DIANA Hey, welcome to *After Hours*. You've got the right station folks.

WILLIAMS:

JEWEL GRAY: Party city tonight.

DIANA That's right. My name is Diana Williams and we're here at 90.1 KPFT. With Houston's gay and lesbian, and queer,
WILLIAMS: and bi, and transsexual, and transgender, et cetera, et cetera, et cetera news and entertainment. And we're here. And we're here and we're here for you. The phones are open. We've got lots and lots and lots of people here tonight.

JEWEL GRAY: We're crammed packed tonight.

DIANA And you know what? I have some good news for everybody out there. It's Jewel's birthday. Happy birthday, Jewel.
WILLIAMS:

JEWEL GRAY: I've never had a vegetable pizza before. But I'm telling you, Sarah, sold me.

DIANA Sarah G. can cook. The girl can cook. The house is packed tonight, and we've got more people than you can
WILLIAMS: shake a stick at.

JEWEL GRAY: That's right.

DIANA And they're all going to be here talking to you.
WILLIAMS:

JEWEL GRAY: That's right.

DIANA So stick around. Let's talk about who we have.
WILLIAMS:

JEWEL GRAY: Well, we have--

DIANA A list of people.
WILLIAMS:

JEWEL GRAY: We have Dan Delaney. Thank you, Dan. I knew Dan.

DIANA It was a visual.
WILLIAMS:

JEWEL GRAY: From the soirée aubergine. Is that right? Aubergine.

DIANA Pretty close.

WILLIAMS:

JEWEL GRAY: I'm not good in French. All I know is [FRENCH] and [FRENCH].

DIANA [SPEAKING FRENCH]

WILLIAMS:

JEWEL GRAY: Dan Delaney from the soirée is going to talk about tomorrow's climax. So you need to stay around for that. We have a-- oh, god, I forgot the name.

DIANA Lesbian Teachers Network.

WILLIAMS:

JEWEL GRAY: Lesbian Teachers Network, we have a representative from the Lesbian Teachers Network, who's going to talk in a few minutes, Bonnie. We have.

DIANA Gay Parents Group. Yay, gay parents.

WILLIAMS:

JEWEL GRAY: And the other group?

DIANA And Just For Us, which is kids of assorted ages I'm told.

WILLIAMS:

JEWEL GRAY: We also have the gay veterans group outside who want to talk to us. So we have a jam packed night. It's exciting, we're all up. Everybody's out feasting. We're having a good time, it's like a birthday party. I wish you were here.

DIANA I want to say hi to all our lovers partners and friends who are not with us at the moment. I also want to say hi to
WILLIAMS: Susan Palmer and your parents. If you're listening, hi. Go to sleep, it's past your bedtime. Just kidding. Stick around it'll be fun.

JEWEL GRAY: Karen, we're going to send her home whole. Don't worry about it.

DIANA I'll be here.

WILLIAMS:

JEWEL GRAY: This is not a tape.

DIANA I'm here really.

WILLIAMS:

JEWEL GRAY: So what we're going to do is we're going to talk to all these people tonight and we're going to take lots of phone calls. We've got plenty of people out in the lobby who are going to take phone calls. We have a lot of people here who have a lot of information to give or can answer questions or take comments. So feel free to call us at Jam KPFT, that's 526. I'm reading. 5, 7, something. What is it? 5738. We should write that down.

DIANA Jam KPFT.

WILLIAMS:

JEWEL GRAY: Jam KPFT.

DIANA WILLIAMS: If you have requests, we'll try.

JEWEL GRAY: We'll try the best we can tonight on request. We want this to be an up night, we want you to participate. So call us if you hear something you want to connect with. We also have a surprise guest in the audience tonight in the other room. Polo is here to sit-in with us tonight.

DIANA WILLIAMS: Hi, Polo. He's waving, wave. He's waving.

JEWEL GRAY: Yeah, we can lie.

DIANA WILLIAMS: He is now.

JEWEL GRAY: He is now, right? He's here to sit-in and see what we're doing down here, see if he really wants to hang around with us.

DIANA WILLIAMS: And Binay, if you're out there, where are you girl? You're here just a couple of seconds ago and now you're gone.

JEWEL GRAY: I saw this is as--

DIANA WILLIAMS: I need help. Some of these people are going to be leaving later on and it's going to be just me up here with some of our other guests.

