Suzanne Anderson speaking out for lesbian and gay voices. It's Christmas Eve. And even if you happen to be Christian, you're probably thinking about Jesus Christ from time to time. Anyway, even if you're offered a Christian, most people acknowledge that Christ did make a difference in this world. And that's kind of what I want to talk about today is making a difference. I listened to briefly out Reverend Al Sharpton this morning on the TV and he was talking to black people about the self hatred and how you have to learn to love yourself. And once you do that, then you can start making changes and you won't be so hard on one another. I want to talk this evening about some kids that made make your major changes. March 7 17 years old, and he turned up because how kids at school had split and hurl animal droppings at him. Chris Hannon 16 years old called him how he dropped out of school because schoolmates threatened to kill him. Hundreds of other teams besieged state senators for two Unsworth rallies in Boston. Conferences and they had vigils, Massachusetts lawmakers became the first in the country to approve a state law banning discrimination against gay students and public schools. The governor of Massachusetts placed into effect a bill on sexual orientation as a protected class in anti discrimination laws and public education. This allows safe sex couples to go to prom to discuss homosexuality and health and sex education classes. And above all, finally, schools are a safer place. People who are opponents to this bill, are you ready for this? They're afraid that teachers who refuse to talk about homosexuality as being normal could face discrimination charges. That is the most hideous, absurd statement I have ever heard. Anyway, one of the reasons that they were prompted to do this other than these two men coming forward and talking about their problem is they ran a study and they found out that 28% of high school dropouts are gay, as well as nearly 1/3 of all teen suicides. The standing and anti discrimination provisions to gate has been around for three years, but wasn't until the students began rallying that a change was made. Since October of this year gay and straight use arm was such signs is make schools safe. And statistics about high school dropouts and suicide rates stocked the Statehouse staging marches with speakers and chants. On a lobbying day, they fanned out in teams and went to all 40 senatorial offices. The next day, that bill passed, these kids make it made a difference. We are 10% of the population folks and we are sitting back and we're not using the power that we have. And if you don't think the end He is while you're not paying attention to what's going on Phoenix, Arizona, a California group already fighting against gay rights in 10 states brought his cause to Arizona launching a statewide drive to place an anti discrimination gay rights discrimination amendment on next year's ballot. The proposed amendment to the Arizona Constitution would prohibit state and local governments from

passing ordinances protecting homosexuals and discrimination. The proposed amendment is similar similar to the one that was struck down by the Colorado judge earlier this month. The sponsoring traditional values coalition of ours, Arizona is affiliated No surprise here, but the Anaheim California based traditional Rights Coalition of America, they have sponsored similar anti gay initiatives in 10 other states.
