And let's see what we have here the Montrose Counseling Center, you know, in conjunction with the Houston gay and lesbian Political Caucus, which reports on crimes that appear motivated by bias against victims sexual orientations, gender or HIV status has reported almost 3000 bias crimes against members of the lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and HIV positive community were reported in 1997. And they get their information from the National Coalition of anti violence programs. And this was announced in a report that was released on March the second earlier this week. But the closet and fear of police mean a very large percentage of anti lesbian, gay bisexual transgender violence remains undocumented compared with the double digit increases in other crimes nationwide in both 1997 and 96. The statistics clearly show that hate motivated violence constitute continues to be a very serious problem. That report says also from 1996 to 97, anti gay hate crimes committed in the month of March increased by 30%. And those committed in April Rose 25%. And that's a very shocking surge. And a lot of it's attributed to the week of media frenzy and right when the attacks preceding the April 30. Coming out issue. I mean, coming out episode of ABC, Ellen.

Now, that's hard to believe that, that those numbers indicate that Houston is a progressive liberal and understanding city. It's just that we are grossly under reporting in the Houston area.

Okay. Now, in Houston, the number of reported anti gay hate crimes tripled, tripled, from 30, from 13 and 96. To that 35 last year. Now those numbers shouldn't be considered at an accurate reflection on the amount of anti gay violence in the city. Now, the Montrose Counseling Center began tracking hate crimes in July of 96. And the missing early months of that year, may account for the difference in numbers. Now the counseling Senate receives reports of hate crimes from those who seek treatment there and referrals from the Houston Police Department. Now, however, victims fear talking to the police, and the police just aren't trained to recognize hate crimes when they are reported. Victims may be very reluctant to report a hate crime because of repercussions, especially if the victim is in the closet. And the people at the council Senator also think that a lot of people, particularly in the gay community, don't have a real strong feeling of trust with the police. Why do you think that they think that the police may literally laugh at them and not take them seriously? Yeah.
