**REPORTER:** And here comes the National March on Washington for lesbian and gay rights.

**REPORTER:** Gay power, gay politics. That's what this report is about.

**REPORTER:** There are gay and lesbian people singing out here, what's your reaction to that?

**MAN:** I think it's terrible. If I had a rock, I'd throw it at them.

**PROTESTER:** The real advantage of being in gay gangs is that every one of us is a winner.

**PROTESTOR:** Today we are marching, as are others across America. And we shouldn't have to be.

**JUDGE:** Be seated. In the matter of *Fricke vs. Lynch*, shows that the following opinion was entered into the record May 28, 1980.

Most of the time, a young man's choice of a date for the senior prom is of no great interest to anyone other than the student, his companion, and perhaps a few of their classmates. But in Aaron Fricke's case, the school authorities actively disapprove of his choice.

The other students are upset. The community is abuzz and the out of state state newspapers consider the matter newsworthy. All of this fuss arises because Aaron Fricke's intended escort is another young man.

The seeds of the present conflict were planted a year ago, when Peter Grayson then a junior at Cumberland High School, sought permission to bring a male escort to the junior prom. The principal, Richard Lynch, denied the request. At that time, Aaron Fricke was a friend of Peter's and supported his position regarding the dance.

Peter Grayson subsequently left Cumberland High School. He now lives in New York City, but the emotionally charged issues surrounding his request persisted into the following year.

**PRINCIPAL LYNCH:** Finally, I want to say something about responsibility. I've been your principal for three years and I've seen you mature during that time, some more than others. But you're all seniors now. And as seniors, each and every one of you is responsible for your younger classmates.

Now they'll be looking up to you to set a good example. It doesn't take much for that one problem student to ruin it for all the rest.

[BOOING]

**AARON FRICKE:** OK, Ann, I'll talk to you. Hey, Bob! Bob, wait up. It's me, Aaron. Aaron Fricke.

**BOB:** Yeah, yeah, I know who you are. What do you want?

**AARON FRICKE:** I just wanted to say hello. Long time, no see.

**BOB:** I've been busy. Oh, sure, I understand.

**BEA:** Bob, where did you go? I've been looking all over for you.

**BOB:** Aaron--

**BEA:** What were you talking to him for?

**BOB:** Never mind. Let's get out of here.

**AARON FRICKE:** I'm going that way too.

**BEA:** Get lost, [INAUDIBLE].

**AARON FRICKE:** So long Bob.

[CRICKETS CHIRPING]

**PETER:** Hello?

**AARON FRICKE:** Peter, it's me.

**PETER:** Aaron, God I'm glad you called. How was the first day back at school?

**AARON FRICKE:** It was the pits. Lynch gave one of his great speeches. You'll never guess what he said about you.

**PETER:** I can't wait.

**AARON FRICKE:** He said you were the problem from last year.

**PETER:** Wonderful, just what I always wanted to be.

**AARON FRICKE:** Yeah, now that you're gone, he thinks the whole school is straight. I saw Ann today. We're in biology together.

**PETER:** Uh-huh.

**AARON FRICKE:** Oh, and we're going to do *Thurber Carnival* this term.

**PETER:** Great, you're a natural for the carnival-- a born star.

**AARON FRICKE:** Right. No really, thank God for the drama club. Something else happened today. I saw this old friend of mine, Bob Cote. He's going out with Bea Divulge.

**PETER:** Uh, oh. The Wicked Witch of Cumberland High.

**AARON FRICKE:** Yeah, right. But when I said hello to Bob, he acted like he hardly even knew me. It was like our friendship didn't mean anything to him.

**PETER:** What did you expect?

**AARON FRICKE:** I don't know. Just some sign he cared, that's all.

**PETER:** He's one scared guy, Aaron. He's afraid to get near you, let alone show that he cares. You ought to know that by now.

**AARON FRICKE:** Yeah, I guess so. Peter, I really miss you.

**AARON FRICKE:** You wouldn't believe the impression you left on Cumberland High. If nothing else, you've gotten them to say the word "gay" at least 600 times a day. I do miss having you here.

[KNOCKING]

**MAN:** Aaron, kind of late to be talking on the phone isn't it?

**AARON FRICKE:** Yeah, dad, I was just getting off. Listen, I've got to go. I'll talk to you later, OK? Bye.

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

**MAN:** --doing in my locker?

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

**AARON FRICKE:** OK, who did it?

**MAN:** Did what?

**AARON FRICKE:** Look in the locker. Somebody spit on my clothes again.

**MAN:** Prove it, homo.

[LAUGHING]

Where you going?

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

[KNOCKING]

**GYM TEACHER:** Aaron Fricke, what is it?

**AARON FRICKE:** I'd like permission to leave gym class early.

**GYM TEACHER:** What for?

**AARON FRICKE:** Someone's been spitting on my clothes when I'm in the shower. It's like the fourth time it's happened.

**GYM TEACHER:** I don't understand Fricke. What's leaving early got to do with it?

**AARON FRICKE:** Well, it wouldn't happen if I could get dressed before everyone else.

**GYM TEACHER:** Class is up when the bell rings. Those are the rules. If you don't like the rules, talk to Mr. Lynch about it.

**AARON FRICKE:** All right, I will.

**GYM TEACHER:** Aaron, I can understand why you want to leave gym class early, but I just wonder how the other students are going to feel.

**AARON FRICKE:** The other students?

**GYM TEACHER:** We don't want to look like we're favoring anyone.

**AARON FRICKE:** No, sir.

**GYM TEACHER:** You're friends with Peter Grayson, aren't you?

**AARON FRICKE:** Yeah, we're friends. I don't see what that--

**GYM TEACHER:** Just a minute, Aaron. Don't you think the other fellows know you're friends with, Peter? And don't you think that's why they're giving you such a hard time?

**AARON FRICKE:** No sir, I don't. I don't think Peter has anything to do with it.

**GYM TEACHER:** I see. Well, leaving gym class early won't solve the problem. Not in my opinion.

**AARON FRICKE:** What if I transfer? Took another class?

**GYM TEACHER:** Well, you could. Of course, we'd have to tell your parents.

**AARON FRICKE:** My parents?

**GYM TEACHER:** We couldn't do that without their approval. Should we call them? Or do you want to think it over first? It's up to you.

**JOHN:** So what did you tell him?

**AARON FRICKE:** I told them to forget it. I don't want my parents to know that I'm gay.

**JOHN:** I'm sorry if I offended you.

[MUSIC PLAYING]

**JOHN:** The old metro parking lot is really hopping tonight. And look who's cruising us-- in a station wagon, no less.

**AARON FRICKE:** Big deal, I've seen him here before.

[MUSIC PLAYING]

Sometimes I think I'm a rock lobster. No claws, always hiding in my little shell. Always afraid. Afraid of what? Afraid of myself? What?

**JOHN:** Why so serious? What's the matter with you tonight?

**AARON FRICKE:** I just feel so helpless sometimes. Peter wouldn't have taken that crap from Lynch.

**JOHN:** You still miss him, don't you?

**AARON FRICKE:** Yeah, I miss him a lot. Peter was the first person I ever met who was proud of being gay. I want to be proud. Oh, I don't know what I want. I just don't want to lie and hide anymore. That's all. Like Peter, Peter had all the nerve.

**JOHN:** And look where it got him-- kicked out of the house by his parents. He had to leave town. All on account of that stupid prom.

**AARON FRICKE:** Well, if being yourself means getting into trouble, then maybe staying out of trouble isn't such a great idea.

**JOHN:** Listen honey, you don't have to tell me that. I've always been myself. But pride, or no pride, you don't pick a fight unless you know can win it. Aaron, you've got to go easier on yourself. Give yourself time. Do you want some of this?

**AARON FRICKE:** No, go ahead.

**JOHN:** Check out Mr. Muscles over there.

**AARON FRICKE:** Which one? In the Honda?

**JOHN:** Not him, the hunky number in the little Chevy.

**AARON FRICKE:** Oh, yeah. It's getting kind of crowded.

**JOHN:** I know, isn't it fabulous? So many men, so little time.

**ANNOUNCER:** You're listening to *Reflections of a Rock Lobster*. Exclusively on After Hours, KPFT Houston 90.1 FM.

**SPEAKER 1:** Boy, Mr. Lynch sounds like a good guy, doesn't he?

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

**SPEAKER 2:** You can't say that.

**SPEAKER 1:** You can't say what? That's one of the words you can't say. So what do you think guys?

**SPEAKER 2:** It's great show.

**SPEAKER 3:** Lynch has an attitude.

**SPEAKER 2:** And attitude I think is an understatement.

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

**SPEAKER 1:** If you had Mr. Lynch running around at your school, what would you do?

**MAN:** Leave.

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

**MAN:** Have him transferred.

**MAN:** Yeah, do something to him.

**MAN:** Not very nice.

**MAN:** Well.

**MAN:** Like I said, this is not very nice.

**SPEAKER 1:** Very nice. I know, we need some headphones in here maybe. No?



**SPEAKER 2:** I don't know. What do you need headphones in there for?

**SPEAKER 1:** We don't need those. Kind of fell apart, I'm going to buy some new ones with that \$95,000, wasn't that great?

