shop and buy a product called Lexol and they have two different kinds one conditions it and when you when you have leather you want to put leather will shrink because it loses moisture. And you want to put that moisture back into it you want to put the oils back into the cow had when it was alive, or the animal had wood in his life. And a good product for that would be Lexol Lexol conditioner, and you can condition your leather and keep it nice and supple so it doesn't get dry or brittle and start cracking. You always want to keep keep your leather soft and supple. And then they also put out a product called Lexol cleaner, which is what you actually use to wash your leather in water with a particular product. Then dry your leather just leaving it out flat so it'll dry naturally and then putting a conditioner back in and putting the oils back into the leather. That's the most of the poor One thing when you go to attack shop or out in the oh, I don't know, a writing, writing stable, a lot of the leather you'll see is dry and brittle and cracks. And the only reason that is is because it hasn't been taken care of. It hasn't been conditioned. And so you need a good leather conditioner on it. If it's a boot or something, you'll want to put a sealant on it, like snow, the product called Snow, and they'll seal your boots or your leather garments. So there will be water repellent. Now Lexol has been around for a long time. It certainly has a back in salary and equestrian.
