you think that's a good idea, Cindy?

CINDY: Huh?

DAN: Just asked if it's a good idea for me to--

TOMMY
DARDAR: Or you can write it down, and they can tell her.

DAN: OK. I'll give you, Tommy, the--

CINDY: OK, good.

TOMMY
DARDAR: So Mom, you're very bad at returning phone calls today.

CINDY: I've been gone all day.

TOMMY Well, I called, and dad answered the phone. I was like, OK, get mom to call me.
DARDAR:

CINDY: I have a life.

TOMMY When did that happen?
DARDAR:

CINDY: I don't know, but I did call, and your phone wasn't on, and David called and said your phone wasn't on.

DAVID: Yeah.

CINDY: And Desiree called and said your phone wasn't on.

DAVID: You said you would call me. I waited by that phone all day.

TOMMY It's not my fault that you have no life.
DARDAR:

DAN: Heartbroken.

CINDY: That's David.

TOMMY Right?
DARDAR:

CINDY: Yeah.

TOMMY All right. Hey, Mom, why don't you introduce yourself, and why you're able to call this HATCH youth line, and why
DARDAR: you're so happy with me being gay and--

RYAN: We love you so much.

TOMMY How have I affected your life, Mom?
DARDAR:

CINDY: Oh, god, you give me gray hairs every day.

RYAN: Oh, whatever.

CINDY: No, I'm on the board of HATCH.

TOMMY What is your job?
DARDAR:

CINDY: Right now, I'm president pro tem, and I'm the head of the Programming Outreach Committee. And what else? I just like, I'm there.

TOMMY She's HATCH Mom.
DARDAR:

RYAN: Yes, she is.

STEVEN: Yes, she is.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Everybody loves my mom. I love that.

CINDY: Anyway.

TOMMY
DARDAR: So is that all you needed?

CINDY: Yeah, I heard you guys talk about websites, and I thought you're all in one place. I can say website, and you know what I mean.

RYAN: Run away. Right away.

DAVID: We're also working on a public service announcements. and stuff like that--

TOMMY
DARDAR: That's cool.

DAVID: --on this end.

CINDY: Yeah. Just getting some really cool stuff going.

DAN: We're listeners, I would very much welcome any--

TOMMY
DARDAR: This all goes under the topic of outreach.

DAN: I would very much welcome anything you would like to see on the website, please call in and tell me.

RYAN: That's legal.

CINDY: Yeah.

DAN: I'd be very interested to know what your--

CINDY: Yeah, we got to know what the youth of Houston want to see on the site.

DAN: Yeah. And we are not going to be showing any indecent material. I'm sorry.

TOMMY
DARDAR: We are a youth organization.

CINDY: That's right, and I have final approval on what goes up.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Children under 17.

CINDY: Anyway, well, you guys have fun.

STEVEN: We will.

CINDY: Where's Justin?

TOMMY He decided that he was going to take a vacation this month.
DARDAR:

CINDY: Oh, OK.

TOMMY Get his hard drive installed.
DARDAR:

CINDY: OK. Well, tell him that I request a Miss Thing episode next month.

TOMMY OK. I'm sure he's listening.
DARDAR:

CINDY: OK. Well, he'd better be.

TOMMY Well, I love you, Mom.
DARDAR:

CINDY: I love you too, Tommy.

STEVEN: Bye, Miss Murphy.

DAVID: Bye.

TOMMY Y'all tell my mom that you love her.
DARDAR:

CINDY: Bye, Lou Ann.

LOU ANN: Bye.

TOMMY All right, just press the hang-up button.
DARDAR:

STEVEN: You didn't say I love you.

TOMMY It doesn't say hang up anywhere.
DARDAR:

RYAN: Yes, he did.

DAVID: He did?

TOMMY Anyway, so how much more time do we have before we end? [INAUDIBLE].
DARDAR:

STEVEN: Well, we have, actually, half an hour. I could--

DAN: Can we have a song?

TOMMY
DARDAR: Would you like a song right now?

DAN: Yeah, I'd love a song.

LOU ANN: Yeah. A song would be helpful.

TOMMY
DARDAR: OK, and then we can come back and talk about all this other stuff.

DAN: Do we have a choice of Tori or Tori or even some Tori?

TOMMY
DARDAR: Yeah.

STEVEN: What albums do you have of Tori?

TOMMY
DARDAR: Right now, we are playing Tori Amos, *Strange Little Girls*, her new CD.

RYAN: How about any old ones?

TOMMY
DARDAR: I have a couple of those with me.

RYAN: Which ones?

TOMMY
DARDAR: I have Tori Amos, the "Hey Jupiter" single. I have Tori Amos, *Little Earthquakes*.

DAN: We know they're all by Tori Amos.

STEVEN: Play, oh, what was it called?

DAN: Play a good one.

STEVEN: It starts with a Q.

TOMMY
DARDAR: Just press 1. Starts with a white?

STEVEN: Q.

TOMMY
DARDAR: I don't think there is anything--

STEVEN: There's no Q on these.

DAN: Welcome to the chat.

TOMMY OK. Oh, how about this? How about we have people call in to request? We could just sit here in silence for 20
DARDAR: minutes for the call in.

LOU ANN: Yeah. See if anybody is listening. Anybody out there?

TOMMY Oh, by the way, we are not offering free Tori Amos tickets because if we had free Tori Amos tickets--
DARDAR:

DAN: We would be going ourselves.

TOMMY I would be going.
DARDAR:
