While the word marriage gets used without distinction in this debate, it refers to two very different things, the religious or spiritual bond of marriage and the state recognition of a relationship for financial and legal purposes. Properly speaking, the state has neither the right nor the power to grant marriages in religious in a religious sense. As a Christian, I believe marriage is performed by the church and by God not granted by the State. I assume other religions have similar similar perspectives. The state merely recognizes the union of a husband and wife and in no way creates or legitimizes their marriage. The government only recognizes marriage for the convenience and handling property, taxation, inheritances, and etc. and other situations. Other

situations when such recognition is expedient visitation rights in hospitals, etc. The second meaning of marriage is a secular operation of the state and neither regulates nor reflects upon the religious bonds of a marriage. The Church and its teaching should govern marriage in its religious sense, but marriage as recognized by the state is a legal practice and cannot be defined by religious institutions. The US government and the state of Texas provide religious liberty by remaining secular. We are free to worship if and how we want because the government does not exert political power over religious issues. To protect religious freedom government, governmental raised, recognition of marriage must remain entirely in the secular sphere of social life. White dentists, any state claim to regulate the religious act of marriage goes beyond political action and threatens the freedom of religion guaranteed by the disinterested secular government. In this light, every state recognition of marriage amounts to a secular civil union. This does not this didn't this does not didn't denigrate the sanctity of marriage, rather than affirms the religious importance of marriage by defining by denying the state has the right to own it. The church decision on whether it will bless same sex unions can and should be carried out in the context of the church traditions and teachings. The secular state, however, must remain blind to religious distinctions among citizens in ensuring religious freedom means the state must be secular, that it must be indifferent to its citizens when I just believe in it cannot base legal policy on religious teachings, every citizen of the state must be guaranteed the same rights granted to it as other citizens. If the state finds it reasonable to grant legal rights and privileges to heterosexual citizens living in a committed relationship, it cannot justify denying the same rights to homosexual citizens. In Texas, a man and a woman achieve a common law marriage simply by living together and holding property in common. No ceremony or intent is required. The legislation banning homosexual civil unions is deeply is a deeply moral issue. But the question is not about sexual ethics. It's about the question of discrimination. From women's infringement to civil rights movement, the United States in the past century has consistently come down against discrimination and for equal treatment under the law, the real moral issue at stake is banning civil unions, in banning civil unions is the state's unconscionable discrimination against a minority of its citizens. As an American, and especially as a Christian, I cannot support such discrimination. That position remains valid, no matter what your convictions about the morality of homosexuality, I hope that you will seriously consider this perspective while evaluating the proposed marriage legislation. And please remind your representatives that the greatness of our democracy is demonstrated when the majority make every effort to defend the threatened rights of a minority. And that was a letter
