And people who used to be getting assistance and getting around the city with Metro cards and Metro tokens have been just about cut down to the bare bone and they're about one, two out of three people will not be getting their Metro cards. And most people don't understand what that means. But I do working at the care center. That means a lot of the people who who live on 404 \$125 a month. And that means they had to pay their rent, they pay their electricity, they had to buy food, they have to take care of those people who are living on \$425 A month disability because they've been diagnosed HIV positive, now have to come up with more money out of that \$425 To get them around town to get them to doctors to get them to medical appointments and to get them to social services. And if anybody has ever dealt with the federal social service system, you know that Suzie Q whose brains she left at home that morning, loses paperwork left and right and these guys are down at the office reduplicating work all the time. Now this is something I know from firsthand experience, that they're down there reduplicating or duplicating work that they've already done down there, over and over again. And each one of these, each one of these times it has to be duplicated. Somebody has to get on a bus and get there and then they have to get on a bus to go home well these people don't have the bus money the bus fare the bus tickets, the bus tokens anymore. It's Our Community. Let's let's do something. So Sue, if you're out there, or somebody knows, Sue, call her right now and tell her Tsukuba, Cooper, we want this money back, we want somehow to find a way to keep these guys and these people mobile in town,
