He's dying soon, too. The thing was, I just didn't want to cry. I didn't want to be in the middle of telling her and then cry. I almost didn't tell her. I almost. You're lying. That's all she said. You're lying over and over again. You're lying. You're lying. You're lying. Tell me you're lying. She flew down. The next day. My doctor gave her a stack of articles and clipping so big. She almost couldn't carry them. And then he said they really didn't know anything. We went to my place. And she read it all. She read it and gasped and read it aloud to me. And I said I didn't want to know and she read it anyway. She sat there and read the whole stack and didn't even get up to go to the bathroom, which is really quite a feat for my mother. And then she set the last piece aside and turned to me and asked why. I broke out the bourbon who was the only thing I could think of. She asked me what she did wanted to know what she did wrong. She wanted me to know she really didn't know she was doing anything wrong. It was charming. Her upset and guilty over making me gay, me upset and guilty over making her upset and guilty. And last night there was a debate between the two major mayoral candidates, present Mayor Kathy Whitmire and former mayor Louis Welsh at the Galleria area. At the debate, somebody yelled out from their unknown Romans where the end of the debate got as much attention as

Hudson who was trying to let everybody know that he's also running as a mayoral candidate and wanted to be up there on stage. But this person yelled out, Mayor Wittmeyer You're spreading AIDS. And also campaigners for another less well known mayoral candidate Susan director had passed out leaflets making the same charge before the debate begun. I wasn't at this debate, I was invited to go there. And unfortunately, I had other business and that was the business ed, gay Political Caucus. Last night was endorsement. Meeting and first time since I've been part of the caucus, and first time in recent history the past few years, there was no endorsements. There is nobody seeking endorsements on a major of any major candidates. Seems as though we are no longer in vogue. Or we are no longer a plus, I guess no, we're a liability. And he so called friends, which I am not going to use that term anymore in City Hall, no longer seek our endorsement. They feel they don't need us. As a matter of fact, that President of gay Political Caucus, and the political coordinator met with the mayor's people before the meeting endorsement meeting last night. And they asked for no endorsement and even asked us to do any recommendations. And as a matter of fact, and also had a press release that they wanted us to handouts from GPC. Can you imagine the nerve of the see people asking us to hand out a press release that they have prepared for us? I just think that's absolutely incredible. Meeting was really long last night. So it started a little bit late. And at last past 1030, probably more towards 11 and 15. What was needed was a lot of people venting out their anger, their outrage in talking about what we should do. What was the direction we should take? They didn't ask for our endorsement. Should we give it to them anyway, it's called talking about city council and the mayor. Should we not recommend it recommend Should we ask our people to stay away from the polls? What has happened? It seems as though once the referendum came out. They thought GPC was a liability with the 80 to 20% defeat that we had two years ago, we've screened in almost every race, majority of the races. And some areas, we had more than one candidate seeking endorsement. We had a few candidates seeking endorsements. In two years, we've come a long way. And unfortunately, it's it hasn't been a positive way. But it seems as though they look at us differently as they did two years ago. It sort of galls me, where we've come into ears. Pokey Anderson got up and really gave a wonderful speech last night. I wish I can remember a lot of things she said. But I don't know where we go. And that's basically what her speech was saying. What what do we do? We have a lot of our people already contributing to the campaigns contributing to Mayor Kathy Whitmire working in the campaigns. And the problem is we're an invisible minority. These people are going out there and thinking that everything the mayor does is wonderful. She has been a good mayor for the city, a very good mayor for this city. However, what Has she given us? There is no Montrose Library. There still is a lot of problems with the traffic problem here on lower Westheimer. Montrose has not been exactly a thriving community in the past few years, of course, the city has had a downswing in the economy, and that necessarily can't be blamed on one particular candidate. So what do we do? Do we secretly recommend that you vote for somebody has that has done a good job for the city? Maybe not necessarily for the community. And what I'm speaking here is definitely my opinion. And sort of my outrage also on what's going on. Somebody who works just a few hours a day he has this type of job that he doesn't need to work all these hours asked me what he can do. And he says he's very interested in working for Kathy Whitmire. In her campaign, and I didn't discourage him, I sort of laid out the facts. And I said, Well, that's great. If you want to get involved in politics, we really need all of our people to get involved in some way if all of our people to get involved we wouldn't be in this predicament. What has happened over the past two years at GPC was a ground grassroots organization, registered voters endorse people with the toughest screening process in the city, most thorough, Fairest, hardest. And it also seemed that there were people who registered to screen but then at last minute cancelled, there was one candidate, one minor candidate that did screen and another candidate running for district see who spoke to the caucus last night minor candidate, however, gay candidate, wherever we come, it seems as though the other

