And Ray Hill said would Harvey Milk kind of walked away. And he's right. But Harvey Milk is someone that has inspired me personally and you a lot as you listen to us over the last three years. So the things he has to say to us are very important. And I've been feeling real down in the dumps and real bluesy here lately, feeling like I wasn't getting anywhere. And who would come out of the grave to talk to me but Harvey Milk on a tape that Ray found that was recorded in Dallas five months after Harvey was elected. Yeah. And that Wow. So right now we are going to share with you some Harvey that you haven't heard before. I got to hear him say the F word ups. But we had to edit it for radio because Jesse Helms wouldn't like that even at this early hour of the warning. So what you're about to hear hasn't been heard for God knows how many years and it will be heard a lot. And if there's one thing we treasure out around here, it's Harvey and the things that he taught us about coming out and standing up for ourselves. And he speaks to us this morning about fighting for what's right, and how the people who are out there to get us are out to get us. And if we don't register and vote that we will lose. It's all the same. All the things we've been saying to you all along. And it's the message that we continue to pound home, that this country was built on the basis of a constitution that says we the people. And as gay and lesbian people, it's up to us to get that freedom and to claim those rights because they will not give us anything. Martin Luther King said, Freedom is never given to any man. Martin Luther King also said, If you don't have anything worth dying for, you don't have anything worth living for. And Harvey says this morning in this tape, that if you're not doing anything, if you're not involved, if you're just hanging around, you're just occupying space. And I don't have to recruit you to join the game lesbian movement. And you're going to hear why in just a second, because your commitment to stay tuned every week, is your commitment to be a part of what's happening. And it's just sad to think that 21 years later, or not, 21 years later. 12 years later, actually, it will be 11. Right. 1978 1990, it'll be 11 years, wow. 12 years, 12 years this year, that's scary. Just think about what he says and when he refers to 1990, that this was recorded in 1978, five months after he was elected. And just think about that, as he talks about change and how important it is to vote that when the city leaders in Houston got together the people who were on our side and put the gay referendum together to protect people like me on the job, that less than 20% of the Montrose bothered to go vote. So we didn't even support ourselves. Think about that.

Think about that, in 1990 we get all worked up about something as simple. I'm not even going to do that. Because I do I'll get on a roll. And just real angry. And I'm angry at a lot of gay men who are so goddamn busy that all they have time to do is workout and go out and get laid. And they think that their next trick is the answer to all their problems. And they're just fooling themselves. Or those of us that drink ourselves to death or drink ourselves asleep, thinking that's going to solve our problems. Or we take drugs until we can't see straight. And we run around to every bookstore and every bar, and every bathhouse looking for the perfect person and we're never going to find them. Not like that. And I know I know in my heart that there's a way out of this mess. And this is the way we're going to get it this is the way we're going to find it. This is the way we're going to succeed. And it just makes me angry. To think about so many beautiful gay people losing their lives, and they may be working and running around pretty bodies and beautiful tans but they're dead. Just as dead as a zombie would be. They have no happiness in their hearts and nothing to look forward to. But that next drink or that next high or that next trick, and I think that's sad. And I think it's sad that we as Americans don't fight back and say hey, god dammit. The constitution is for me. Remember we the people. So get your Bibles off the Constitution and get off our backs. And let us live our lives. I think it said that we've got someone as blatantly homophobic is Clayton Williams running for governor and it gets sad that we let the City Council do something as racist as they did Friday and nobody speak out against it. Anyway, we could go on and on and on, but we're not going to do that because if I do I really get mad. So let's listen to Harvey Milk. This was recorded five months after he was elected in Dallas, Texas, and he had to pay his \$4 Girl They get there from the bus. They didn't pick him up at the airport. His political victory marks a civil rights victory. It is undeniable to me that the gay liberation movement represents the advanced guard of the human rights movement, a victory for gay liberation is a victory for all the oppressed minorities, the man that inspired those words, Harvey Milk

And so much to do in your being here, is making that commitment. I jokingly said, I'm here to recruit you. I don't have to because As your being here is that commitment. And the message that everybody has to say is that without a commitment, you just occupying space, we had better make that commitment. Because we cannot afford not to that the movement that we hear about the Anita Bryan's and the John Briggs is in California and their counterparts throughout the country are trying to legalize bigotry. And we better be prepared for it. And we better make that commitment. And for those who don't understand, you better read the gay history. And I think Don Amador will let you know about that tomorrow for those who have forgotten and read those history books, because you've got to make that commitment. It is very dangerous. Based on what we've seen already, every ounce of tolerance is going to be attacked. And every bit of bigotry will surface. We just had a primary in California. And think about this. In San Francisco, we very seldom have races for judgeships, they use a kind of fait accompli, please, when you do have a race is probably the most dull race you could imagine. Each telling which law school they went to. And this year, we had one race, there were three people in order to avoid a runoff, you must get 50% of the vote. It just so happened that one of the people was a woman in which the gay community banded behind. She also was supported by all the financial interests downtown that was probably the first time we've ever agreed on the candidate. And every wealthy name in the city was supporting her. And so every single gay person that I know, there are exceptions. And the weekend before, in Liberal San Francisco in a doe judges race, a piece of literature went out 45,000 pieces went out to the homes in the most conservative areas of San Francisco. And on the back it said who was supporting whom, and to this other judge, it mentioned the police officers group, this distinguished conservative, that distinguished conservative and it said who is supporting oliverie MC tropic tois. And said, as she quoted herself in one of the gay publications, she regards herself as an honorary homosexual, and she supported by Harvey Milk and Carlos Silva. And there was the fag hags smear in Liberal San Francisco, in a judge race. And I found out the names of the people who put that out. And they were part of the progressive wing of the Democratic Party. And you can be sure the bigots are out there smiling. And so we better better be prepared. Because it's not going to be easy. Because we've heard quite often today and yesterday in the papers about this movement from the right, I use a bad pun, I refer to it as the third, right. And we know what they are doing. But we don't realize a two of the aspects. And one is who is talking about the most and you will find out it is the media that is controlled by the right, telling us about it over and again, so that we starting to believe that it is the package on the shelf that everybody's by him. And so that the legislators believe that indeed is a movement to the right and so the registered legislators are moving to the right. And the media from the right and say in the nation is moving to the right, to convince us that it is happening. And we are buying it. We ourselves are buying it. We look at the defeats. But stop and think of what's really happening in this nation in 1977. In Dade County, was an election that took away the rights of gay people, which in 1975, did not exist. In the two weeks before and after Dade County, more was written about homosexuality than in the entire history of mankind. That in every household, they talked about it they may have said you need our prayers, but they talked about it. And that was the opening of dialogue. And in every single city of this country in every town. The issue the love that did not speak his name, spoke its name and dialogue is the beginning of understanding. In 1977. A gay person was elected to public office in California in 1977. The State of Mississippi lowered the penalties on marijuana and Mississippi in a night 77 was the conventions of conventions in Houston. And I say yes, there's a movement to the right. But there's a god damn good movement to the left too.



