

Coming up, information and more on civil disobedience at the Supreme Court. It was phenomenal. There were people from everywhere. Myself, I almost felt like I was going to be crushed with the crowds of people that I helped. I led the Texas delegation, being over one block long in the march.

(SINGING) Sing it to me. We are family.

100 to non-violently protest at the Supreme Court for lesbian and gay rights. Over 4,000 people showed up bright and early 7:00 AM to show that for loving life, we're not going back. Over 650 people were arrested on the steps of the Supreme Court Tuesday. In a show of unity and support, gay men, lesbians, the labor movement, every movement you can imagine was there and helped out.

Calling the civil disobedience campaign, out and outraged lesbians and gay mens and their supporters prepared themselves and one another in a seven-hour workshop from across the country. Busloads, and busloads, and busloads of people after they were arrested were taken off. The DC police had to call in riot gear in what we called and dubbed the Darth Vader Squads because they were outnumbered 10 to 1. And they were not prepared.

Now let's turn to Pacifica Radio for their on the spot report from Washington DC for civil disobedience. Take it away, Pacifica.

More than 800 gay and lesbian rights activists were arrested in front of the Supreme Court today. They were demanding equal rights for gays and lesbians and an end to laws that make sodomy a crime. Last year, in the now famous Bowers versus Hardwick case, the Supreme Court upheld a Georgia sodomy law. Heidi Zemach was at the Supreme Court today and filed this report.

It was a militant and spirited protest today in front of the US Supreme Court as 3,000 gays and lesbians faced a court that has upheld the decision, making sodomy or sex in other than the missionary position illegal. 500 Washington police wearing white rubber gloves stood in lines in front of the court.

One-by-one, large affinity groups of lesbians and gays walked over and sat on the steps of the court. When they could, they broke through police lines, thereby breaking the law. Loren Laureano was one of many people with AIDS who got arrested to call for better funding for people with AIDS and to protest the court's treatment of gays and lesbians.

For those of us who are left behind to mourn, what we get is yellow rubber gloves. Worse yet, what we get is people who are yellow rubber glove-minded. And we are going to make history today. We are going to leave our mark on the steps of the Supreme Court. We are never going to go away. And today is just the beginning, not the end. [INAUDIBLE]

[CHEERING]

Today's civil disobedience action was surely the largest in gay and lesbian history and maybe even in the history of arrests at the Supreme Court. Many came to draw attention to the AIDS issue, others in response to last year's Georgia sodomy decision. They say Bowers versus Hardwick keeps them criminals, committing civil disobedience every week of their lives, said Butner of Key West, Florida.

What it's meant really to everyone is that they just don't have any privacy in their own bedrooms.

Gays and lesbians consider themselves constitutional ghosts without the legal rights of most US citizens. In custody cases, for example, gays and lesbians are often denied custody of their own children.

I'm a lesbian mother. And I lost custody of my children about 10 years ago because of that. And since the Hardwick versus Bowers decision, even more lesbian mothers are losing custody.

I have been a very good parent and a decent person. And my son has lived with my lover and I for five years. And we have provided a very loving household for him. And he wants to be with us. And my ex-wife has said that she-- she's made up all, kinds of, excuses of why he can't. And it all boils down to the fact that it's because I told her that I have AIDS.

During this past week of protests and marches in Washington DC, lesbian and gay activists have worked and marched together in what is looking like a new spirit of cooperation and solidarity.

Well, it's been one of the most moving experiences of my life. I've been very touched by the whole event, that we are a people. We are a nation. And we could be one.

I think the major thing is that this has got to be the last civil rights campaign. How can we still be questioning anybody's equality anywhere?

The NAMES Project AIDS Quilt, the sunrise ceremony began at 7:15 AM between Constitution Avenue and Independence on the mall between Seventh and Ninth streets. The NAMES Project unfurled a huge quilt bearing the names of thousands of those who have died of AIDS.

The names will be read aloud during a sunrise ceremony by numbers and numbers of influential and powerful people, including Congresswoman Nancy Pelosi from San Francisco and Congressman Gerry Studds from Massachusetts; actor, comedian Whoopi Goldberg; actor Robert Blake, writer, actor Harvey Fierstein; and a host of others, including the former director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force Jenny Apuzzo.

The 150 by 450 quilt will consist of 2,000 individual 3 by 6 panels. While each set of 24 for about 24 blocks of the quilt were unfolded and laid into place, the names of each individual was read aloud by the participants. The quilt was displayed from 9:00 AM until dusk. A media tent was set up and the throngs of people showed up.

Words, in my opinion, cannot describe the most beautiful and the most wonderful service. That was our memorial. That was our monument. And it will be on tour. It will be coming to Texas. Be sure to come and see it. It is just one of the most fabulous things you have ever imagined.

