wrap a summary of some of the news in or affecting the lesbian and gay community for the week ending December 16 2000. The Supreme Court of Canada this week ruled in the long running case of Canada Customs abuses against Vancouver's gay and lesbian little sisters bookstore. The small store relies on US imports for 80 to 90% of its stock, and since 1984, Canada Customs has seized more than 260 titles added there on grounds of obscenity. Many of those same titles crossed the border to mainstream stores with no problems, and some can even be found in the Vancouver Public Library. Other gay and lesbian materials were held by customs to be obscene when nearly identical depictions of heterosexual acts were allowed to pass. The trial judge who first heard the case in 1994 found that customs agents were systematically targeting little sister's imports for wrongful delay, confiscation, destruction, damage, prohibition and Miss classification. The Supreme Court was also very sympathetic to little sisters and highly critical of customs actions, but its ruling did little to change them for the future. It upheld the obscenity law as a reasonable infringement on free expression rights, and it upheld almost all of the customs law as well. The one change it ordered is that it will now be up to customs to prove that an item is obscene, rather than the burden of proof being on the importer to show what is not. That could mean customers paying out significant damages for its mistakes when importers go to court. But to his six member majority of the nine member High Court bench, it is not the customs law supporting obscenity seizures that is flawed, but only its implementation, and they left the law intact while calling on the department to improve its performance. Three dissenters argued vigorously that the extent of the abuses proved that the law is flawed in its failure to offer any protections to free expression and wanting to strike down customs law as it applies to expressive materials. University of Toronto law professor Brenda Cosman and expert in obscenity law called it a profoundly disappointing decision. Law Professor Nicola Viollet, speaking for the national group, a gal equality for gays and lesbians everywhere, called a date partial victory. She said the real victory in this is the Supreme Court of Canada recognizing gays and lesbians have been unfairly treated in applying the laws on obscenity. little sister's manager Janine Fuller said. Effectively reversing a US Supreme Court ruling relating to free expression of federal judges found the University of Wisconsin's handling of mandatory student fees unconstitutional. Many state universities in the US use similar systems. For more than four years a group of Christian conservative students have been attacking the UW fee system because it has forced them to give financial support to groups they disagree with, including the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender Campus Center. The actual contribution of a single student to any given campus group is well under \$1. Earlier this year, in a case named for plaintiff Scott Southworth, the US High Court unanimously rejected the argument that the fee system constituted forced speech that violated the student's first amendment rights. It accepted instead, the university's

argument that the peace system creates an open forum for a diversity of views. But the High Court left a loophole that allowed a trial court to consider whether the system of allocating the funds is truly viewpoint neutral. The conservative students seized on that, even though in the Southworth case they had stipulated that the system was viewpoint neutral. In a case named for plaintiff Kendra Frey, US District Court Judge John Shivas, who had decided for the plaintiffs in the Southworth case I found that to require University of Wisconsin students to pay a fee to subsidize expressive speech without any protection of the rights of students who object to the funded speech is a violation of the First Amendment. He objected to the broad discretion allowed to the student committee determining allocations describing committee members is acting as government officials and equating their election to a campus referendum on funding student groups, giving the university 60 days to revise its system. He ordered an end to the use of mandatory student fees to support political and ideological activities. The university has not yet decided whether to appeal

there are no appeals left for Oklahoma lesbian Wanda Jean Allen, who is scheduled in January to become the first African American woman to be executed since the US reinstated the death penalty in 1976. She will be the first woman executed in Oklahoma since it became a state. unimpressed by her plea to please let me live and the presence of about 100 demonstrators. Oklahoma's pardons and parole board this week voted three to one to let her sentence stand. Oklahoma Governor Frank Keating has indicated he will not intervene. Ellen was convicted of first degree murder and sentenced in 1989. After shooting to death her partner Gloria Leathers in front of a police station, the women had met in prison, where Alan was serving time for manslaughter after shooting to death her previous partner Dedra Pettis, a number of gay and lesbian civil rights groups have joined death penalty opponents in taking up balance cause they say that as a result of childhood brain injuries. She has a low IQ and a tendency to become confused and act impulsively problems which were diagnosed early in her life but were never treated and which did not come to light until after her trial. They also say she had inadequate legal representation. In particular a lawyer who had never before tried a capital case who tried to withdraw because of that, but was denied by the court. They allege the trial was tainted by classism, racism and homophobia.

