You know these were did they just show the hypocrisy of the drug wars. One from Great Britain Britain drops old drug strategy targets goals were not credible. Michigan Legislature repeals draconian mandatory minimum drug sentences. New Jersey court declares state's civil forfeiture funding scheme unconstitutional. Massachusetts High Court blocks arrest of needle exchange participants Illinois Supreme Court limits use of drug dogs in traffic stops. And in Canada paramilitary drug raid tactics anger Eugene residents and those you know those are just skimming the top. There's hundreds of stories like that coming out every week. Great, but the big story the big and I'm going to have this on the for 20. Drug War news all week. Did you see the movie traffic? There was a scene where the drugs are Michael Douglas's character, quit the DEA, saying he can no longer make war on his own people. Well, deja vu all over again. Oh, almost. The story was first circulated earlier today that perhaps one of the most important develops in drug reform in recent years. This is from sein o tree. He was a guest earlier this year on the cultural baggage show. He was at a hearing the Colombian heroin crisis. And quoting and quoting San Jose out, quote Dan Burton, the Uber drug warrior came within an inch of talking about ending drug prohibition. So many jaws dropped in the room that you could have thought everyone was dunked on Thorazine. Wow, the expressions on the drug warriors faces was priceless when they slowly realized their formerly staunch ally might be going away of New Mexico Governor Gary Johnson. Now the following is a quote from Dan Burton, I want to tell you something, I have been in probably 100 or 150 hearings like this at various times in my political career. And the story is always the same. This goes back to the 60s, you know, 30 or 35 years ago, and every time I come to a hearing, I hear people who get hooked on heroin and cocaine, become addicted, and they very rarely get off of it. And a scourge expands and expands. And you see it growing and growing. And you see these horrible tragedies occur, but there is no end to it. Over 70% of all crime is drug related. We saw on television recently, Pablo Escobar gunned down and everybody applauded and said that's the end of the Mendelian cartel. But it wasn't the end, there was still a cartel down there. They are still all over the place. When you kill one. There's 10 or 20, or 50, waiting to take his place. why? It's because there's so much money to be made in it. And there is always going to be another person in line to make that money. And we go into drug eradication, we go into rehabilitation, and we go into education. And we do all these things. And a drug problem continues to increase. And it continues to cost us not billions, but trillions of dollars, trillions. And we continue to build more and more prisons. And we put more and more people in jail. And we know the crimes that most of the time are related to drugs. So I have one question, I would like to ask all of you and I think this is a question that needs to be asked. I hate drugs. I hate people who succumb to drug addiction. And I hate what it does to our society. Is it every one of us in our family or friends of ours? But I have one question that no one ever asked. And that is this question. What would happen if there was no profit in drugs? If there was no profit in drugs? What would happen? If they couldn't make any money out of selling drugs? What would happen? Because we have been fighting this fight for 30 to 40 years, and the problem never goes away. Wow. And when you get a man like Dan Burton, challenging the law, challenging this hysterical hysteria, for 65 years, we've been fighting this drug war with a man like this stands up to change is near folks. His head hovering over a TV tray slumped with Dead Presidents would bellowed out our ungratefulness children expect gifts and a baby Jesus shows up that's fine too. As a Catholic fourth grader at St. John's Elementary School, worried for the poor and the children of Biafra. I wanted Baby Jesus to be born, swaddled sung to adored celebrated all that. But then, and I'm sorry to say this, I just wanted to get my presence. That year I ruined the expectation of Christmas by tearing tiny holes into the wrapping of my three gifts.
