And it says every time President Clinton seems about to turn a corner during a difficult start in the Oval Office, something else falls out of Heaven and clobbers him, says the top Bishop of the Episcopal Church. We are witnessing an intense round of what I call the politics of gotcha. I'm right, you're wrong, both political parties regrettably, it's for part of the church life as well. We're under the sway the politics of gotcha when those holding different points of view take on as their main work the dubious activity of making the other side look bad. When this happens, there's a risk of losing sight of where our efforts are meant to point toward. Let's see, part of the, part of the thing it says my heart aches for President Clinton, says Bishop Browning, in response to question. In response to questions, Bishop Browning said he does not think the Episcopal Church as a whole has made up its mind about whether practicing homosexuals should be ordained. But he said he doesn't think there's hostility toward discussing the issue that there once was. He said he doubted there will be a vote in favor of ordaining gays at the 1994 general convention, reported he'd found a recent trip to Haiti a very strong desire on the part of Haitians for the return. It is, okay. This is, they're talking about different issues that the President has had to face that the President needs to deal with and how they feel about him. And I think that the the big question of this particular article is, it talks about sexual abuse

within the church. He's not, it says Bishop Browning says he's not proud of the problems, but he's proud of the way the church is facing them. We're trying to make the church a place of safety where vulnerability is a gift, though it may, though it may lead to the cross. We're also trying to educate ourselves about boundaries, about what it means to be in a position of trust. We're trying to look closely at who we place in those positions. The other one is an article. I believe it is also, let me see, the National Christian Reporter. This is on the front page of the National Christian Report. It says religious leaders to Clinton keep promise on gays in the military. Representatives of seven religious agencies urged President Clinton last week to stand by your principles and keep his promise to lift ban on gays in the military. It is immoral for the nation's largest employer to discriminate, the group said. It is immoral for the government to force people to lie. It is immoral to rob people of their human dignity in the way that the military has been doing. This letter comes as President Clinton and Secretary of Defense [unintelligible] approach a decision on the specifics of how Mr. Clinton is to keep his campaign promise to lift the ban. He faces stiff opposition in Congress blah, blah, blah. We know where this is gotten us. It's right before the decision, took it to the Congress, I guess. Let's see, it says we know from personal experience that there is a price for leadership on this issue the religious official says. We are also know that there was a greater price for the nation for failure to meet the very basic rights. The officials told Mr. Clinton they are very aware of how divisive the issue is for the nation adding the, that divisiveness exists in our churches and in our synagogues. The letter which will also be sent to members of Congress was signed by officials from the National Council of Churches of Christ in the USA, Interfaith Impact, the Union of America, Hebrew congregations, the United Church of Christ, the Christian church, Disciples of Christ, and the United Methodist--Methodist Church and the Presbyterian Church USA. So that's some of the strongest, certainly some of the strongest religious leaders in the country saying that Clinton should keep his promise and not deny basic human rights to people regardless of their sexuality and yet this issue, this whole stance has been totally, completely ignored because of the religious right. Because the religious right are looked at, looked upon as Christians when in my book, they're the pseudo-Christians, they are not real Christians and they're evil and must be destroyed.