**SPEAKER 2:** That was great.

**SPEAKER 1:** \$95,000 that we got from the marathon. If you plug that in, one of you can hear what's going on in there.

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

**SPEAKER 1:** Yeah, only one of you. So you'll be able to hear. Can you hear these guys in here? I know You don't want to.

**SPEAKER 2:** [INAUDIBLE].

**SPEAKER 1:** So what do you-- what do you think Aaron's chances are getting to the prom right now? It doesn't sound good. Not with Lynch running the school. He seems like a nice Republican-- I mean, a nice-- well, I didn't mean to say that. Republican and redneck, it all kind of comes out together, anyway.

We're going back to *Rock Lobster*. Aaron is going to come out. And his dad finds the word gay, right? Spray painted on the front of the garage. What a strange-- at the front door?

**SPEAKER 2:** Yeah.

**SPEAKER 1:** Is that where it was? Anyway, this is *After Hours*. Yeah. *After Hours* on KPFT Houston. And let's check out and see what Aaron and his dad are doing.

**AARON DAD:** Aaron, could you come over here?

**AARON FRICKE:** Yeah, Dad? What is it?

**AARON DAD:** Do you know anything about this?

**AARON FRICKE:** No. No, it's the first time I've seen it.

**AARON DAD:** Now why in the hell would somebody spray paint "gay" on our front door?

**AARON FRICKE:** I don't know. Maybe it was some kids playing around.

**AARON DAD:** You're probably right. Anyhow, there's some paint remover in the garage, why don't you clean it off?

**AARON FRICKE:** Sure.

**AARON DAD:** Oh, and Aaron?

**AARON FRICKE:** Yeah?

**AARON DAD:** I wouldn't tell your mother about this. It might upset her.

**AARON FRICKE:** OK, fine. I wasn't going to say anything anyways.

**MAN:** Hey, Aaron, what are you doing in the library?

**AARON FRICKE:** Don't tell anyone, I'm cutting gym class.

**MAN:** I don't care what you're cutting, I want to talk to you.

Last night I was hitching back from Providence and this old guy picks me up. He was like in his 40s. So we're driving along and he starts asking me if I'd ever made it with another man before.

Then he pulled off the road and he starts putting the moves on me. Jesus, and I didn't know what to do. So I jumped out of the car and I waited until he left. Then I caught another ride.

**AARON FRICKE:** What are you telling me this for?

**MAN:** Because you're a faggot, man. Everybody knows that. And I sort of thought you could explain it to me.

**AARON FRICKE:** Nothing like being the school queer. Look, why don't you call the gay helpline and tell them what happened. I'll give you the number.

**MAN:** I will, I'll call it. There's something else.

**AARON FRICKE:** Yeah, what's that?

**MAN:** I want you to give me a [BLEEP].

**AARON FRICKE:** What? Are you crazy?

**MAN:** Come on, just do it.

**TEACHER:** Is that Fricke?

**AARON FRICKE:** Yes sir.

**TEACHER:** Aren't you supposed to be in gym class today?

**AARON FRICKE:** Well, there's the reason why--

**TEACHER:** Save it for Lynch. You're coming with me.

**MAN:** You're in trouble now, man.

**AARON FRICKE:** Just call that number.

**TEACHER:** I said move it, Fricke.

**AARON FRICKE:** All right, all right, I'm coming.

**PRINCIPAL LYNCH:** I thought we had an understanding, Aaron. I thought that you were going to work through this little problem of yours.

**AARON FRICKE:** Mr. Lynch, it's just that gym class. You don't know what it's like in there for me.

**PRINCIPAL LYNCH:** But that's not what we're here to talk about-- what it's like for you-- is it, Aaron?

**AARON FRICKE:** Then what are we here to talk about?

**PRINCIPAL** Don't you use that tone of voice with me. I'll show you what you're here for. You know what this is?  
**LYNCH:**

**AARON FRICKE:** No.

**PRINCIPAL** It's your attendance report. It says you've skipped gym class four times in the last two weeks. I could suspend

**LYNCH:**

**PETER GRAYSON:** Hi, this is Peter Grayson. I'm not home right now but you can leave a message right after the beep. Bye.