And I am not. And I am not going to buy, I am not going to buy their packaging, I am concerned, I am aware, I know what they are doing. I know the money they are putting together, I know the way they are chipping us away one by one, I know the way that tactics, but I know I was, and I'll be on my defense, but I'm going to be on my offense to I'm going to put them on the defense, I'm going to put them on real soon real fast. And it's up to you to do the same thing that us fight that put them where they belong. And let's turn the tide around. I think it's like five steps forward and a half a step back. And so they may win some victories. But it's easy to win victories. It's easy. I told the editor of the San Francisco Examiner, the publisher, if I were to put on the ballot in Atlanta, Georgia, should whites be allowed to teach what would be the result he said it would go down to defeat. It's easy. Those are easy victories. And based on them, we think that the world is caving in. Sure era is getting beaten back. But 10 years ago, it didn't exist. And they tell us the movement to the right. It's their last ditch battle. And I think we're going to prevail based on history. And it's up to you to make sure so let me tell you a little bit of what's taking place in California, so that you can relate it to Texas and maybe take the best of what we have. And learn from that and take our mistakes and failures and learn from that. So that you can put together something that is even greater. So I would like to spend a few moments telling you about a few things that's taken place in California to let you know that the left is not remaining silent. You heard earlier about Lieutenant Governor Dan Lee, who made some statements, you must understand Lieutenant Governor timely is black. And as the leader of the black community speaking out for gay rights. Lieutenant Governor diamond, he is putting together the democratic minority coalition. Get for a moment whether you're Democrats, Republicans just forget for a moment. It's possible. But he's putting together the democratic minority Coalition, which is the traditional minorities, the feminist movement, and the gay movement. And by 1990. By 1990, if we register those movements, we will have control of the state. And so our goal is to register, not just our gay sisters and brothers, but the entire minority communities in the state of California, and in the city of San Francisco. In the city of San Francisco, we have a race for May next year. And I don't know who is going to be and I'm not that concerned at this moment. But I will I am concerned is that in five years, it is a member of a minority that includes the gay the feminist movement, as well. And that's all gold in California to take over. So the right is buried once and for all.

Learning and we're learning how to do it because we are learning and we're gonna make a lot of mistakes before it's over. But you can only make mistakes if you try. If you go back into the closet, and hide, you can't make any mistakes. You suffocate. So we're gonna make mistakes. But let me tell you what we've done as examples of where we come in from. Governor Brown was up for reelection. Governor Brown was unchallenged in the primary Oh, there were some minor characters running people like Carnegie Mellon. But there was no competition. And the big liberal meeting was the CDC convention, the California Democratic Club convention in San Diego, where the progressive wing of the Democratic Party meets. And the gay caucus represented almost 15% of our membership. And we submitted to the governor some questions. Quite a few questions. And he didn't quite answer them. And we didn't endorse them. And my statement was, the governor almost answered our questions. And we almost endorsed him. Subsequent to that, all of a sudden now he's meeting with the gay community. We tried to arrange meetings prior to that we couldn't. But now he does, because he's in a tough race for governor in the runoff. And he needs us and many of us will not go easy or cheap. We have questions and we want answers. Both candidates in the Democratic Party The Attorney General fought bitterly for the gay vote bitterly and openly for it. And the mayor of San Francisco would not be mayor. For we're not for the gay vote. We've made the vote, the

the end result, that ballot box because that's where the answer is. You can have all the demonstrations you want, could have all the rallies you want, no other meetings you want. But unless you go out there and push that button or punch the peg hole, or whatever it may be, unless you cast a vote, it's meaningless. And the right understands that. And that's where their strength comes from. And it's us to form our natural allies, whether we like them or not, whether they like us or not, but to form those allies, to once and for all, to get our way to get off share. No more, no less. And so we are using the vote as a way to get the rights. We're not ignoring the other tactics. Everything's needed. But the end result is in that booth. And if you can't get your gay sisters and brothers to understand that we dim the pages of history and those who say what differences my one vote make, let me give you one example. In one district in our city, a candidate one forgetting whether that candidate is good or bad. One by 21 votes, which meant that if one more person in every Fourth Precinct, went out and voted against that person, he would have lost one at a more vote in every Fourth Precinct. And so those people who say my vote doesn't count. You're crazy. It's vital, because it's those one votes that make the difference.