JEWEL GRAY: If we're lucky, we'll get--

DIANA WILLIAMS: If you're awake.

JEWEL GRAY: If we're lucky, we'll get Polo to talk to us just a quick minute about the new After Hours talk-line, where you can call 24 hours. Is it Polo? 24 hours a day to comment on anything about After Hours. Any comments, suggestions, criticisms, we'll take those.

DIANA WILLIAMS: We'll take them. Be nice.

JEWEL GRAY: So I'll have polo talking about the 24 hour talk line for After Hours in a little bit, but right now we're going to go to some music. What are we going to?

DIANA WILLIAMS: Very quickly, we're going to go to a music

JEWEL GRAY: Down at the Frankenstein place, right? "Over At the Frankenstein Place."

DIANA WILLIAMS: I'm going to do some *Rocky Horror Picture Show* for you.

JEWEL GRAY: That's right. Let's do it.

DIANA WILLIAMS: I just love that.

JEWEL GRAY: My headphones just went. I can't hear anything.

DIANA WILLIAMS: I'm coughing on the air.

JEWEL GRAY: We're back. Here we are.

DIANA WILLIAMS: Everyone in the world is here tonight at *After Hours*. And that includes you and we're glad that you're listening. We have a special guest, and Jewel is getting tangled up in headphones right now and can't talk to you because she can't hear.

JEWEL GRAY: Sarah's time, yeah. Yeah, we have Dan here. And Dan here is here special, and I'm here to talk to Dan special because what Dan is doing is very important to me. It should be very important to everybody out there, but it is even more personal for me because what they're doing is raising money for the Bering Community Service Foundation, which is earmarked, especially for the meals program.

DAN DELANEY: And you're a lot easier to deal with when we give you money.

JEWEL GRAY: That's right. Hey.

DAN DELANEY: You're a much nicer person.

JEWEL GRAY: I am very nice. Give me money and I'm easy. Let me tell you. What is it that my coffee cup says not pretty being easy?

DAN DELANEY: That's right.

JEWEL GRAY: Tell me about the soirée, I know that we're getting ready to hit the climax, but tell me about how it's been going.

DAN DELANEY: Soirée, it's just been incredible this year. Last year, we were able to raise 25 six for the Bering Care Center, and we have exceeded that already this year. Tonight, we have a large, large, large representation of the gay community in Houston putting on a show for us at Gentry.

I told you when I came in, I don't think there's any ozone over Gentry right now because of all the hairspray and the wigs. Tomorrow is our soirée grand which is our closing event. It begins at 5:00 with live entertainment, Gail Girouard will be our emcee for the evening. We have a raffle going on and I know you bought a raffle ticket because you want to win the first prize.

JEWEL GRAY: Oh, yes. Actually, I got two now.

DAN DELANEY: We're giving away a Yamaha motorcycle, a trip to new Orleans, a trip to Mexico city. It's going to be a good evening, it really is.

JEWEL GRAY: The tickets are only \$2, how reasonable.

DAN DELANEY: They are \$2 apiece, they're \$3 for six.

JEWEL GRAY: And this motorcycle is \$4,500.

DAN DELANEY: That's right. That's right. Action Cycles.

JEWEL GRAY: A beautiful bike, I saw it.

DAN DELANEY: Action Cycles helped us with that and we're very, very grateful to them.

JEWEL GRAY: We had fingerprints all over it.

DAN DELANEY: We had a silent auction that went very well, doubled what it did last year. The people who have come out have just been tremendous, just tremendous. We've had crowds all month long, we've had benefit shows every Sunday. The crowds have just been wonderful, just wonderful.

JEWEL GRAY: That's great. So tell me a little bit about tomorrow so people know when they can get and come down.

DAN DELANEY: The soirée grand begins at 5:00, it'll go from 5:00 until 10:00. At 10:00, we'll have the drawing for the raffle and we want everybody to be there. Buy the raffle tickets, buy the red ribbons.

JEWEL GRAY: Buy, buy, buy.

DAN DELANEY: That's right. That's right. Well, I just think, if you're healthy, then it's your duty. That's all. So that we can take care of the ones who aren't. We had something really special happen Friday night. We received a proclamation from the city of Houston declaring tomorrow "Soirée Aubergine Day."

