Need to experience portions of the names project aids Memorial Quilt, which was a project that was organized some years ago to put value on the individuals who had died of AIDS. So they wouldn't just be a number and justice statistic that we could all remember they had names. They were want someone's son or daughter or lover or friend, or child or mother or father. I'm joined today by Barry Mandel, who was chairing the events that will bring the names project aids Memorial Quilt to Houston, starting October 17. Welcome, Barry, thank you. And I'd like to ask you, first of all, what was the motivation to not only bring the AIDS quilt back to Houston, but to bring it to the Jewish Community Center and involve the Jewish community.

I think the impetus for the project started with my eighth grade religious school class last year, when I brought up the subject of AIDS and that we would spend some time dealing with the subject of AIDS, I got a very negative response from a number of the kids in the class based

upon the fact that they felt they had heard all they wanted to hear about AIDS through their secular schools. So I had to find a way to approach the subject of age from a different avenue, that would again, give me the opportunity to educate them. Give me the opportunity to bring to light the compassion that I believe the entire community needs to have in dealing with the issue of AIDS.

And so what were the first steps in getting the entire Jewish community involved in not only being able to view the quilt, but there are several events that are going to be occurring. Opening and closing ceremonies, of course, and other events as well.