side has learned our tactics at registering voters organizing grassroots level, however, they are bigger than us. They have a lot more money than we do. And they're identifiable people, house wise, conservative people. That's the Moral Majority type of people. So I don't know where we go. We're at the end of the meeting last night, it was basically not a real concern. The the, what the caucus voted on was no endorsement, no recommendations. We will however, encourage our people to go to the polls and vote their conscience. And the mayor will probably win. I don't know. I mean, the polls say she is going to win right now. However, what was brought up was that the referendum registered an awful lot of voters on the other side. And also it should be noted in the referendum that we did exactly what they had asked us what the mayor's office had asked us to do. And we tried very hard to raise money. Things are not working right good now between what's going on with AIDS and what's going on with the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals and upholding 2106. What really galls me also is that nobody screened. That was a major candidate, not even our own district council person, George graininess seems as though some of these people were scheduled, George Comenius was scheduled service Ernest McGowan. And my understanding that Eleanor tensing was going to screen however, she was out of the country. But there seemed to be an effort downtown of people comparing notes that they decided that it would be best for everybody if nobody would screen that's, of course, my opinion. Good evening. This is Jack Valinski with news of interest for Wilde 'N' Stein listeners for September 18 1985. stories tonight including Houston Chronicle poll on the mayoral election showing that the mayor will not be defeated because of our stance on gay rights and an international look on AIDS. Eight months after an explosive referendum. Mayor Kathy Whitmire support for job protection for gays on a city payroll remains her weakest point. But the results of the Chronicle poll indicate that the gay issue alone will not be enough to defeat her. The gay rights issue is a vulnerable factor in the election. Because the referendum brought out many new voters who can be contacted easily by get out the vote forces mustered by Wittmeyer as principal opponent, former mayor Louis Welch and the anti gay straight slate of the city council candidates for Wittmeyer. Her support for gays is our single most vulnerable issue, said Richard Murray, the University of Houston professor who conducted the poll at the UNH Public Affairs Research Center. When asked an open ended question about what they like dislike most about Wittmeyer 19% of the poll participants said they did not like her ties to the gay community. In polling terminology. An open ended question is one without a list of possible answers. Wittmeyer is lead among the voters who skipped the referendum and supporters of the gay rights measure. The poll indicated that remains the support of 29% of the poll participants who said they voted against the two measures in January. Among the white voters interviewed in the poll 75% of the anti gay rights voters preferred Welch who was trying to unseat Wittmeyer and regain the office he held from 1964 to 1974. Where he says if the Wells camp wants to win, they got to get out her pro gay rights stance more important. Wittmeyer has two successful campaigns for mayor. Gay voters played a high profile in her victories, and she toured gay bars to thank her supporters after the 1983 re election. Since the referendum however, Wittmeyer said that the voters had spoken on the issue, and she has declined further comment. Wittmeyer leads Welch in a poll by a margin of 46% to 39%. And her strengths among the anti referendum voters is an important element in her lead, Marie said many people are willing to forgive her for her position. Other issues are more important to them. Well, she's got to do more on the gay rights issue if he wants to win in extraordinary turnout in a special election. Houston voters rejected by a four to one margin to Job rights measure that had been approved by city council in June 1984. About 30% of the vote, voters went to the polls Wittmeyer stands the referendum troubles some of her strong supporters, such as one affluent poll participant who likes her honesty and responsibility, but said she took the wrong stance on gay rights among strong row supporters. The major issues includes his values and his moral stance. He stands for the things I stand for said one participant in survey, Murray said Houston is not much different than the rest of the nation. There has been an upsurge in the visibility of gays because the AIDS epidemic, The Rock Hudson case and the fear of AIDS in the schools. Wells camp parent strategies have said that they will not attack Wittmeyer directly on the gay rights issue. But

