That's the Shangri La us and sophisticated boom boom from the Stonewall soundtrack. Now, many of you are familiar with Stonewall as the birth of the modern Gay Rights Movement. 1969, on the eve of Judy Garland's memorial service, drag queens that hung out at the Stonewall Inn were fed up, they were tired, they were through, they weren't going to be raided

and bothered anymore. Well, the police didn't see it that way. And in came police who just they just want you to take over and harass gays and the drag queens that would make them wash their makeup off their face. They would humiliate them and on this particular night, they didn't want to deal with it. I know you're all familiar with the story. And now the story has been made into a motion picture. Motion Picture is called Stonewall and you're listening to the soundtrack in the background. Stonewall is a semi fictionalized account of a half a dozen drag queens stories. In the weeks leading up to the Stonewall riots. The lead character, played by Guillermo Diaz is a drag queen Naima la Miranda, her involvement with a young activist. Her openness versus the almost closeted nature of activists at that time back in 1969. The movie opens up in September the sixth here in Houston with landmarks. Greenway three. And we're going to call and talk to theater Matthias right now about this film. Peter was in Minneapolis promoting the film, Minneapolis. Hi, Rem 1226, please. I believe it's Minneapolis who said he's in promoting the film course. Guillermo. This is Scott Lewis in Houston. How are you?

Did Were you aware of the events of Stonewall the historic value? Would you read that script? Or was it kind of an education for you?

I had heard about it about the Stonewall riots, but I didn't really know know much at all. So I kind of once I got to film and I read the book, which the film is based on the minute book Stonewall, and I read about all the all the legal facts and that it was illegal to serve alcohol and so homosexual and, and all the other crazy stuff that went on back then, I was really shocked. But yeah, I mean, it was totally like, through doing the film.

You know, something I found interesting in reading the press kit on the movie was that the owner of the actual Stonewall Inn did not allow y'all to use the exterior of his bar for the filming. Do you know anything about that?

Yeah. I remember Nigel and Christine being really upset about it, because I thought they were really, I think we all were looking forward to shooting, you know, in front of the actual Stonewall

bar. But the thing that I heard later on that happened was that the film Jeffrey had shot there, like a year ago before us or humans before and they kind of trashed the place. But I think they were kind of weary about letting another film shoot there. There really wasn't anything personal against the film. They were just, you know, they didn't want to deal with the hassle of film shooting there. You know what I mean?

Right? And so what y'all had to do was create the Stonewall Inn down in the Meatpacking District, recreate that whole area.

Yeah, they, they totally recreated it down by the pegging district. And it actually turned out being working out much better, because there's not a lot of people down there. And if you think about it, I mean, if we would have sat in front of the actual Stonewall bar, it would have been crazy, because you know, there's so many people and it's so busy, we would have never gotten the shots and it just would have been too difficult to keep everyone quiet and keep everyone from walking in front of the shots. So it actually turned out really well. Because I mean, we weren't bothered a lot by people in the street and stuff.

So it was very difficult to shoot in the meatpacking district one because it was the middle of winter and you were portraying a summer scene. As well as evidently the smell down there. It's not the most pleasant

I don't know about the smell. I didn't. I didn't know anything. I mean, it was difficult shooting summer scenes in the winter. But I mean, anywhere we shot the film, it was difficult if we were shooting outside. It was difficult because you know, wearing short skirts and I mean short sleeve shirts and trying to act like it was summer and it was freezing out.

Was this your first time in drag?

Yeah, this is definitely my first time I had done it.

It's a bitch in it. What are the most powerful scenes in the movie for me? There were two one, which everything I've read does not disclose the fate of skinny Vinnie. So I will not do that here. But certainly that is one of the most powerful scenes in the movie and the other one for me, as someone who's 25 years old, and who's never who's only heard about what bars were like back then and what it was like at the Stonewall Inn or any gay bar in America was the scene where the police came in and raided the Stonewall the first night that we are brought into the life of your character La Miranda. And your character refuses to give in to the policeman who want her to go and wash her face. She's wearing makeup and they want her to go wash the makeup off her face and she's defiant and refuses and just ignores them. And they take your character down to a wash bucket where the glasses and dishes from the bar being washed and force your face over and over again down into this filthy bucket of wash water. Does deep win as an actor? Do you kind of feel the humiliation that that person must have felt?

Oh my god yeah, definitely. Especially with the cops really killing us in the scene. It was a very powerful thing. You know? Yeah, I definitely felt humiliated. Back then, they didn't have any running water behind the bar. So they actually did have these buckets of stagnant dirty water. That's why there was this hepatitis epidemic going around back then because they they didn't properly wash the glasses or, or anything on the bars. So, I mean, it was really, you know, knowing all that stuff, it was really powerful doing the scene. And we actually only did it like once or twice because they couldn't keep wetting my, my wig, because we only had two wigs that look the same. So, you know, I kind of had had all this, you know, stuff going on and in my head and inside of me, so it just kind of happened. It was great.

Yeah, well, I have to compliment because the thing when I watched the film a few weeks ago, the first thing that I told people was, Oh, my God, this film dish needs to be in high schools. This needs to be one of those mandatory films to be in history book. Exactly. It was just so incredible. There were so many lessons taught, for example, the, the way the bars were where you had to go through two entrances to get into a bar, the way the lights would flash. Can you tell us a little bit about what you learned about what the bars were like back then?