JEWEL GRAY: Robert La Mer said that, too. Yes, he did.

DAN DELANEY: We also got a letter from the Texas Department of Health commending us on our work and stating in that letter that we are the only organization in the state of Texas that gives 100% of the monies we raise to the clients. And we're really very proud of that.

JEWEL GRAY: That is something to be proud of. When I was standing there, I thought I heard something about Sheila Jackson Lee.

DAN DELANEY: She sent a proclamation along with another one that we received from ban raise. Bering is a model program for many many people all throughout the country for the work that Bering does. And what we're discovering is that the soirée aubergine committee is becoming a model program for fundraising people.

JEWEL GRAY: I was over at BRB this evening and they were given a-- a large soirée was given a large percentage of money that had been raised by somebody tell me the Royal Sovereign Imperial Court of the Single Star. They had there, what was it tonight?

DIANA WILLIAMS: The crowning coronation.

JIMMY CARPER: Investiture.

DIANA WILLIAMS: Investiture.

DAN DELANEY: They made a wonderful donation. In fact, the show tonight at Gentry is involving the court, it involves people representing Colt 45s, representing the various bars throughout town.

JEWEL GRAY: That's what I thought was wonderful that beyond the bars, they're not playing politics.

DAN DELANEY: That's right. That's right. This is what it's all about and we're just really, really honored and humbled by their presence and thrilled to death with the way things are going.

JEWEL GRAY: Well, Dan, it has been a real pleasure meeting and knowing you. I can't wait to get involved with some of the things we've talked about. I want to let everybody know that these, all this stuff that is going out tomorrow, the money that's coming in is going to the food program, the new kitchen at Bering.

DAN DELANEY: Every dollar.

JEWEL GRAY: Which is going to be a life. Let me tell you, if you've ever been to Bering, you know that we're working out of a kitchen that is the size of a small apartment kitchen to put out 50 meals a day which is next to impossible. We have the greatest volunteers in the world and this is says something to us. It says we support your work.

DAN DELANEY: Well, we were so impressed that with the money that we gave you last year that Bering was able to serve over 19,000 meals out of that kitchen. So the money that we're raising this year, we hope to be able to do a kitchen expansion with you, and give you some facilities to be able to serve even more.

JEWEL GRAY: Well, I know why appreciate it and we all do. A lot of the board members showed up last night.

DAN DELANEY: Oh, it was wonderful. It was wonderful.

JEWEL GRAY: Just to let you guys know how important this is to us. I want to thank you personally for the effort you've put into this and I know that--

DAN DELANEY: I enjoyed it.

JEWEL GRAY: I know that Bering will respond in kind to your effort too.

DAN DELANEY: That's it.

JEWEL GRAY: Please, folks, if you want a good time and you want to help your community, tomorrow will be a good time since you missed the previous events. Tomorrow at 5:00, the soiree grand featuring live music and comedy performance by Gail Girouard, emcee, and Jamie Barstow, Michael Brown Entendre, Diane Barton Brown, Eduardo Lopez De Casa, Bruce Power Randy Hoffman, and Alan Gibson. And at 10:00 PM, they have the raffle grand prize drawing, excuse me. For the motorcycle, trip to new Orleans, round trip ticket to Mexico city and other things.

DAN DELANEY: They'll have some. And if people are out just driving around tonight and they haven't decided what they want to do, the show still going on at Gentry.

JEWEL GRAY: Oh, I forgot. It sure is. It's still early.

DAN DELANEY: So head on over. That's right.

JEWEL GRAY: Well, Dan, I really appreciate your time here and I want you to come down even when you're not doing the soirée.

DAN DELANEY: OK, this sounds like fun. OK, good. Hope to see you all tomorrow.

JEWEL GRAY: Thanks.

DAN DELANEY: All right.

DIANA Good luck. We love it.

WILLIAMS:

JEWEL GRAY: Well that was Dan. And boy, he's a lifesaver for me, I'm telling you. What do you got there?

DIANA We have a special hello and a song, special request this is for Bonnie. It's from Julian friends and we didn't have
WILLIAMS: the exact one you wanted but we have some. We didn't have brave and crazy, but this is for you. It's "Chrome Plated Heart," Melissa Etheridge.

