- Where?

- In how many of your neighborhoods are your friends being beaten down in, just because they're there? Does anybody out there understand this? I mean AIDS has killed thousands of us and nobody really gives a damn.

- 3700.

- Most people say, well, it's just another faggot. I'll tell you what, the faggots are hot. I really can't say what they are because the FCC won't let me. Although David Letterman says things like that, nobody seems to care. That's another show.

- There's so many other shows.

- I know. Let's play this and play some music and shut up. I'm tired of talking because I'm in a real bad mood. Part of it's because I just knew after this Channel 13 thing that everything would be all right. And it was really weird at work today because a lot of those old, oh, my god, he's a queer, things were coming up. You know what I mean?

- They don't know it?

- Mary, they'd know it. But this show's on at two in the morning and they're all asleep. So they don't have to hear it. And when you go on Channel 13 and just say it, I'm a gay commun-- they're like, oh, god.

- Yeah, well, get over it.

- Well, yeah.
- We're here.
- Oh, that's my--
- Oh, OK.

- I don't even want to do that. Let's listen to this and we'll play some music, all right?

- OK

- Because it's 2:00 in the morning, oh god.
- Oh, is it?
- I've got a union meeting at 11:30.

And the chief came in and she sat down. And she was looking around the room, scanning to see who was there. And she saw me. And I was sitting there in my little police department suit and a tie. - Yeah, and it made me feel good. Because if it was not for her support, I wouldn't have been there.

- I don't understand it at all.

- Does this make any sense?

- And the rest of humanity does it in their bathroom or wherever. Or, wherever, is right.
- Listen to this, man.

- That's how it all started on HBO. And if you don't have a copy of that video, you may not ever get to see Pee-wee Herman again, which is sad. I'm really disappointed in the way this whole thing has been handled, but--

- The whole idea being-- when you think of the psychology behind it --they're saying that sex is bad, but knowing everybody does it. But until you get caught, you're one of the lucky ones.

- Anyway we have --

- That's not-- there's something wrong with that.
- We have someone new to introduce, too.
- We do.
- We do.
- Hi, Brian.
- Brian--
- Good evening.

- --welcome to *After Hours.* But you've got something we're going to we're going to share with our audience from *The Houston Post* and some queen that writes-- can I say that about Juan, since he came out of the closet?

- No, Juan may not want to be referred to as a queen.

- Well, OK. It's a very nice--

- Juan is a gay man.

- It's a very nice column written by our good friend, I hope, Juan Palomo from the Houston Post. And it is titled, Pee-wee is not the Problem. Is that right?

- "Pee-wee is not the Real Problem."

- OK, let's hear what Juan had to say.
- This is from the [INAUDIBLE] first.
- Sorry about that.
- Sorry about that. I'm used to cutting everybody off. Go ahead.
- This is from the August 1st edition of The Post.

- "According to the Associated Press, child experts advise that kids who ask about Pee-wee Herman should be told that the movie star was arrested for touching his private parts in a movie theater. I can just see it now, millions of kids going to the movies and sitting there in sheer agony until the movie is over because they're too scared to scratch themselves when they itch, lest they, too, end up in jail.

Like many others, I'm sick about the whole Pee-wee Herman thing. But my disgust is not so much with Herman's alleged masturbation in an x-rated movie house in Sarasota, Florida, as it is with the sheriff's department that can't find anything better to do than patrol the dark corridors of such seedy establishments in search of people who are hurting no one else.

Even more, I'm sickened and disgusted by a society that tolerates, even cheers, such wasteful, nonsensical actions. If you ask me who is sicker, a man who masturbates in a theater while watching a porno flick or a sheriff's deputy who allows himself to be sent to a place to check up on what people are doing there, I would have to say the officer.

As comedian, Bobcat Goldthwait, said during Tuesday's *Regis and Kathie Show*, whose space is he invading? Who is he bothering? Did someone say, hey, cut that out, I'm trying to watch the movie? He was at an adult cinema.

Exactly, who could he have possibly been offending in such a place, which is not exactly a gathering place for quote, decent folks, such as young mothers with kids, kindly grandmothers, Southern Baptist preachers, or Catholic priests. People go to such places to do that kind of thing. And as long as they stay indoors, away from where we can see them, we should let them."