If I wouldn't have to shave the beard, I'd do it myself.

You can do it here live right now.

No, I'll--

And you don't have to shave your beard to do it either.

Well, Jim and Tammy. God love Jim and Tammy. They've got their hands full.

They got them full all right.

I understand that we've got someone on the phone with us. And I believe her name is Jean. Is that right?

Yes, that's right.

Jean, are you there?

Right now, The [? Cruise ?] is very popular. And Sandi Patty is always popular. And another one that's coming in is Twila Paris. She really touches the heart and the soul of what everybody goes through.

What about a young woman from Dallas that sung for us?

Oh, yes, Nancy. This song that Buddy has is called "Friend." And in the Bible, it says, greater love hath no man than that a man lay down his life for his friends. And God laid down his life for his friends. And that's all the song is. It's about the friend, the love that God has.

Trace, are you with this?

Yeah.

There we go. Trace is back on the line. And what did you have for us this morning?

I wanted to ask the question about the homosexuality in the church. I'm straight. And I became a born again Christian about maybe six months ago. Well, first of all, I have no trouble with homosexuality whatsoever. I'm not judgmental at all against anyone. My question is, I have trouble. I date still. And I've been seeing a guy. So we are intimate. And I have a lot of trouble with that, with the fortification behind it, a lot of guilt.

And I was wondering, is it-- I really don't understand. I don't even know how to word the question. Being gay, is there a lot of-- I don't know. Is there a rebellion? Would you feel a rebellion that maybe, even though you're close to God, that people say, it's only right if it's man and woman? Do you understand my question?

Are you trying to say that God is looking down on the homosexual in the condemnation type of way?

On any sinner. I'm saying, not homosexuality. It's just a question. As far as fornication, everyone says that's a sin, which the Bible states that that's a sin.

It is.

There's so much guilt behind that.

The guilt is put on only if you choose not to accept God's will, God's law. And he says, it's wrong. And it's wrong. If we're truly going to live the righteous life, and he says to live a holy life and be holy as I am holy, so since we are made all in his image and likeness, he's not going to set down a set of rules and say, well, you're going to do this.

And that's all I have to say. And if you don't like it, well, that's just too bad. He knows we're going to fall short of the glory. But it is wrong for all people, be he gay or straight. It doesn't matter. They have-- have I got it answered for you?

Is that going to answer your question, Joyce?

Yeah, thank you.

Thank you.

Thanks for calling.

Bye bye.

I was saying Nancy, this song that you have, "Friend," is all about the love. And like it was saying in John, it says, greater is he that laid down his life.

That's right.

And Jesus laid down his life for us because he is our friend. And the love that is there-- and Nancy can sing. Believe you me, she can sing.

Oh, yeah, just wait.

But what is so neat about Nancy is the love in Nancy that is Jesus. And anybody that has that has love in them. And they can get through anything.

Does anybody want to take a stab at her last name because--

Yes, it's Nancy Bogdanovic. One Polack can say another Polack's name.

Better known as Nancy B.

Nancy B.

And the name of the song is?

"Friends."

"Friends."

But it's so much more than that. It goes so far beyond that. It's about--

It's about coping.

Yeah, and it's about how friends change.

Right.

It's more about the friends and how they change than it is about the PWA.

It's still in the bottom of the closet.

This is the opening scene of the play. Brad, the PWA, is played by Mario Durham. Curtis, the flamboyant, there's always one in every play, every gay play, sometimes every straight play anymore today. Whatever. Shut up, Joe.

[LAUGHTER]

Curtis is played by Greg Montgomery. Little Sally Safe Sex is played by-- Andrews, his character's name, is wonderfully played by Joel Sandell. And Jay, who's the very promiscuous member of the cast character-wise, is played by Buzz Smith. I think that's right.

And the play is called *Life of the Party*.

And this is an opening scene, which is just the easiest way to say it is. It's a party scene.

So since you're the director, Joe, you say action. And we'll start.

Action.

Whose turn is it?

Mine. Orange. Oh no, sports and leisure. Why don't I ever get the pink cards?

Do you suppose they did that on purpose, making the movie questions pink?

Hmm.

What game challenges do you two double in and double out?

Double in and double out.

[BUZZING]

Darts.

Darts? Like the things in a blouse?

Darts, like you throw at your ex-lover.

Oh.

[LAUGHTER]

My turn. I fooled around in a Jeep last week. It was hot but cramped. I had to go to a chiropractor the next day.

Wait a minute. I thought you were Sally Safe Sex. Safe sex in a Jeep?

We had the emergency brake on.

[LAUGHTER]

You and your safe sex. I figure if I don't have it by now, I'm not going to get it.

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

But there's a five-year intervention. It's a five-year here.