**AARON FRICKE:** Peter, it's Aaron. I was just calling to say hello. John and I are going to Newport to see *Rocky Horror* again. And we'll probably cruise the metro parking lot after that. So anyways, I'll call you back later tonight. Bye.

[MUSIC - "THE TIME WARP"]

(SINGING) They'll never be the same. There's a startled sensation.

[LAUGHING]

**JOHN:** What a night! My dear, we're definitely too much. When you showered the entire front row with rice, I nearly cried. [LAUGHS]

**AARON FRICKE:** And John, you never looked more gorgeous. That gown is you.

**JOHN:** Put me in magenta and girls, eat your hearts out.

[LAUGHING]

**JOHN:** Oh.

**AARON FRICKE:** We've got to go back next week.

**JOHN:** Yeah. Oh, slow down. We're almost at the metro. We mustn't look too eager.

**AARON FRICKE:** Oh, the place is empty. Where is everyone?

**PRINCIPAL** We've got company. Looking for someone?  
**LYNCH:**

**MAN:** Get the hell out of here.

**JOHN:** Ask nicely.

**MAN:** I can ask you to do nothing, you fucking queer!

**AARON FRICKE:** If you want us out, you have to make us leave.

**JOHN:** Aaron, he's got a crowbar. Let's get out of here-- fast.

**MAN:** I said beat it, faggot.

**JOHN:** Did you see him? He wanted to kill us. We were lucky to get out there.

**AARON FRICKE:** God dammit, isn't any place in this town safe for us? Where the hell are we supposed to go?

**MRS. MURDOCK:** There will be a short quiz tomorrow on chapters 9 and 10. That's all for today. Aaron, could you stay after class? I want to speak with you.

**AARON FRICKE:** Yes, Mrs. Murdock.

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

**MRS. MURDOCK:** What is the meaning of this paper you handed in the other day?

**AARON FRICKE:** I thought I was doing the assignment.

**MRS. MURDOCK:** The assignment was to write a paper on a topic that interests you. Homosexuality is an improper subject.

**AARON FRICKE:** But I am interested in it.

**MRS. MURDOCK:** Well no one else is. You're getting an F on this report.

[LAUGHING]

**BEA:** Here he comes.

**BOB:** Cut it out, Bea. Leave him alone.

**BEA:** Well, Bob, what do you care? Hello, Aaron.

**AARON FRICKE:** Oh, Hello, Bea. Hi, Bob.

**BEA:** We were wondering if you asked anyone to the prom yet?

**AARON FRICKE:** No, I thought I'd skip the prom this year.

**BEA:** What's the matter? Couldn't you find any boys to go with?

[LAUGHING]

**PRINCIPAL** Yes.

**LYNCH:**

**AARON FRICKE:** Mr. Lynch, I've got a complaint to make.

**PRINCIPAL** Do you have an appointment to see me, Aaron?

**LYNCH:**

**AARON FRICKE:** No, I don't need an appointment. Look at this. Look at my back. Do you know what that is? It's what's left of the animal parts they're throwing at me in biology class.

**PRINCIPAL** Well, I'm sorry to hear that. But you'll have to take it up with the assistant principal, Mr. Duvos.

**LYNCH:**

**AARON FRICKE:** No, I want to take it up with you. I want to know what you're going to do about it.

**PRINCIPAL** Well Aaron, I've said it before and I'll say it again. Your classmates know all about your friendship with Peter

**LYNCH:** Grayson. What happened is to be expected.

**AARON FRICKE:** That gives them the right to call me "faggot" and "queer"? Because I know Peter Grayson?

**PRINCIPAL** You should have thought of that before you started spending time with him.

**LYNCH:**

**AARON FRICKE:** I thought you were supposed to protect the students-- every student, including me.

**PRINCIPAL** I've heard just about enough from you Aaron.

**LYNCH:**

**AARON FRICKE:** And you're going to hear a whole lot more from now on.

**PRINCIPAL** Now you just wait a minute, young man. I'm not finished with you yet.

**LYNCH:**

**AARON FRICKE:** Well I'm finished. Because if this is your idea of protection, I'm better off on my own.

[DOOR SHUT]

[PHONE RING]

**PETER GRAYSON:** Hello?

**AARON FRICKE:** Peter, it's me.

**PETER GRAYSON:** Aaron? What time is it?

**AARON FRICKE:** It's about 2:00 in the morning. Listen, I did it. I finally told my parents I'm gay.

**PETER GRAYSON:** Hey, that's great. How'd they take it?

**AARON FRICKE:** Well, my mother kind of suspected. But my father, he just broke down and cried.

**PETER GRAYSON:** You're kidding?

**AARON FRICKE:** No, it was pretty bad. He was sitting at the kitchen table. He didn't say anything. The tears just rolled down his face.