well, she's already had broadcast television advertisement discussing his family values in his speech last Tuesday. Well as a former Houston Chamber of Commerce President reminded the audience that wit Meyers changed her chambers side called them bigots in the opposition to the referendum. The poll surveyed opinions about 600 registered Houston voters between September 3 and the 10th. Here are some of the results concerning the gay rights in the January 19 referendum. Well, it's received supportive 63% of those poll participants who said they voted against the referendum. Wittmeyer has a support of 29% and 8% are undecided. among white Baptists 77% said they support wells, white voters who said they were members of the Church of Christ or Assembly of God support at Walsh net poll by a margin of 80% to 20%. Among the supporters of a referendum, 89% said they support wittmeyer and 10% said they support it Welsh among black voters who represent what my biggest block vote said she received the support about 84% of the poll participants who said they voted against the job rights referendum wittmeyer leads 69% to 22% Among the poll participants who did not vote on January 19. A 29 year old man with AIDS was the first person Britain ordered confined in a hospital under a new anti AIDS Law because he posed the risk to the community. Health officials said the man detained in isolation unit in Mosul Hospital in Manchester suffers from campiness bleeding, but was warned not to leave the hospital. And he had wanted to the magistrate's court in a five minute hearing over the weekend, or did the man continued stay in the hospital for three weeks under a new law which took effect in March, designed to halt the spread of Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome. It had not been used before. Health officials acknowledge most AIDS patients pose no risk to the community at large. But Dr. Donald Arvidsson, our government's chief medical officer, so this case the patient posed a risk to the community and himself if he were not detained in the hospital. The patient is unfortunately bleeding obviously from a large number of places and he is very ill he said it was felt that these circumstances it would be risky for him to leave the hospital, Archana. The man has since agreed that it would be best interest for him to stay in the hospital. Dr. Ernest Jones Manchester City Medical officer had told the court in a release from the hospital would be the most dangerous thing. He is reaching to the far corners of the world international health authorities report a total of 15,000 people in 43 countries had acquired immune deficiency syndrome as of August 30, the World Health Organization said of those 13,000 victims we're in the United States where the sexually transmitted virus has taken on epidemic proportions since the disease was first recognized in 1981. From Britain, where the tattooist Federation is turning away homosexual customers to Australia where health officials say aid scare has led to the eviction of some gay tenants from their homes. If you're spreading in many countries, China has banned imports of the blood products which carry the AIDS virus. In the United States. widespread use of the aid screening test has led authorities to declare Americans blood supply free of AIDS in Poland. The health ministry is asking high risk groups homosexuals, drug addicts hemophiliacs to volunteer for tests for the virus. Officials in Tokyo say 1/3 of Japan's hemophiliacs now carry the virus. The average number of AIDS cases in Western Europe and the United States doubled every six months until 1983. And is now doubling every year reports W H O which is headquartered in Geneva, noting the decline in the rate of increase. W H O officials said he hopes the crisis will be over by 1990. I think you'll have a residue of cases you'll have to live with. But it won't be our top priority. Frankly Ashley, Chief of W H. O 's communicable disease Department said people are changing their sexual habits in response to the education drive by governments. There is no cure for AIDS and scientists are not optimistic about the chances of developing a vaccine soon, the fatality rate is close to 50% and is expected to rise. No one is known to have recovered from AIDS in North America, Europe, Australia and Japan ally 70% of the victims are homosexual men, intravenous drug users hemophiliacs and blood transfusion recipients also are at high risk of contracting the virus since it appears to be transmitted through blood semen and probably other body fluids. But the syndrome which strips away the body's ability to fight off infection is not confined to these

groups. In Africa where the virus is believed to have originated, it has been difficult to identify any group of particular risk said Who article Belgium has the highest per capita incidence of AIDS in Western Europe, with 99 cases reported as of August 30 or 8.2 cases for every million residents. Of those 73 victims were from Central Africa, mostly Zaire the rapid spread of AIDS in developing countries took health officials and the public by surprise, a sense of panic combined with a popular misconception about how the virus is contracted has led to prejudice against a major group of victims. Male homeless sexuals when British fireman's union advise its members not to get mouth to mouth resuscitation to suspect suspected homosexuals. A corner refused to perform an autopsy on an AIDS victim in Australia, where 109 AIDS cases have been reported. doctors warned that up to 50,000 people may be carrying the virus diseases considering a leading public health problem in Milan, where 50 of Italy 60 for AIDS cases have been reported. Some medical personnel have refused to treat AIDS patients. Italian Health officials say the W H O is organizing an international research and education campaign against AIDS. In Australia, sperm paint sperm bank donors are checked if they are found to be contaminated, is destroyed. But the evidence strongly indicates that AIDS is transmitted only when a person is exposed to direct and large doses of the virus through blood or semen. What means can you get? Does that mean you can't get it from kissing or sharing food with an infected person or such contact? Doctors can't rule out such things completely. But there is no evidence that AIDS is spread this way and the chances appear very slim. What about mosquitoes? Can they spread it? There is no evidence that they can spread virus but studies are going on. How is AIDS mostly spread? The vast majority of people who have AIDS were exposed to the virus to sexual intercourse with someone who has been infected. More than half the cases may be specifically through anal intercourse. Can women get AIDS? Yes, 857 women have AIDS about 1% of all victims. They can get it through vagina or annual sex with infected men or from sharing Dural needles during drug usage. What is the best way to avoid exposure? Avoid sexual contact with anyone who may be at higher risk that includes gay man or bisexual men, IV drug users and prostitutes. The more sexual partners you have, the higher the risk can run. Consult your local health

authorities about safe sex practices. How have children gotten AIDS 80% of the 167 AIDS victims under the age 16 acquired disease at birth from infected mothers mothers 20% were infected through blood products. None have contracted the disease from contact with another person. In such cases such contact casual contact as occurred with classroom is very unlikely to spread the virus. Our blood transfusions now safe. Yes, the blood is now tested by it for the HTLV three virus infected infected blood is discarded. Who should get the HTLV blood test? People who think they may have been exposed to the virus can get it through their doctors are one of several 100 clinics around the USA. If you have the virus when you get AIDS, it has been estimated that about 1 million people in the USA have been exposed. But no one knows how many will actually develop disease. estimates range from five to 30%. It is uncommon for people to be carriers of the virus and never get.
