are Yes. On July 9. That's this past Thursday. Council person Jew Don Boney and Senate Senator Rodney Ellis had a hate crimes panel are hearing at City Hall. It started a little later this was started seventh and started about 730. But it went to about 1145. It was only supposed to be two hours. It went forever. But it was great. The federal government has been looking and specifically the Senate Judiciary Committee has been looking at amending the current federal law to include sexual orientation, gender, and disability to expand the federal law enforcement jurisdiction as far as hate motivated attacks are concerned. And so what council person Boney was trying to do is gather information and gather testimony from a lot of people so that Houston could lobby the Texas legislature next year when they back into session to make sure that the Texas laws are changed in a way that will help prevent hate crimes. There were about 2025 people who actually were a part of the panels and testified. In addition to many of the council persons like in East Parker, Chris Bell Karole Robinson were there and a few others. Deborah Dannenberg came by it was just a jam packed place. They had overflow seating, they

sent some people up to watch it on TV up on the second floor. The concentration of the meeting was primarily on enhancements of punishment. Um, so that's what most of the discussions were about how to enhance the punishment for hate crime within the state of Texas within the state of Texas, okay. There was very little presented on the talking about prevention. That, to me was a little disappointing because the actual prevention is what we want to do not just go out and getting people after the fact.

I believe that the prevention part comes from education, and educate educating people. Like Sarah was just talking about meeting people ahead of time meeting those who are opposed to us and talking to them putting our name and a face to this issue. And most hate crime legislation, whether it's on a state, local or national level, is usually done. As a peut. For punitive measures. Yes,

yes. The thing that I found very moving was three of Mr. James Byrd Jr's sisters were there. James Perry, Jr, is the gentleman who was brutally murdered in Jasper a few weeks ago. And they came and testified. And it was very, very moving testimony, particularly in the way that they were not out for vengeance, not talking about punitive measures, more talking about how to deal with the community. And that's what they've been working on. I think there are three remarkable women. Let me give you some statistics. For nationwide, they're almost at 100 reported cases in 1966, according to the FBI report, over 1000 of them, or almost 12%, were on sexual orientation. Sexual orientation is the third largest target targeted group of people in terms of hate crimes, the first being raised. But the one thing that stood out and was mentioned at the panel is that if you are gay, then the possibility or the probability of you being attacked because of hate crimes, is twice as great as someone who is African American, just because of the numbers. So although we're third in the ranking, we're first in target in terms of targeted groups. There was another very interesting, a bit of statistics that came out that we haven't had a chance to follow up on yet, but let me just mention, the police department was there. Specifically the Criminal Investigation Division that handles the hate crimes hotline number. And they mentioned there about tracking Maesters number of acorns. Acorns this year so far, run around 13. Last year, it was 31. So it's about the same as last year. However, they did mention that on the sheets that the officers check, and where people say, I think this was a hate crime. There were 600. Check. Oh, so when they talk about hate crimes, they're talking about ones where they really think they have a case. And it's solid. Oh, so right. So the numbers that are getting those of those cases that get put down? Yes. And so the numbers that are reported, are as we thought they're not as high as we've been thinking, you know, we think, hey, there's got to be more, as we know, they said they should be Yeah. And in fact, the police have the information. It says that's why this succeeded so far this year. So I found that very interesting. The one thing that is Ah, Jew Don Boney said, and I'd like to repeat, and then finish this off with is that let's not forget about what happened in Jasper, and what's happened over the last few years, even here in the Montrose, let's remember and be able to bring that forward to the legislature in such a way that they will do something. So it was a real interesting and very informative meeting. I had an opportunity to speak for about one minute, myself. And basically what I reminded them was that hate crimes and domestic violence, both have the same character, and that the crime is the crime of escalation. But each time the perpetrator

does a crime, he does a little more than he did last time. Violent little more violence. And if we report the small instances of violence, we will not see the large instances of violence. So one of the principal ways that I believe we can prevent hate crimes is by reporting them when they occur, even though they're small intervention early will stop the escalation and will stop the majority of the violence. Okay.

Mr. Masters was also the Guardian columnist for the Houston Post for several years, and he retired back in the mid 70s. Mr. Mast has presided over elections for the Montrose 34th. Precinct, one that often large, high number of voters from 1970 to 1998. And although Mr. Masters was a Democrat, he always hired at least one Republican clerk. He was a very fair person. He was also a decorated Marine officer from World War Two, and he did teach at the Texas at Texas a&m. Mr. Mathis was an active participant in scores of political campaigns and was given the Lifetime Achievement Award by the Houston gay and lesbian Political Caucus.