JEWEL GRAY: All right.

DIANA We're back. We are here.

WILLIAMS:

JEWEL GRAY: Who was that for?

DIANA That was for Bonnie, and Bonnie is in the studio tonight. Can you believe it? Can you believe it?

WILLIAMS:

JEWEL GRAY: Boy, I told you we are crowded tonight. We got some of the best looking people I have ever seen at this show.

DIANA Oh, yeah.

WILLIAMS:

JEWEL GRAY: And they're all everywhere, just people everywhere, gay people everywhere.

DIANA And they're all smiling and talking and touching each other and stuff.

WILLIAMS:

JEWEL GRAY: And that's what we like to see down here. It is almost a party here tonight. What a wonderful night. Well, I have Bonnie sitting here with me. Bonnie is with the lesbian teacher.

DIANA I'm here, too.

WILLIAMS:

JEWEL GRAY: Yes, but we're going to talk to Bonnie now. You get the rest of the show.

DIANA Fine.

WILLIAMS:

JEWEL GRAY: We got to give Bonnie her 55 stardom here. Do you want to talk to Bonnie about the lesbian teachers? I mean, you know a couple of the lesbian teachers.

DIANA WILLIAMS: Don't you know some lesbian teachers?

JEWEL GRAY: I know Bonnie.

DIANA WILLIAMS: I know a lot of lesbian teachers.

JEWEL GRAY: You do? I don't know many at all. I mean, I know--

DIANA WILLIAMS: Well, ask her. Ask her.

JEWEL GRAY: Ask her.

DIANA WILLIAMS: How long have you been a lesbian teacher, Bonnie?

JEWEL GRAY: What came first, the lesbian or the teacher? Tell me about your group. Is it in part, you were saying outside it was part of a national group?

BONNIE: What we're working on here in Houston is getting together a teaching network group based on what the national group that started five or six years ago has set forth. And they pretty much started through workshops at the-- are you OK?

JEWEL GRAY: Yeah.

BONNIE: Through workshops at the Michigan women's music festival.

JEWEL GRAY: You mean this is where they started?

BONNIE: Yes, what a surprise.

JEWEL GRAY: Why didn't you tell me that? I love that. That's great.

BONNIE: In fact, I'll read here a little bit of what to say.

JEWEL GRAY: Sure.

BONNIE: This is from actually from their application form. They send out a newsletter periodically or three or four times a year. When you join the national organization then you get this newsletter of course. It says we continue to grow yearly not only through our connection with the Michigan festival, but also through word of mouth and developing connections with other gay and lesbian networks and organizations.

As we continue to grow, we look for more ways to share information and support among our membership. In 1993, a system of regional contacts was designed to help build our membership base and to provide contact and support opportunities throughout the school year.

That's actually about how long we've had an organization here in Houston, we're just still kind of getting off the ground with that. We have a few people who meet about once a month and we meet over at Inklings. We have safe space over there, we meet about once a month and it's very confidential. It's very informal right now but what we're looking at, what I'm really here to promote is our panel discussion coming up on March 27 with the women's group that meets at the Unitarian church.

JEWEL GRAY: So what you're saying about confidential and safe space is that people can come there without worrying about it getting out or somebody passing on the information to somebody else?

BONNIE: We have Inklings kind enough to loan us space to.

JEWEL GRAY: Great, so people can feel free to come down there.

BONNIE: Sure. We try to keep flyers in Inklings to let people know in case they feel comfortable about calling. We do have an LTN number, you can get that number through the gay and lesbian Switchboard of Houston.

JEWEL GRAY: Yay. Got a lot of switchboarders here.

**DIANA
WILLIAMS:** 529-3211.

BONNIE: There we go. Let me tell you a little bit about the panel that we're having. This is going to be in another month I'm just trying to get on early so that people can know about it and plan ahead. It'll be on Sunday March the 27th, the topic is issues in education and we'd like to discuss homosexual issues in education today, not only from the viewpoint of the teacher but from students viewpoints as well. So whether or not you're involved in education if you have an experience to share with us and share with the panel about being a gay or lesbian and coming out in high school or junior high or as an adolescent.

JEWEL GRAY: I'm listening to somebody breathe, that must be you.

**DIANA
WILLIAMS:** I'm breathing.

CREW: I'm really close to her.