Yeah. There was, it was illegal to serve alcohol to throw homosexuals and actually state law that that you couldn't, you couldn't serve alcohol to homosexual wardrobe. thing which you had to have three items, items of clothing appropriate to your gender, on when the cops raided the bar. I mean, just all this crazy stuff you couldn't, you couldn't face each other while dancing, you had to wait for the woman. Like in the fire IRA, there's a couple of fire islands where they're at a dance and the males cannot get up to dance until until the woman got up to dance. And when she did, you had to face her when you were on the dance floor, you couldn't face each other. Just crazy stuff like that. And then within the FBI, they all had their own code, like flashing the lights. So everybody would pull off their earrings in their, in their in their wig. So

when the cops came in, you know, you wouldn't get in trouble and all this other stuff. And they would there was always a car outside the bar with beer with a trunk full of beer, because you couldn't have the beer in the actual bar, just all this crazy stuff.

Yeah, the film itself is quite an education. Do you when people ask you in 10 or 15 years about this movie? What will you remember most about it?

Who is this film's creator, and the man behind this film, began succumbing to AIDS evidently, and just the as the film began wrapping up shooting and went home to London, and most of the editing of the film was done there in his home. And my understanding is that he was able to see just the final edits and passed away on Valentine's Day of this year, and was not able to see the film open, but certainly an incredible legacy that he has left. How have you? How long have you been out promoting the film? I know it doesn't open here in Houston for another week. But it's open elsewhere in the country.

And the film I mean, the theater, they're always packed. And I think people just really want to see the movie cuz I mean it first of all, it's really entertaining. And it's also like a mini musical. There's a lot of musical numbers in it, it's just and plus you're learning all this stuff. It's just a great love story.

Yeah, that's one thing, the press kit really plays up the fact that it is a love story. And it really is. And it's something that even you can identify with today, and that you have a young man who's Mattie Dean, who has come to New York City, with the big ideals of what it's going to be like in the big city to be gay. And he gets there and his dreams aren't actually realized. And he has a choice between someone who is not so traditional, but who is openly gay and is everything that he that he's looking for, while not necessarily a traditional person, ie being that they're a drag queen, versus someone else who's good looking, you know, very nicely dressed, good job, but very conservative and closeted in a lot of senses. And that's something that even today that the gay community can identify with, because so many people are still closeted.

I remember that. Yeah. Right.

R Roy McCarthy 22:22

I believe those back in March. Well, Thomas, Paul McDevitt was sentenced to 20 months in jail last week for well, who is he the guy? Yes. Thomas Paul McDivitt was the person that we were talking about, ah, and he admitted to probation violations. Now, the terms of exhibits probations included that very unusual provision. And that was drafted by state District Judge Lewis Gomer, that McDevitt tell prospective sex partners that he is HIV positive. Okay. Now in March, that restriction drew protests by civil libertarians and a suit was filed against the judge by the Texas Human Rights Commission. The Human Rights Foundation, excuse me. And the 33 year old McDevitt was arrested again on July 14 in New Orleans on theft, and battery charges. Now he was later released and re arrested on August 7, when Louisiana authorities learned there was an arrest warrant out for McDevitt in Smith County where Tyler is located. So it appears that what is this? Yeah, Tyler is not exactly a poster boy.

I do want to say this that regardless of anything, nobody deserves to be battered.

And sooner or later, either the batter gets killed, or the person who is being battered, gets killed. Wow. And it's just not worth it.

Because I get drugs that way, because I don't have insurance. Well, that's it's a it's a federally funded program that, that it's funded to the states in the states distributed distribute all of it. Yeah, I get a lot of drugs that way. I don't get a protease inhibitor, though.

But anyways, funding for those inhibitors is squeezing out. Funding for the priority three drugs.

Now, I don't know exactly what were the priority three drugs. Oh, I have several listed there. I do believe for alpha interferon. But not a whole lot of people use it anymore.

Roy McCarthy 25:37

But but you have priority three drugs go by names such as Metatron. Yeah. Oh, boy. Miam, boo, tall, whatever. And my cold Butan? Yeah. Roll fear on a Yeah. And others. Those as of September 1 will no longer be available to clients because of funding. And it's this lack of funding.

It's, wow, it's that the protease inhibitors cost a lot of money. And people need those because that's the drug that saving lives. So what they're doing is they're kind of kicking out some of the lesser used drugs.

R Roy McCarthy 26:26

Well, you see, here's the thing, which is that everybody's body chemistry is different, how I know and the virus mutating the way it does not one program works for every now and so we got to have a whole factory full of different stuff for people. And-.

J Jimmy Carper 26:48

Well, if we don't get some more funding for that, that drug program, it's gonna-.

R Roy McCarthy 26:52

It's really gonna get worse. It's really sad. Yeah. And we've also had up here in New Angeles county up there near Dallas. A grand jury has indicted a 29 year old man on charges of capital murder in the death of Robert Michael Robert. Now he was an inn owner and a longtime gay activist in Port Aransas. And the indictment charges that Sean Keith McClure, who also goes by the by the name of Fay killed Robert late on the night of August 7 or early morning of August 8 at the seahorse seahorse in which Robert owned and operated in Port Aransas-.

I remember that that I remember reading that that guy died but I didn't know what was murder.

R Roy McCarthy 27:38

And well his neck was slashed. That's murder. And he bled to death. That usually happens when you Yeah, yes, sir. And we also had a cross burning up there. Oh, yes. Now on Monday, August 27. That's just this past Monday. At 3am The Shamil family awoke to the burning of a six foot cross on their front lawn. Accompanying the cross burning was a handwritten note which read fagot and DOA. Now the family is unaware of the reason why they were targeted for this type of hate related violence. And the Fort Worth Police are investigating are investigating the cross burning as an anti gay hate crime as well.
