It's being taught in a fashion where folks see it as being a man where we honor and we recognize and we pay tribute, and we respect other folks that that in reality, you know, created a foundation on which we stand on and that

and those were the African slaves from Africa. Yes. And so I'm African American history is growing, it's getting bigger, it's getting better. I think that we're doing some positive things for ourselves. The NAACP has announcement of black dollar days, I think, was a marvelous idea. And that, and that concept, which was introduced last year, and it was reintroduced this year, was that African Americans only spend Susan B Anthony dollars and \$2 bills the entire
