So when our Congress, people and our senators come home, that we show up to their town meetings, that we show up to their office, and we lobby them and say, you're not getting my vote next time, if you don't vote right on this one. Because even those who oppose us will lessen their opposition, if they feel there's something to lose, they might vote against us. But they might help support a motion to table for example, or keep it in committee, or any number of other options that we would have to kill it, you know, once it becomes a parliamentary issue.
