Three hours, six hours, for the whole month, and you get the opportunity to talk with the youth find out what's going on. Whenever the PFLAG had scholarships coming up, you, you encourage those youth to fill out those applications. We talk about what's going on, we facilitate small groups where where the youth get together and talk about how their weeks been going. And as an adult, you know, you offer some advice, if that's appropriate, but really, they kind of manage that on their own. So that's kind of how it started off. And from there, I kind of got involved in the the programming and fundraising for Hatch. And then eventually, I was promoted to the MCC board was it modules Counseling Center, which, a few years ago, gosh, maybe three years ago now, hatch


and Marshalls Counseling Center merged. So it's been a great experience for me. But I know one of the things that some people go through is there's a reluctance see, to be involved with a gay youth organization. And I think that's kind of sad, because one of the things we talked about is the internalized homophobia thing that so many people go through and still deal with. And because of that, people shy away from a youth organization. And really, the organization needs people who can who can be role models and can tell their story and, and can be positive, positive influence. So if anyone's out there listening, and would be interested, you know, please contact us and of course, you know, we do the we do background checks on all of our volunteers. And they actually have allowed three to four, hatch youth to go to their general meetings each month where their members underwrite the costs for the meal. So that gives them an opportunity to get the exposure to what's going on the gate community. So it's been a very effective program, and one that I'm very proud of. And hopefully, what that allows is you introduce a youth to an organization, which once they age out of hatch, they can begin to put some of their energy into that and kind of develop a relationship with that other organization. And something that is it's a monster, but it's something that they have to live with not die. You know, I make a big deal out of the idea of living with AIDS. Not dying with it, yes, you can die. But living with it

living every day as if it's, you know, the best day you're gonna have just just going for it. And, and we tried to explain that to the that, that it's like an end to those friends who are not positive yet. Getting getting the message out to his friends that you know, this, you know, you can make this not happen. You know, that's what I love about the fact that there is a hatch, because when I was a kid that age, we didn't have a hatch. You know, we didn't Long Island may have had a gay organization, but I wasn't part of it. You know? And it's just Well, I mean, it's just an it's just that was that suddenly came to mind as we were sitting here talking about, I mean, that conversation 19 year olds sitting there crying because friends around him may die. And they're all in his age group, you know,
