And I think that's part of the problem. queers for all too long, have thought that one day, they would wake up and someone else would have taken care of all their problems for them. And the world would be pretty and pink. Well, Mary, it ain't gonna be that way. Look around the religious right is stronger now than it has ever been. It is well organized and is extremely well funded. They elected 3000 persons to school boards and county judgeships and things of that nature. In the last election. 2000 more ran for office. We saw our president and one of our two major parties, sell their souls to the devil, so to speak, and gave a platform of international prominence to organize bigotry right here in Houston, Texas, during the Republican National Convention in August. So I don't know where anyone gets off thinking that we have finally arrived. We have no work to do. It's often at times when you have the most to lose that you have to fight the hardest. And that time is now. 25 years ago, a bunch of disenfranchised drag queens, people of color, got together and said no more harassment of us. We're tired of this. And we need to do something about it in our own fashion. But sitting back, and moaning and bitching, and complaining is not going to do it. I know for a fact. If they come to get the queers and they come to get the aides to put them in the gas chambers, or something of that sort, I'm gonna start pulling some of you folks out because I'm tired of you sitting on your lazy butt. So get up, become involved and do something. Save your own life. Thank you.

On election day, an amendment which was number two on the ballot for be it municipalities from having laws that protected gay people against discrimination. 54% of the citizenry that voted, voted to repeal take those cities rights or those cities ordinances away from them, and it is legal in Colorado, to discriminate against gays and lesbians,

It's the right thing to do. 567 major cities, 100 Different businesses are supporting it. And I want to do away with this attitude that this is a problem in Colorado. This is not a Colorado problem. This is a human problem that prevails throughout America.
