Although he's unopposed for reelection District Judge Jack Hampton has received more than \$30,000 in supporter since July, the largest amount for an uncontested judicial race in Dallas County. Hampton sparked a national uproar 14 months ago, when he gave a 30 year sentence rather than a life sentence to the killer of two gay people. He later explained that he gave the lighter sentence because the victims were gay and had been quote out cruising the streets picking up teenage boys and the

judges remarks prompted the state investigation that ended in his official Center last year. National Gay and civil rights groups denounced the remarks and called for his immediate dismissal. Hampton has received campaign donations from 323 people. Only two of 81 candidates for Judge or justice of the peace in the county have raised more during the same same reporting period. Supporters called Hamptons characterization of the two gay murder victims as queers a minor incident that hardly blemishes record. Some of the people who donated donated from 10 to \$1,000. To Hamptons campaign say they see him as one of the fairest judges on the Dallas County bench. These funds are to be used to counsel anyone who is HIV positive and cannot afford the center's regular fee. Counseling along with regular medical care can help reduce stress and increase quality of life. The center has also received a \$25,720 grant from the Texas Department of Health through the Greater Houston AIDS Alliance for case management, counseling and nutritional education. The case management portion of the grant is part of a larger program of the Health Resources Administration project. AIDS care would be covered 100% For many insured people here under a plan proposed by an agency charged with coordinating such care in Houston in Harris County. That Coordinating Group the Greater Houston AIDS Alliance Wednesday outline the bare bones of the contract it intends to present to the Houston Area Health Care Coalition, a group of 54 local corporations and 100 associate organizations. Officials of the Alliance stressed is a preliminary document meant to generate discussion about the proposal. The Coalition and Alliance however, have met in the past to discuss the concept and the coalition is already inclined to support the plan said Executive Director Sandra person. The AIDS Alliance was formed last year after the Houston Harris County aids panel decided the coordinating agency was needed to oversee provision of care and to provide guidance in grant applications and to administer grant funds. It's just something that we say to the children we all wish for nothing. On Friday, December 22 1989, just three days before Christmas. Six gay men with AIDS or HIV infection met with us wasn't George Bush and First Lady Barbara Bush at the National Institutes of Health Clinical Center in Bethesda, Maryland, in what has been described as the first acknowledgment by the President in a face to face meeting of the unique impact that AIDS is having on the lesbian and gay community. Dr. Ramin Lyle, a native of Glasgow, Scotland, originally came to the United States to do postdoctoral cancer research in 1983. Ironically, at the National Institutes of Health, he's now participating in clinical trials of experimental drugs at the National Institutes of Health. And he was one of the six gay men at the meeting with President and Mrs. Bush, arranged by NIH is Dr. Anthony Fauci. Dr. Lisle describes the meeting and George Bush's reaction to it. The host scenario lasted like four hours previous to the actual meeting with George Bush we had gathered together in the rooms for security reasons. And for two hours, it was like a scene from 12 Angry Men were Antony Fauci was there, going over again and again, how we should

appear, how we shouldn't appear, or what we shouldn't really say. He was kinda like the talk show host. He was kind of filled on issue, although it was really his big show of his show. He was He loved it. The purpose of Fauci is performance here was to ensure continued federal funding. Yeah, that's right. He warned us before Bush is afraid of Banner waving gays, I activist, so called activist type people who wave banners and scream. He was a little concerned that perhaps we would be a little too belligerent. He told us, you know, the President does not like to be talked down to and he said, Don't give the President a shopping list. Don't give him a list of your demand. Don't even mention anything like a revamping of the health system. nationalized medical system, such as they have in Britain, and he wasn't being nasty. He really it was an all men in a gentle way of scripters. He and he actually, we had a little dry run before it and we pretended the President was there. And this kind of thing went on for like two and a half hours before the President actually arrived. I want to get to your interaction with President vote. She initially turned to me as a pre appointed spokesperson and said, No, Ray, why don't you tell the President what it's like to be a person with AIDS. So I launched into my description of my fears, my fears of isolation, my fears of Discrimination and Employment in healthcare services, my fear of losing my health insurance, the stigma of the disease that each person with HIV has to face and has to have the strength to face and how we get round the bigots basically how we fight the system that are trying to treat us like third class citizens. I didn't say that to President Bush. I was I use nice words I should have used stronger words perhaps but I was very polite in my British way. And after my my maybe one and a half minute discourse, President Bush sucked on the end of his spectacle leg the glare off his glasses and turn to me and he said well, while Ray Do you think do you think we need some some more education? Do you think some educational take care of this? And this was with his this tired face and the eyes which I tried forever to gain contact of, but seemed to be drifting, drifting everywhere in the room but but looking at me on I'm in my response was immediately to feel like hackles rise on my neck and the anger welled up inside of me. And I said, No, I said, some of the most educated people are bigots. And at that point, Barbara, who was kind of she was much more alert and much more intensely involved in the whole discussion, and was listening to every word I was seeing. I wish I'd been talking to her. She was nodding her head that you know, rolling her head up and down, up and down. No, no, it's from Bush. No acknowledgement of the truth. And she kind of leaned across to me and said, Well, what about your family at this this holiday time? Or are they being supportive? And I said, well, well, I said, my parents are back and Scott 5000 miles away. And I said, I haven't told them my events, because there's no reason that you know, I should submit them to knowing about it. I said, my real family here is Joseph, my lover. And this is just as we are all standing up and getting around. And it was hard to convey to the lady that the difference the definition, the correct definition of family, as being Joseph, somebody I've lived with for seven years, who we've owned three houses together and shared a bed together. Did you tell Barbara I wish I could his man was standing in the side called beckoning to him telling the President Mr. President, we really have to go. And it was time to hand out the little pie pins with the President's crest and get on his way. How did you feel the president reacted to the well, that's the soul searching question. As you sit staring into the degree is the Runkel.

Bro, you try to see what effects your words are having on the guy. It was like trying to make contact with a black hole. The information was flowing into the black hole. There was nothing coming out. He seemed to lack knowledge. That's a dangerous statement. But I as a scientist, that's my judgment. He seemed to genuinely like knowledge of the whole situation, and in particular, the effect on gay people. And that's an honest statement and honest assessment. His response on education to me was probably a genuine, maybe it was genuine. His response to another guy who was sitting next to me from Mississippi, was even more crazy. And even showed even more of a lack of understanding of the difficulties. This guy lives in rural Mississippi. Jackson, Mississippi, and his little two seconds of stardom with the President was to tell the President that he has to drive or fly all the way to NIH to get experimental drugs, because he has AIDS. And the President said, Well, why is that? That he had to ask why. And he had touched somebody with AIDS tell him because there's no federal funding for drugs, experimental drugs in Mississippi. He said, I have to drive five hours to get a dentist that will treat me and Bush looked confused. You know, yeah, this is this. Is this the United States that he's the president of that he's listening to this story? I mean, does this sound like the way a United States citizens should be treated? And I was afraid I was being too belligerent. I was visibly getting angry. And the guy from Mississippi was visibly angry also, I mean, nobody who has AIDS and who has seen people die of AIDS and who is affected by it can be without anger, and especially faced with the silence that we've had from this administration, and the disgusting display from the previous administration, and Bush is just has been so silent. He has, has an inability to talk about it. Even when confronted with six gay men. He looked confused confusion was his response. I think to most of the whole situation. He probably went to sleep after it and woke up and thought it was a bad dream.