**DIANA
WILLIAMS:** Well, I don't have my headphones on so I can't hear myself breathe.

JEWEL GRAY: We're kind of squished in here pretty tight tonight.

**DIANA
WILLIAMS:** I'm just thinking about, I'm just thinking about coming out in high school and some of the gay teachers I knew in high schools.

JEWEL GRAY: Well, that's where I got so hooked on the ode to a gym teacher because I had a gym teacher in high school. I always knew big strong woman. Yeah, I love that. So this is part of the women's group at the first Unitarian church.

BONNIE: Well, we're not associated with the women's group.

JEWEL GRAY: But you're using that forum.

BONNIE: That's right. As I understand, it it's kind of a joint panel.

JEWEL GRAY: Well, I've always had real respect for what went on there at the women's group so letting people know about the women's group at first Unitarian goes on every Sunday and you're going to use that form for this LTN panel. That's right.

BONNIE: That's the plan so far.

JEWEL GRAY: And are you inviting people to come be part of the panel or is that already set?

BONNIE: Absolutely. Whether or not they're members of LTN, in fact, we're trying to get more people to come out to LTN events and we would ideally we'd like to build it up to be more of a network.

JEWEL GRAY: Any of you teachers out there looking for a place to share your experiences and be open with a bunch of other teachers who are like yourself can join the professional organization.

BONNIE: I wanted to mention that that's why I was circling that here. If you're a teacher and you're a member of the American federation of teachers or the NEA, the AFT or the NEA, the National Education Association, I just wanted to mention I learned this. I was at the LTN workshop at Michigan this summer and I did happen to find out that both of those major professional organizations for educators have gay and lesbian caucuses.

JEWEL GRAY: Great.

BONNIE: I was very surprised and very delighted to hear that I know. I don't know much about the AFT branch but the NEA organization charges \$20 a year for dues if you're an NEA member and \$10 if you're not, but they work on issues.

JEWEL GRAY: Well, great. Maybe I'll go there. I have this thing for teachers. I always have.

CREW: That was my next question, do you have to be a teacher or can you just be like, you know.

DIANA WILLIAMS: Be a teacher groupie.

JEWEL GRAY: Yeah, that's cool. For to LTN meeting.

CREW: What about those kind of people who just like to fall in love with teachers? No, just kidding. One track mind.

DIANA WILLIAMS: That would be the lesbian singles network.

BONNIE: Come to the panel and share your experiences.

JEWEL GRAY: So what you're saying here is that you can come down and participate in this conversation not just be witness to it? And if you want to, you can just come down and watch and learn from it. You don't have to be a teacher to listen and learn from it.

BONNIE: Absolutely.

JEWEL GRAY: Tell me some of the issues that might come up at this. I mean, just off the top of your head. I'll put you in a spot here, but the kind of issues that might arise in this panel.

BONNIE: Well, the first thing that comes to mind with me particularly having been a teacher for a while is the issue with students that are uncomfortable with homophobic students, I guess, for lack of a better word.

JEWEL GRAY: Homophobic. So dealing with a gay teacher or a homophobic just gay teachers?

BONNIE: Fortunately, I haven't had that problem.

JEWEL GRAY: Doing what they can.

BONNIE: But students frequently needless to say call each other names. How to jump in and tactfully deal with that? I mean, that's been my own personal experience of having to-- that's been my experience of having to deal with homophobia.

JEWEL GRAY: Well, would some part of this panel, this is just questions I have because I do know some teachers. With some of the part of this panel discuss some of the upcoming, I mean maybe some recommendations to some of the school boards about including--

DIANA WILLIAMS: Employment policies, things like that or what?

JEWEL GRAY: Well, it doesn't mean our teaching.

BONNIE: I would hope. That's why I think what we like to hear from people and what would their experiences have been, particularly if they've had any dealings with discrimination on the job.

JEWEL GRAY: Bonnie, let me ask you, are you out at work?

BONNIE: Oh, no, no, absolutely not.

JEWEL GRAY: How long have you been a teacher?

BONNIE: Four years.

JEWEL GRAY: Four years. Do you know any teachers that are out?

BONNIE: I think several. Several.

JEWEL GRAY: One that we commonly know.

BONNIE: It depends on your position and it depends on if you're in a particular, if you're at a school at the administration. I think too it depends on the area around here the part of town.

