However, this latest optimism seems at least more grounded in the hope of the pretense inhibitors are yet a new attack on the virus. For a decade, I have read and hoped with what with work on availing of each new therapy and each new revise of the treatment. All that in the in the all that ended in a final breath on November, the eighth of last year, when half of my life Bill White died some die like so many before him on the seventh floor of 12 oaks hospital. When the first approved test for HIV was available in 1985, we about decided to be tested and not to his surprise bill was positive in this early in these early days, the the the acceptance of thinking his acceptance thinking that the virus would act slowly. And in any case, there was nothing available to treat the disease. The first drug AZT was had only emerge, not from AIDS research, but as an earlier development In the treatment for cancer, in any event, AC T was for those diagnosed with AIDS, only later recommended for early intervention. I don't recall. I don't recall that in those early years now, now seeming more like a lifetime ago that bill even check for his T cell count. And so then he goes on and talks about his friendship to Brian Bradley. Brian was certainly one of the most radical firebrands in our community. And personally, one of my dearest salts I've ever known. Even as Brian fought his own bowel, what disease he was, he was an endless source of support to us. Thus, it was doubly painful when Brian died three days before bill as Bill, health problems progressed, the last two years, he beldo with fewer than a dozen T cells. He and I find ourselves diverse, divesting ourselves and our lives and the things that seem less essential. And even at one and even at one time important to our lives. Even running our business was affected. And I was determined to to do as much as I could for Bill went out for whatever care he needed. And then it goes on and he talks about a time and his own memory when Bill woke up in the middle of the night, and he said that he had chaos. Yeah. And he Solaris spent most of the other night up concerned about that. And the next morning he woke up and there was no problem. And Aiden didn't have chaos. But it was ironic that he died from having Ks in his lungs. And then Laurie goes on and he does discuss his bills time in the hospital. While Bill was in the hospital for the last five weeks, he asked the visiting him was the same for me as it had, as it had been for the two of us. We visited friends in the hospital. No, no matter that we cared about those. No matter what we care about those other friends, we did not look forward to the hospital visits, I assured build that for me it was not the same. I looked forward to our visits our church times, despite the fact that he often can, that he was often in considerable pain, that hospital rooms seemed more extensive. st seemed more and it seemed more an extension to our lives together. So much so that I even brought out for basset hounds, to visit one Sunday, one Sunday, Sunday. I shall never lose the memory of the bittersweet hours as Bill's family, a close few friends. And I stood around close, stood closely at his bedside as he slipped away from us. This is a war in which too many of our heroes are gone. But one particular hero stands out in my memory. And in my heart, and there was also as I'm looking through this, there was there was one line that really stood out for me and I think for a lot of us as so called gay activists, and and so called AIDS activists, and I can't quite find it.

But it's amazing to me, I didn't even know Bill was sick. You mentioned that he found out he was HIV positive and 85. I found out I was HIV positive and 87. And I've been my T cells dropped below 200 which is the official which gives you an official diagnosis of AIDS. Christmas of 94. So I have had a it's now for a year and a half. So far so good. But with Brian gone Bill gone. Other many other friends of mine, Don, I'm wondering, you know, how much longer do I have? And thinking that if it had been 10 years ago, I would already be dead medication because Brian Bradley screamed in the streets. There are medications that I can take now that keep me alive.

L Lujack Tyler 09:53

I found the paragraph oh good for me. After spending the last 18 years with Bill and particularly Over the last decade with Belen, HIV, I suddenly found life dramatically changed when he died only three days after his 39th birthday, I had lost not only the love of my life, but my confidence and my true soulmate. When I when I turned 22 intellectual when I, when I tend to intellectualize everything, Bill had always provided me with an intuitive balance with an intuitive response, which balanced and influenced all of our decisions. And while the battle against AIDS is is no less important to me, it's immediately no longer seems so crucial. Yes, I hope these new drugs mean a prolonged therapy. But, but why not a year ago, I still have friends fighting this this disease, but the bow, which which meant the most to my life has already lost? Yes. Yeah. And I think that for many, exactly this. That's that's the point. We're all getting to. I think that for me. I mean, I lost my my bill. I lost Bill Scott. And, and it and it changed my life. You know, I know I've mentioned in the past that bill, you know what, his existence, I wouldn't be sitting here with you right now. Right. And, and part of it is anger and resentment and, and sheer hatred and confusion as to why this diseases is it's destroying our families.

It's because we're faced as a community, gay men are facing death 20 years before we should, yeah, a good 20 years or more, where we should have to. Yeah. And it's, it's changing all of our lives, whether we are HIV positive or not. Because as it's facing, it's changing me because I can I can see changes in my body, and my energy slowing down and things like that. And it's changing from your perspective, because you're losing people. Yeah.

Yeah, I can, I can. I stutter. And then there's this guy named Tom while that was alive. And um, and when I first came out, I met him when I was 16. And he started really, really, really bad. You know, the Socialists were better than everybody and the greasers who are who are blue collar America who are us. And Anna, and the song came from a poem by Robert Frost, I can't quite remember, but it's called Nothing Gold Can Stay Oh, yeah. And stay gold was a song written by Stevie Wonder. And, um, and I think that, that even though we lose people in life, we need to, for those of us that are living I think that would build it about what Larry did was a courageous thing. Because a lot of us closed ourselves up. And, and and hold our memories of the people we love the most to ourselves. And we don't share them with the rest of the world. And even though it's painful to do so I think that by sharing that we hill I think that when I eulogized Bill Scott, in a way I Hill Yes. And and and through your healing, you actually had a lot of people. And so I was in Dallas a few weeks ago. And they've got me hooked on to it. And so the the caucus has come up with this great idea of having a gay marriage Task Force.

And so she was written down you know, as a family member, sure, you know, any emergencies contact this person if you can't kind of contact you know, the granddaughter so the grandmother died and, and so, the other one, the the other lesbian, went to the nursing home and was you know, going to sign had the body released to the funeral home. And nursing home attendant said no, I'm not going to do that because you're not a member of the family.
