From the spontaneous standing ovation offered by those in attendance to the beautiful balloon release symbolizing the release of Newman's soul from this earthly plane. It was the kind of service that Neumann himself would have designed, and would have been immensely proud. See the rest of the story? Yeah, okay.

Jr. was born the first child of Newman Sr, and Melba, both educators, his parents, his parents, profession, coupled with an inquisitive nature and a brilliant mind formed the foundation for what would become the most talented and creative forces yet seen in gay entertainment. After graduating from the University of Southwest Louisiana, with a degree in speech and drama, Newman began the career that would bring him the national attention he so richly deserved, that a female impersonator performing under the name of Pepper and Christine, he quickly gained recognition for his sense of style and incomparable dance abilities. While still in Lafayette, he was crowned Miss May Day of the south and preliminary to Miss Gay America. The crowning and his appearance at that year's national contests brought him an even wider circle of fan and friends. It also made him realize that while Lafayette would always be home, there was a bigger stage in which to perform. Newman moved to Houston in 1975. It became a regular at the lamppost in what is now West University. The club sponsored him at Miss Texas the following year a titled he won, thanks in part to his fabulous interpretation of music in the mirror from *A Chorus Line*. That same talent garnered him first runner up honors in subsequent subsequent Miss Gay America Pageant that same year, with Michael Andrews being crowned at national titleholder two years later, Newman entered and won the first Miss Gay USA title at numbers in Houston from the field of 33 contestants. Ironically, many of the same performers who had beaten Newman in previous Miss Gay America contests also entered Miss Gay USA that year, and in an almost unbelievable twist of fate, Newman's first runner up was Michael Andrews, the same person Newman was first runner up to at Miss Gay America two years earlier. Characteristic of his pride and enthusiasm Newman wore his Miss USA crown to work the next day at Foley's Northwest mall and he and his dear friend Pete Carmelita Davina were both fashion merchandisers at the store and Newman wanted both staff and the management the store to be aware of his accomplishment. During that same time period this week in Texas, held the Texas Entertainer of the Year competition. Based on the votes of the readers from around the state. The most popular female impersonator for each city in the most popular entertainer in the state were announced on stage at various show bars around Houston. The first few years Ernest Dean, a popular comedic performer from Houston was named Texas Entertainer of the Year in 1978. Down the day, was Texas Entertainer of the Year but in 1979 1980, in 1981, Newman did what many thought was the unthinkable. He alone reigned as Texas Entertainer of the Year for three consecutive years. Perhaps it was his uncanny ability to create the illusion of a woman on and off stage. Perhaps it was his rapport and camaraderie with audiences. Perhaps it was his incredibly credible skill as a dancer and pantomime artist. Or perhaps it was just the fact that Newman was a regular cast member at the Copa in Houston, and Sunset Boulevard in San Antonio, in addition to being a semi regular in show bars across the street state that earned him that honor. Whatever the reason, Newman accomplished something that no one has ever done, or has ever done since.

And 1980 new and traveled to Atlanta to compete. Okay, and the Miss Gay Universe pageant in that competition. Each contestant represents a foreign land, and a true Newman's creativity and sense of pageantry, his costume was brilliant, outshining all others, and walked the runway as Miss Timbuktu as in many other pageants before Newman walked away triumphant, carrying the Miska universe crown out of the southeast for the first time in the contest history. After winning Miss Gay USA and Miss Gay University being named to the Texas Entertainer of the Year for three consecutive years, new and set his sights on the one title that had eluded him. The one title he wanted above all others Miss Gay America. So in September of 1982, Naomi entered the national competition again, placing in the top 10 the Miss Gay America Pageant, with the choice Jennifer Fox being named the winner. The following year new and entered and

won Miss Gay South pageant in San Antonio competed for the Miss Gay America crowd in Charlotte, North Carolina. He was a first runner up to the Francesco Wakeland. In 1983, he represented Miss Gay tristique pageant as first runner up at the Miss Gay America at Oklahoma City. Being a first runner up again, this time to Tasha Cole.
