I went through some ex, I went through some abuse through an ex husband, Anthony, and my dad was by my side every minute, instead of him telling me see, that's what you get for being gay. He told me, you need to find a good man that will love you. I thought that was beautiful what he said. And near the end of my dad's life. He talked to me privately and told me to find a good man who will love me as much as I love him settled down. And maybe one day when they legalized gay marriages get married. It brought tears to my eyes. Well, it's bringing tears to my eyes, who Gary. I think a lot of gay men would love to have that kind of relationship with their dads and their moms.