JEWEL GRAY: I hear you. Well, how people are going to deal with it outside as well as inside.

BONNIE: Sure.

JEWEL GRAY: Well, Bonnie--

SARAH I have one more question for you. I know I have a lot of friends that are teachers, including my lover, and we

DEPALMA: were just recently upset about because they can't really be out at school, they take little subtle ways of saying that they're out like by having a rainbow sticker on their car or something. Recently, there was an article in the newspaper in the style section about the gang bashing incident in Tyler. And on the front page of the style section, there was rainbow flag right up at the top and it said, right next to the American flag and it said, "the rainbow flag is a symbol of gay and lesbian" whatever.

We had to go immediately take the rainbow flag off the car because we were so worried about her job and that was the one little thing she could do to be out, and now she doesn't feel like she can do that anymore. She was talking about joining some group like this. And we talked to many other teachers and they all feel the same way. There needs to be something they can do some little token of saying that they're gay teachers. Do you think that this would be a good place for that?

BONNIE: I wish we had a handshake or something.

SARAH Secret code.

DEPALMA:

BONNIE: I don't know. I think, yeah, I was going to say, I think most of us are attuned enough to each other. The gaydar goes off when you walk on campus and you can immediately tell. I tell you how I dealt with that problem, I also have a rainbow sticker on my car, I just back my car into the parking space. I'm too proud to take it off the car but at the same time, I do have to mind my peace.

JEWEL GRAY: Well, that's a good question, Sarah.

SARAH So what about gender issues.

DEPALMA:

BONNIE: I don't wear rainbow rings to school and things like that.

SARAH We have a friend that's a gym teacher that wears rainbow T-shirts to school. And now since that, she can't do

DEPALMA: that anymore.

JEWEL GRAY: My aunts took the *TWT* sticker off the back of the car because *The Chronicle* did a big article about stickers in town and what they meant. Off came the *TWT* sticker.

SARAH Male teachers.

DEPALMA:

JEWEL GRAY: I have a good question, what about male teachers?

SARAH What's the percentage--

DEPALMA:

JEWEL GRAY: Lesbian teachers network, what about male teachers?

BONNIE: I don't know if there's an organization for--

CREW: No, no. Are they welcome or is it I'm in space?

BONNIE: Actually, that hasn't been an issue that's been addressed yet.

CREW: I mean, because this is-- There are a lot of male teachers.

JEWEL GRAY: Oh, sure.

CREW: The fact that like Inklings sometimes have "women only" spaces and women's networks sometimes are close to men. I was just wondering, if they were to call, would you have a meeting open to them or have it to where they could come?

BONNIE: Not really, I was going to say. They didn't tell me that [INAUDIBLE]. Call Switchboard. Call Switchboard. And the Switchboard can put you in touch with LTN at least. It can be resolved.

JEWEL GRAY: We'll be able to answer that question.

BONNIE: Taken care of and so forth.

JEWEL GRAY: Well, for all you teachers out there, Bonnie will be here for a little while to take some calls. If you want to talk to Bonnie and get a little more invitation, information about this group, a little more personal information, we'll tie Bonnie to the phone, it looks like I'm going to have to. But we'll keep her here until about 1:00. So if you've got some calls, if you want to talk to Bonnie, she's going to be here to answer some questions. That number is-- where did I write that?

DIANA WILLIAMS: JAM KPFT.

JEWEL GRAY: 526-5738. 526-5738. If you're interested in LTN or the soirées, Dan is still out there. Or talking to Polo or anybody else.

BONNIE: Or if you want to just say "happy birthday to Jewel."

JEWEL GRAY: Yes, that's right. Call.

DIANA WILLIAMS: Happy birthday, Jewel.

JEWEL GRAY: Call or fax me my happy birthday. Oh, we're going to do Pink again. I love that outfit.

DIANA WILLIAMS: This is Pink.

BONNIE: Can I add some one more thing?

JEWEL GRAY: Yes, one more thing.

BONNIE: When we have our monthly meetings with LTN, typically we have an informal brunch before or after this when we have our March 27 meeting, the panel meeting at the women's group, we're going to have an informal brunch afterwards at Cafe Noche.

JEWEL GRAY: At Cafe Noche.