British judges this week received some basic training against homophobia, with the judicial studies boards publication of the second installment of its equal treatment bench book. The book is distributed to all 4000 full time judges and tribunal chairs in England and Wales, designed to sensitize this group overwhelmingly composed of older white heterosexual males of higher socio economic classes to the experiences of others. The material on sexuality warns against stereotyping and assumptions that can lead to offence and injustice. Some of its specific lessons are that homosexuality is not an illness and not contagious, that it has nothing to do with pedophilia, and poses no special risk for abusing children. And that for transgendered people, cross dressing can be an inescapable emotional need. It also notes that if gays and lesbians appear less than candid judge you should remember that it may represent a lifetime of fear of exposure.

To non lesbians single women have also conceived by IVF in Victoria, while four more lesbians and 18 other non lesbian single women are currently undergoing treatment. And with it a casual portrayal of gay men on TV that might, depending on your point of view, portend a pleasant waltz forward or a mincing two steps backwards and I have seen the show by the way, it is kind of funny. Although street smarts has been on the air now for almost a year, most people don't know

about its existence because of its late viewing time. Like 1230. And most timezones, that's 12:30am you also might not know about it because of its unabashedly low brow, roll your eyes to have an concept, which simply just hasn't caught much press. In this meager late night antidote to Mr. Philippine Juggernaut, a winning contestant might walk off with no more than a few \$100.22 minutes of airtime, which is more money than you'd get for appearing, say on Jerry Springer. Yet not really as humiliating as having to pretend to fight with your lover who's really your brother, who's really having sex with your best friend who's really having sex with his father the trends is but transvestite just to be seen on television? Well, the premise is, which for somebody who's probably paid a lot of money to contestants have to determine which have three previously recorded man woman on the street interviewees knows the answers to questions that most 10 year olds would find unchallenging. If the contestants can predict correctly after hearing the pop trivia common knowledge question. They accumulate cash points and ultimately win. The problem or the high concept that it is the hapless contestants are rarely more street smart than the three low gene pool interviewees. Questions are basic such as what is a platonic relationship? Can you pronounce and explain the word chaos? were among the more difficult queries posed on recent shows. The contestants inability to answer correctly serves up some of the show's most entertaining value. Sometimes it's quite funny and other times it's simply baffling that they're actually standing upright with opposable thumbs. Now for the gay angle. Among the 10 shows that I've seen, there was a higher than expected presence of obviously gay men involved on at least four out of the 10 episodes. The first two seemed like coincidence until the other queens and I use the word specifically sashayed interview. With a definite trend emerging. The producers seem to have stumbled upon a winning comic concept. Queenie, gay men with nary a shred of the good common sense that their mamas should have hooked into their pretty little bleached heads. They make for very amusing contestants. Imagine that funny queens who would have thunk. It might look like the producers were just picking on gay men if it weren't for the fact that other non gay interviewees were also to a fault. Equally slim witted. Remarkably, the show's cuddly host the very appealing and evidently non gay comedian Frank Nicotero. Never raises an eyebrow or winks to the camera when confronted with a squishy retort, or even gets tweaked or playfully poked by one of the clueless Queens which is often to his enormous credit Nicotero giggles delightfully each time as if an adorable toddler had just tweaked his nose, instead of a six foot five inch drag queen. It's a significant moment perhaps lost on most viewers, but a powerful image Nonetheless, when a straight interviewer does not recoil in horror, or feel the need for to assert his non gay persona, when his nipple gets treated by a member of the same sex. This may not be quite the kind of progress that gays and lesbians have been lobbying for since Stonewall became a lightning rod for acceptance. But it shows in its own loopy kind of way, the kind of societal progression towards tolerance. Not good enough, you say? Well, perhaps you're right. But a progressive attitude like this displayed willingly by a host and producers without a gay agenda, just might have the positive effect in imperceptible incremental ways towards increasing tolerance, especially in the eyes of young MTV influenced viewers, who like all children learn three ways. They copy, they copy and they copy the game so tolerant model may really have begun last summer when, Who Wants to Be a Millionaire introduced ostensibly gay contestants and their partners in the relationship chair without fanfare explanation or hesitation. There they were gay people just living out their lives and making some quick loot just like the rest of fast fingered America. Whatever happened to making a positive statement for or offering a warning disclaimer against the producers never deviated from their established format to protect America from the terrifying sight of a gay contestant and the person they love. But back to street smarts, shouldn't gays and lesbians be insulted that one of their own is being presented on national television as the gay equivalent of a step in Fetchit, it may make
