

JIMMY: You're listening to KPFT Houston and KEOS College Station. And now, let's see. Let's see.

And it's time for the *After Hours News and Views with Roy*. No, Big Roy is not here tonight.

[CHUCKLING]

What am I thinking? Chris is here.

CHRIS: Oh, Jimmy. Jimmy. Jimmy.

JIMMY: Yeah, I blew it, didn't I?

CHRIS: You wish you blew it.

JIMMY: I know.

CHRIS: I don't know. This is one of those strange nights when Jimmy has trouble speaking. When the hatchlings have left and governor good grief hasn't come in yet and those false teeth are slipping. OK. Just briefly, one subject having to do with the tragedy in New York. Gay lesbian troops can serve openly for now. The Pentagon suspends discharges during the conflict.

In the aftermath of last week's terrorist attacks, the Pentagon has issued an order suspending discharges, including those of service members who disclose their homosexuality, a spokesman for the Department of Defense said yesterday.

First, gays and lesbians would be allowed to serve during any war, just as they do now, as long as they remain in compliance with the homosexual conduct policy, said Mayor James P. Cassella of the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Public Affairs Office.

Cassella was referring to the "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" edict that President Bill Clinton enacted in 1993 as a compromise to his campaign promise to lift the ban on gay men and lesbians in the military. "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" says gay men and lesbians can serve as long as they keep their sexual orientation private.

A stop-loss order has been authorized, Cassella said. However, consistent with past practices, administrative discharges such as medical hardship and suitability could continue under the stop-loss. Commanders will be given enough latitude in this area to apply good judgment and balance to the best interests of the service, the unit, and individual involved. And this comes to us from the *San Francisco Chronicle*. So we've kind of branched out a little bit where we're getting our news from.

The HGLP, the Houston Gay Lesbian Parents is sponsoring an eight week parenting class starting on Monday, September 24. The instructor will be Alfredo [? Tejerna, ?] a social worker with the Family Service Center and a gay dad himself.

CHRIS: New York.

JIMMY: Oh.

CHRIS: Yeah *L.I.E* stands for Long Island Expressway. Yeah. I know.

JIMMY: I'd forgotten.

CHRIS: Yeah.

MAN 1: Or as we used to like to call it when I was growing up, the Long Island Distress-way. One of the world's longest parking lot.

JIMMY: There you go. OK. Thank you. You're listening to *After Hours*, queer radio with attitude, on KPFT Houston and KEOS College Station. I want to put this in your ear. And then a special song for the community. Something that's old but I've never played it on the air. And you will recognize the singer immediately. Here it goes. After this, of course.

JIMMY: No, she didn't-- she never came out of the closet. It was only after she was dead that her former lovers popped up and said, oh, yeah.

JIMMY: Yeah, it is. She was very insecure about her sexuality and felt that she would have no career if it was known.