**PETER GRAYSON:** That's OK. He'll get over it.

**AARON FRICKE:** God, I hope so. It was awful.

**PETER GRAYSON:** How do you feel? That's the important thing.

**AARON FRICKE:** I feel all right. I really do. I mean, there were so many times when I'd wonder, did they know?

God, all the lies I told to keep them from finding out about me. They didn't even realize who their own son was. What it was like at school, what I've been going through. I just couldn't keep living like that anymore. I had to tell them.

**PETER GRAYSON:** You did the right thing.

**AARON FRICKE:** Yeah, I guess so. But you know what's really funny? Now that I've told my parents, I feel like telling everybody-- the whole world.

**PETER GRAYSON:** So what's stopping you? Go ahead and do it.

**ANNOUNCER:** You're listening to *Reflections of a Rock Lobster*. Exclusively on *After Hours* KPFT, Houston 90.1 FM.

[MUSIC - THE B-52'S, "ROCK LOBSTER"]

(SINGING) Rock lobster.

**SPEAKER 1:** Yes. Well Aaron Fricke is rolling right along. Kay, it looks like you've been abandoned in there.

**KAY:** I think I have been.

**SPEAKER 1:** Where did everybody go?

**KAY:** Oh, Judy and Bruce are back in production, and Jimmy's answering phones, and--

**SPEAKER 1:** Really?

**KAY:** I'm here by myself.

**SPEAKER 1:** Well, talk to us for a few minutes while I do this, would you dear?

**KAY:** OK.

**SPEAKER 1:** Tell us about these car wash guys, really. There's a car wash coming up?

**SPEAKER 2:** Well, go ahead Gary.

**MAN:** It's October first in the parking lot of Mary's at 9:00 AM. It's being held by the Gay and Lesbian Student Association-- Gay and Lesbian Student Association at U of H. And it's at 9:00 AM. October first in Mary's parking lot.

**MAN:** What time is it over, or how late are you going to stay?

**SPEAKER 1:** Until all the cars are washed.

**MAN:** Yeah.

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

**SPEAKER 1:** There's going to be a small fee charged. And you can go by and get your car washed and learn more about HATCH. How long has HATCH been around?

**MAN:** About a year and a half.

**SPEAKER 1:** A year and a half?

**MAN:** Yeah.

**SPEAKER 1:** And there's a lot-- there's a lot that goes on there, right?

**MAN:** Well it's a support group. Or just I like to think of it as just a group that you can come and sit down and talk and have your-- see that you're not alone.

**SPEAKER 1:** That's real important, right?

**MAN:** Very important.

**MAN:** You can just be gay, and not have to watch what you say or do. It's only two adults, so the rest of us are just--

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

**MAN:** They're there all the time, they're really great. And they'll leave the room if like we just want to talk and be alone. But usually it's OK.

**SPEAKER 1:** OK, Aaron Fricke is-- getting ready to tell the whole world.

**MAN:** You can say those seven words, Aaron.

**SPEAKER 1:** I said a couple of those words tonight. I was doing that tonight. OK, I went I went down to the HATCH group tonight.

**KAY:** Yeah, you told me about that.

**SPEAKER 1:** It was a lot of fun. I wish I had something like that to do when I was 16 years old.

**KAY:** I wish I'd known I was gay.

**MAN:** Yeah, poor Kay. Happy birthday.

**KAY:** Thank you.

**SPEAKER 1:** Yeah, we're going to sing "Happy Birthday" to you later.

**KAY:** You really don't have to.

**SPEAKER 1:** But we will. You know we will. The story picks up now where Aaron gets a letter from his good friend, Ann, I believe. And she's very supportive. And it sounds like he's getting closer to the prom though.

**SPEAKER 2:** Closer, possibly.

**SPEAKER 1:** We--

**MAN:** We hope.

**SPEAKER 1:** Yeah, we hope. We'll find out. You're listening to *After Hours* on KPFT. And let's go back to the prom. No we're not going to the prom yet. Let's go back to Aaron's house.

[CRICKETS CHIRPING]

**ANN:** Dear Aaron, you asked me what I think about you asking Peter to go to the prom. Last year, Peter's attempt to bring a guy to the prom was seen by most people-- in fact, I think by all-- as a grab at publicity. That was because no one knew Peter. He just showed up out of a clear, blue sky and raised a ruckus.

