That was Your Girlfriend with "Lesbebop", before that was Lisa Coke doing "Beaver Cleaver Fever" and of course, we started that out with the dedication to Sarah by Girls in The Nose with "These Hips". You have been listening to--

JIMMY CARPER: She, yeah, she will, she's going to get revenge on me for that. There's-- this has been the QMZ, the QMZ with the Queer Music Zone with Jimmy and, yes, and we'll see you next week.

WOMAN: [LAUGHTER] We're back. And I was just sitting here reading this thing we were talking about earlier. Oh, by the way, our phones-- we're having some problems with our phones so if you call tonight it's got to be 526 4000. 526 4000. No, wait a minute.

They're going to be doing this, they're going to be doing this June the 22nd at 9:00 on PBS. That's your local PBS station, that's channel seven or eight depending on what your cable company is. If you don't have cable, it's eight.
