In 1987 98, through 91, the big focus was coming out of the closet, the original producer of the show, really talked about Harvey Milk. And how Harvey Milk, first openly gay supervisor in San Francisco and his message to the masses were come out that when they know us, all of these, these, these fears that they have will just melt away when they realized that they have been living next door to us all this time, they have noticed. And and that's kind of the message I wanted to continue, but not just for gay men. When when I first became the producer Christmas of 1991. I opened it up to lesbians to you know, I said, you know, it's gays and lesbians are women here and and they don't have a voice either, right? They need to hear it. And then I got to thinking about it. And about two years later, I said, you know, we talk about GLBT gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, but it's most mostly we're talking about gay and lesbian and the B and the T part is just there, but they're not really represented and they need to be represented. And I actively sought out a bisexual man and transgendered woman to to bring their voice. Because my focus was it from the very beginning when I was produced the show. I have a lesbian here because I can talk about lesbian issues, but I ain't one. And it just isn't gonna come through, you know, when you have actual lesbian talking. Right? Right. And then the same thing applies with transgender, bisexual. We've got to get those people. And then that expanded. Excuse me. It was important for me to get the teen voice of the question of the gay lesbian, bisexual, transgender, questioning teen voice on here. And I worked with hatch for a year. And then I thought, okay, where else can we go? You know, it's it bothered me that the black community GLBT community was so excuse me, something caught my throat was so separated from the white community. And I said, we need a black voice here. So I started that segment, and I looked around Houston, and it's, you know, we have come to the point where there is no majority anymore. No one group is a majority, right? Because their Hispanic population has grown so much that this is not just a white community. So we need Hispanic force and I could I could see that happening in Hispanic community also, that they were separating themselves the GLBT and I wanted to get that force on. I haven't been always successful in that area. Then I wanted leather also, because that was always the BDSM community had always been kind of the stepchild in the GLBT community. You know, I remember in the early days of AIDS, Back in 1981, when it first started the summer of 1981, and the early years, I know what the preppy white community was thinking at that time, because it was like, Oh, that I see that only in the leather community, because those are the people that fell first. And that the upwardly mobile preppies, were saying, oh, that's just those leather people, it doesn't affect me. And then when it did affect me, I I've and I started getting involved in in my community, and then I realized the error of my thinking, and how that it's not them. It's us. Always. It's, it's us, and we all need to be out there and nice. People have asked me, why did I get involved in act up? Why did I start talking about being HIV positive on the air? And why did I keep talking about being gay? And I said, you know, I will do that until I don't have to?