Since you've been in Cumberland much longer, and have more close friends, people won't suspect you of such ill motives so easily. But this is what they will think-- one, Peter made you do it; two, you're crazy; and three, you believe in gay rights. In that order.

Now I know you did it for a reason number three, gay rights. But you should think about how other people are going to react. And I think you should make an effort to explain what you believe. I respect any decision you make as long as you really think about it carefully. Love, Ann.

**PRINCIPAL LYNCH:** You want to do what?

**AARON FRICKE:** I want to bring a male date to the senior prom.

**PRINCIPAL LYNCH:** And what makes you think you can do that?

**AARON FRICKE:** Well you see sir, the rules say that any senior can take the date of his or her choice. Being a gay man, I think I'm entitled to take a male date.

**PRINCIPAL LYNCH:** Absolutely not.

**AARON FRICKE:** Can I talk to the student council about it?

**PRINCIPAL LYNCH:** No, you can't talk to the student council. Now look, I know what you're trying to do and I won't allow it.

**AARON FRICKE:** How come?

**PRINCIPAL LYNCH:** I don't have to defend my decision to you, Aaron. We went through all this last year. Or have you've forgotten what happened to your friend, Peter Grayson?

**AARON FRICKE:** I haven't forgotten. But there's a difference. Peter was only 17 then, but I just turned 18. I could take this case to court if I wanted to.



**PRINCIPAL** You would go to court with this?

**LYNCH:**

**AARON FRICKE:** Yes, if I had to.

**PRINCIPAL** Well, my decision is final, Aaron. Nothing's going to change it.

**LYNCH:**

**AARON FRICKE:** Yeah, well we'll see about that.

[PHONE RINGING]

**AARON FRICKE:** Hello?

**JOHN WARD:** Is Aaron Fricke there?

**AARON FRICKE:** Speaking.

**JOHN WARD:** Aaron, this is John Ward, returning your call.

**AARON FRICKE:** Oh, Mr. Ward, Hi. I got your name from the National Gay Task Force. They said you had a lot of gay-related cases?

**JOHN WARD:** That's right.

**AARON FRICKE:** Well I'm gay, and I'm going to need a lawyer soon. So let me tell you why I called.

**ANN:** So they'll take the case? You're really going to go through with it?

**AARON FRICKE:** I really am.

**ANN:** Aaron, that's fantastic.

**AARON FRICKE:** I just wish I could let the rest of the students know before it hits the front page. Ethel I think I have an idea.

**ANN:** Aaron, what are you thinking?

**AARON FRICKE:** There's Bea Divulge. If I tell her, the whole school will know in about 30 seconds. They don't call her magic mouth for nothing. Hi, Bea, how's it going?

**BEA:** What's it to you?

**AARON FRICKE:** Bea, what would you say if I told you I'm going to the prom with Peter Grayson as my date?

**BEA:** Gross me out to the max!

**AARON FRICKE:** Ann, I think it worked.

**MAN:** You think they'll let him do it?

**GIRL:** He's just trying to get publicity.

**MAN:** You got to admit, he's got a lot of guts.

**MAN:** Yeah, he's crazy.

**GIRL:** I'll bet Peter made him do it.

**MAN:** So he wants to bring a guy to the prom? So what?

**GIRL:** This will ruin our reputation.

**GIRL:** What reputation?

**MAN:** Somebody says he's going to court.

**MAN:** Yeah, I hear he's got a lawyer and everything.

**MAN:** This place is turning into Gay Town, USA.

**MAN:** I don't care what anybody says, it's OK by me.

**GIRL:** You don't really get me? Lynch didn't even ask us what we thought about it.

**MAN:** Hey, Fricke better watch out, because a lot of kids around here are going to get pretty damn [INAUDIBLE].

**MAN:** I'm going to bash your faggot skull.

**AARON FRICKE:** Oh, ow.

[SCUFFLING]

**GIRL:** He's bleeding.

**AARON FRICKE:** You just stood there and watched. You could have helped me. I'm going to the nurse.

**JUDGE:** After Aaron filed suit in this court, an event reported by the Rhode Island and Boston papers, a student punched and kicked him in the school hallway. The unprovoked, surprise assault necessitated five stitches under Aaron's right eye. The assailant was suspended for nine days.

After this, Aaron was given the special parking space close to the school doors and has been provided with an escort, principal, or assistant principal between classes. No further incidents have occurred as of May 26, the day that this hearing began.
