So I have no criticism to make of other people. I do think it is very helpful when people do do it. I think we benefit a lot because the end game guys being prejudiced is based so much on unreality, so much on inaccuracy, that when people meet real life, gay men and lesbians, when they meet friends, and co workers and relatives, and others, that they respect and admire, perhaps, and find out that they are gay and lesbian. Every time that happens, a piece of that stereotype gets chewed away. And that's, of course, our ultimate goal. As far as people coming out, I have one friend in Congress who I think would like to come out, he has been very much a supportive vote in Congress. It's not easy for him politically, and a lot of other ways. Beyond that, I'm afraid I don't see anybody who is about to do

not as much as you might think. I was very surprised to have one particular friend who's gay, telling me that a committee chairman said to him, you know, you better be careful about fooling around with women. And he said, I assured him that I would be very careful about that. There are a couple of people who are generally known to be gay or lesbian. There are some others who are and people aren't sure, the level of knowledge is probably less than you think, let me say, one of the problems we run into is a sort of a sophisticated form of opposition, which says, Well, I don't mind you being gay, or lesbian, or black, or a woman or a member of some other distinct group. But I'm afraid that if you're elected, that's all you're worried about. And if you are in office first, that's so demonstrably untrue. They don't use it against you. But I will say with regard to people who have come out once elected, or people who have been out before I did, which is a more recent phenomenon, at the state, legislative and city council level, we have collectively a very good record of getting reelected, coming out has rarely led to the defeat of anybody on the Democratic side. When I came out, when Gary SAJE came out, the people who are most offended by that will probably people didn't vote for us anyway, they will probably be very conservative people who disagree with our views on abortion, or health care or reducing the military budget. Gay Republicans who come out are very much at risk, because the anti gay feeling on the Republican side is so strong, that none of them have been able to win a primary. And again, that goes back to I guess what I was trying to hit out in my book, which is people I think, have to work on two tracks. One try to make if you're on the liberal side, try to make the Democratic Party better. But it is self defeating to punish the Democratic Party for not yet being good enough. When the alternative is a much, much worse Republican Party. I believe that what's happening is the Democratic Party is moving more to the center in terms of his rhetoric, but not in terms of its issues. And I think that's very important. We have to be willing to say that people who commit crime, people who hit other people over the head, who take other people's hard won property at gunpoint, they are bad people, they should be locked up. We Democrats have felt Oh, we better not say that. I think we aren't I will say that the role the United States played in the world, certainly in Western Europe, in holding back the Soviets was a very morally worthwhile role. People in Hungary and Poland and Ukraine and Belarus and Czechoslovakia are today grateful to the United States military, because it helped hold back oppression so that natural forces can undo it. That's the kind of thing I'm talking about. I'm not talking about backing away from the rights of women, from spending more on housing from improving the transportation system. I want to cut the military budget in half and free up those funds. But I want to describe what we want to do in a way that emphasizes our connection to the middle voters, I don't want constantly to be told that you've got to calibrate your rhetoric in a way that will make the left field the most emotionally happy. My friends on the left, we're not talking to you. Now, we and you agree on many of these issues, please allow us to frame our rhetoric in terms of appeal to them in our head. So my gay friends say, Well, we're very unhappy. There's not enough talk about our issues in this campaign. But why should that be? The purpose of the campaign is to win over people in the middle. It is not to give each other constant reinforcement. And that's the dilemma that I think we have to break out of.
