The State of Rhode Island is considering protections for gays and lesbians in housing, employment, credit and public accommodations. The House Judiciary Committee has already approved the measure and the Senate Finance Committee has been hearing testimony from gay activist supporters and Christian fundamentalist opponents. The City of Portland Maine is also considering an ordinance to ban discrimination based on sexual orientation. The city of Plattsburgh, New York unanimously agreed to add sexual orientation to the list of protected classes and its civil rights laws so quietly that the local paper didn't even report it.

In notoriously conservative Orange County, California, the city council of Laguna Beach unanimously approved a law granting some legal standing to domestic partners for hospital visitation and funeral arrangements. The bill was introduced by openly gay Mayor Robert Gentry, and will take effect next month,

and the Washington DC City Council affirmed its unique domestic partners bill a second time by a vote of 10 to one despite a campaign by the homophobic traditional values coalition. Mayor Sharon Pratt Kelly has promised to sign the measure. But all legislation in the capital city must

be approved by the US House and Senate before becoming law. The Washington bill is unusual for including related adults such as a parent and a grown child and in offering tax breaks to businesses that offer domestic partner benefits.

Also on Washington, DC, Kevin barrel of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force testified before a House subcommittee demanding better implementation of the Hate Crime Statistics Act by the Department of Justice. The organization maintains that the government is failing to include anti gay and lesbian violence in educational materials and programs as the law requires.

The National Gay and Lesbian taskforce also recently released its own annual bias crimes report for 1991. reviewing data collected in five cities, Boston, Chicago, Minneapolis, New York and San Francisco, the task force found a 31% increase in incidents compared to 1990. They recorded over 1800 incidents last year, ranging from threats and harassment to murder, and found a 15% increase in physical assaults and an almost 30% increase in police abuse incidents over 9090. There were eight murders reported compared to only three the year before.

The largest increase in the task force. This study was in Minneapolis, Minnesota, and that states gay and lesbian community Action Council has also released its own annual hate crimes report bias crimes against gays and lesbians wrapped by a terrifying 202% from 1990 to 1991. With 338 incidents reported to the Action Council, some of those incidents had multiple victims, including 240 gay men, 82 Lesbians and 72 community organizations. The reports increased dramatically following the murders of gay man Joel Larson and John Chenoweth.
