We are going to tell you a lot of things are screwed up with the world. We've got 1000s and 1000s of troops overseas getting ready to die. Yes. And our president is in Kennebunkport, Maine floating around in that goddamn boat. Don't forget the golf waving to everyone. If I was a parent, and my child was over there, I wouldn't be so outraged when I saw those pictures of the president floating around in that boat.
